SUBJECT: ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION NO. 2021-1714, REQUESTING THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA TO ACCEPT, ON BEHALF OF SAID DISTRICT, THE TRANSFER AND CONVEYANCE OF THE STORM DRAIN IMPROVEMENTS KNOWN AS PRIVATE DRAIN NO. 2353 IN THE CITY OF CALABASAS FOR FUTURE OPERATION, MAINTENANCE, REPAIR AND IMPROVEMENT, AND AUTHORIZE THE TRANSFER AND CONVEYANCE HEREOF

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends to adopt Resolution No. 2021-1714 requesting the board of supervisors of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District of the State of California to accept, on behalf of said District, the transfer and conveyance of the storm drain No. 2353 in the City of Calabasas for future operation, maintenance, repair and improvement, and authorize the transfer and conveyance hereof.

BACKGROUND:

In April 1992, the City and the Los Angeles County Flood Control District (LACFCD) entered into an agreement to allow the transfer of storm drains to LACFCD for future operation, maintenance, repair and improvement.

The Conditional Use Permit No. CUP-003-013, requesting construction of an 86-unit multi-family residential development at 4240 Las Virgenes Road, was approved by City Council on August 1, 2007. Per the approved project plans, private underground storm drain lines were built and connected to the private drain system (PD 2353) to serve the site.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The storm drain known as Private Drain No. 2353 crosses Las Virgenes Road and passes through Muse School and Tract 43724 to Las Virgenes Creek.

Attachment B shows location of the drainage facility to be transferred. The Los Angeles County Flood Control Maintenance District is ready to accept the facility upon adoption of the attached resolution by the City Council. A "Certificate of Acceptance" will be provided by the County upon their acceptance of resolution No. 2021-1714. The storm drain facility will then be owned and maintained by the Los Angeles County Flood Control Maintenance District under the existing county-wide storm drain benefits assessment district.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Adoption of the Resolution No. 2021-1714 poses no fiscal impact.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Staff recommends to adopt Resolution No. 2021-1714 requesting the board of supervisors of the Los Angeles County Flood Control District of the State of California to accept, on behalf of said District, the transfer and conveyance of the storm drain No. 2353 in the City of Calabasas for future operation, maintenance, repair and improvement, and authorize the transfer and conveyance hereof.
