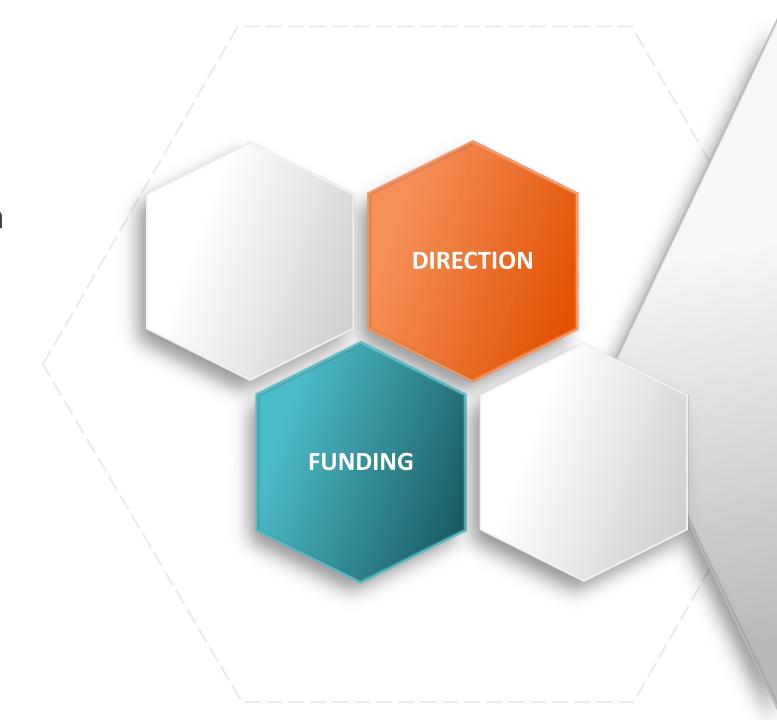

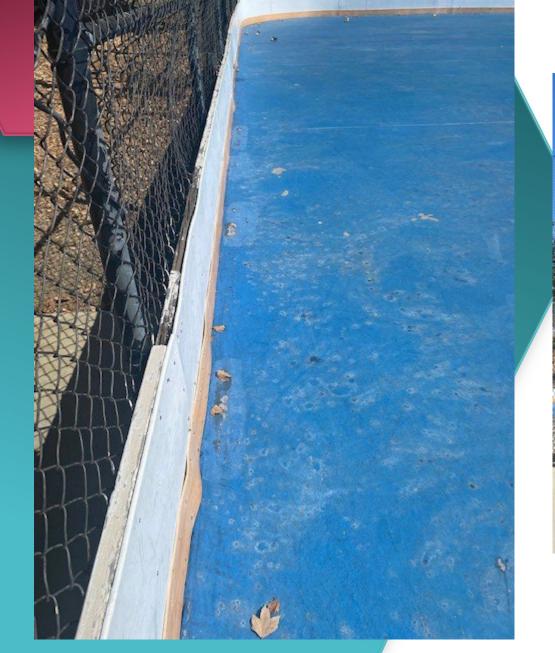

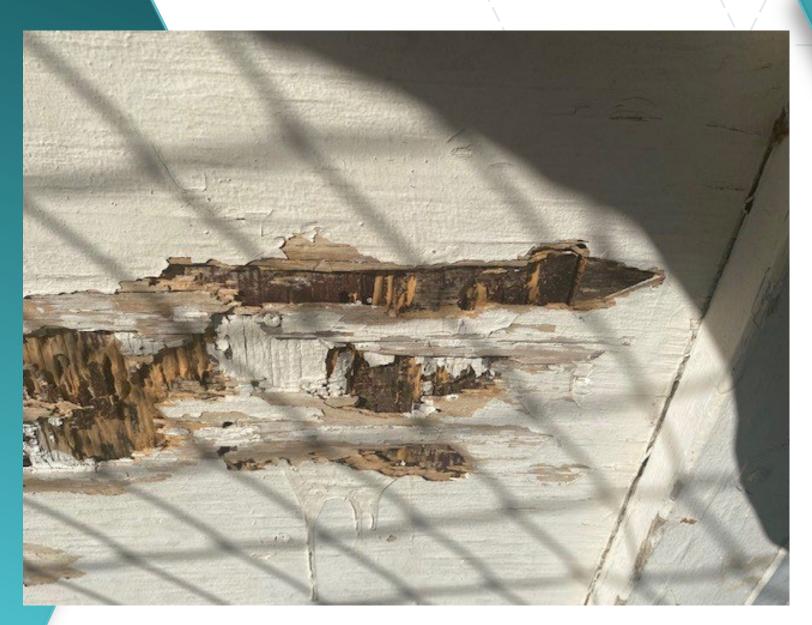
A survey was distributed for public input on the future use of the sport court and staff researched costs for multiple sport options.

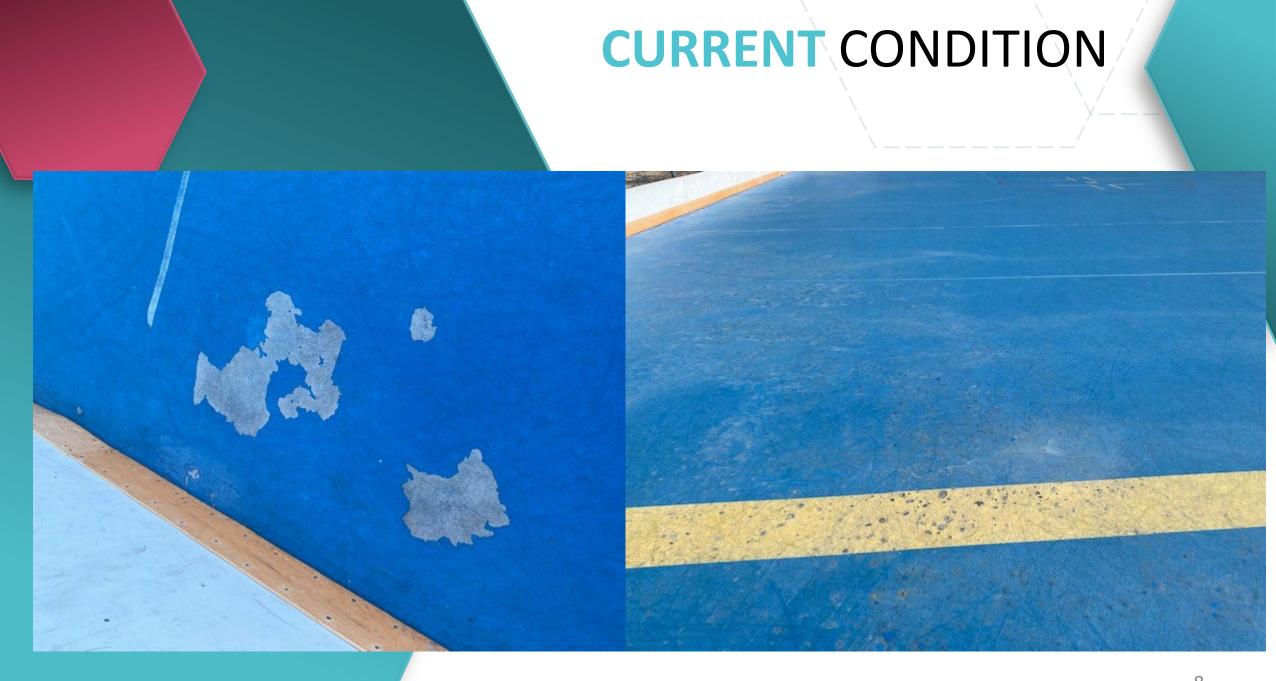






CURRENT CONDITION

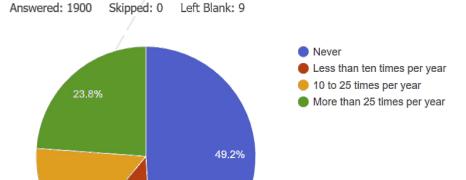

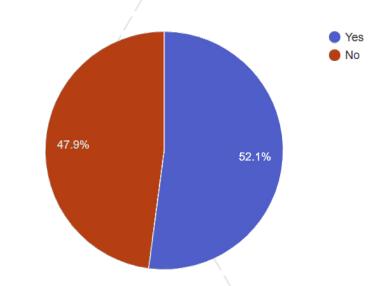

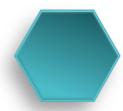

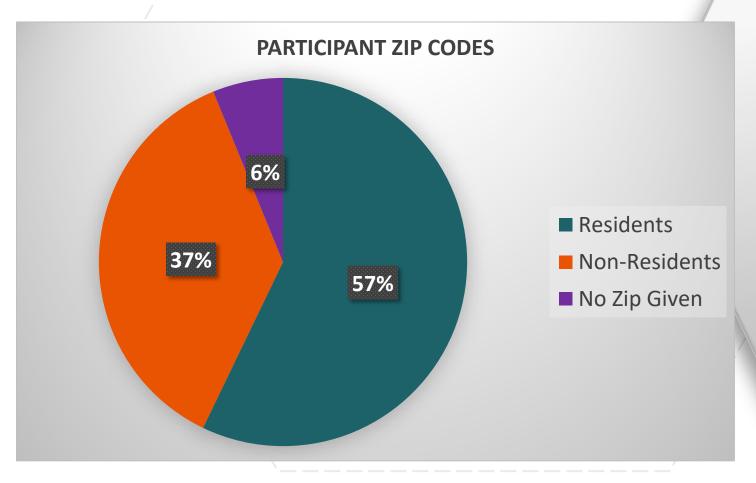

OPTION 1 Basketball & Pickleball



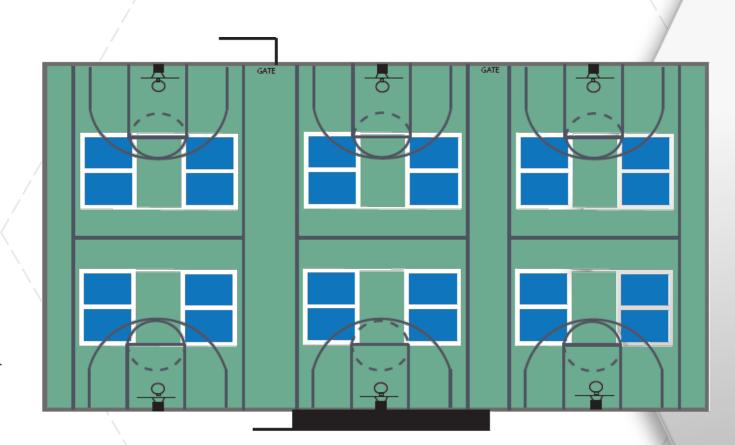
PROS

- Pickleball named top trend by National Recreation and Park Association
- Additional pickleball courts to meet common requests by park patrons
- Revenue opportunity for Pickleball classes, tournaments, round robins, etc.
- Lower maintenance costs
- Traction on court surface is ideal for both sports



CONS

- Loss of only lighted hockey court in west SF Valley
- Temporary nets not as desirable as permanent nets



COURT STRIPING FOR BASKETBALL & PICKLEBALL

OPTION 2 Basketball & Roller Hockey



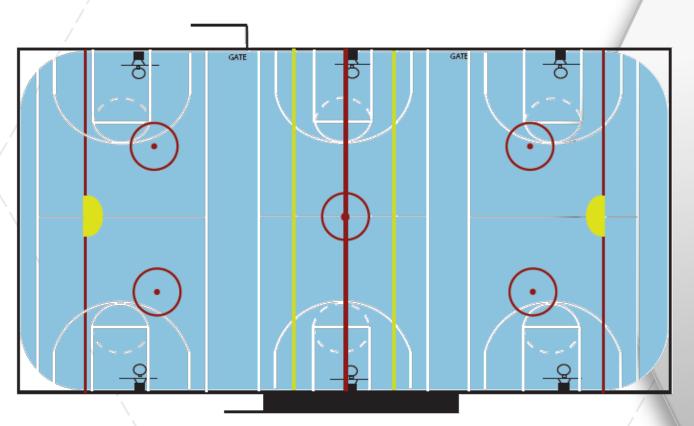
PROS

- Only lighted hockey court in west SF Valley
- Revenue opportunity for Roller Hockey classes, tournaments, round robins, etc.

Rollerskating is trending high

CONS

- Research shows downward trend in roller hockey
- Resurfacing for roller hockey is more frequent
- Court surface requires a smooth surface for roller hockey and one with more traction for basketball

OPTION 3 Basketball, Pickleball, & Roller Hockey



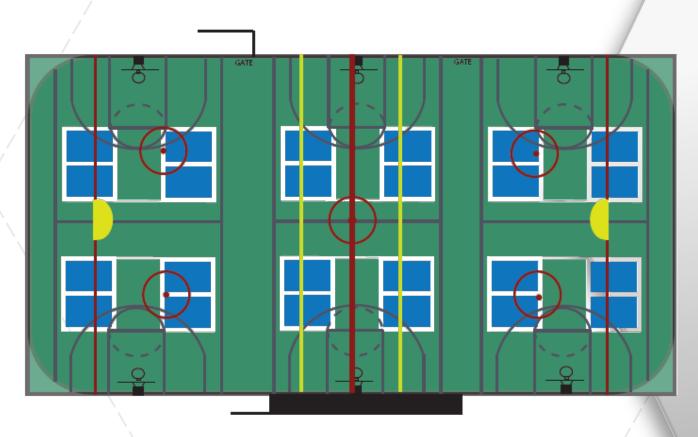
PROS

- Option to serve more public members
- Higher potential for revenue



CONS

- Confusing court striping
- Competing court times
- Conflicting court surfacing
- Higher resurfacing costs
- Staff costs to oversee court use and equipment needs
- Costs for onsite storage needed for equipment

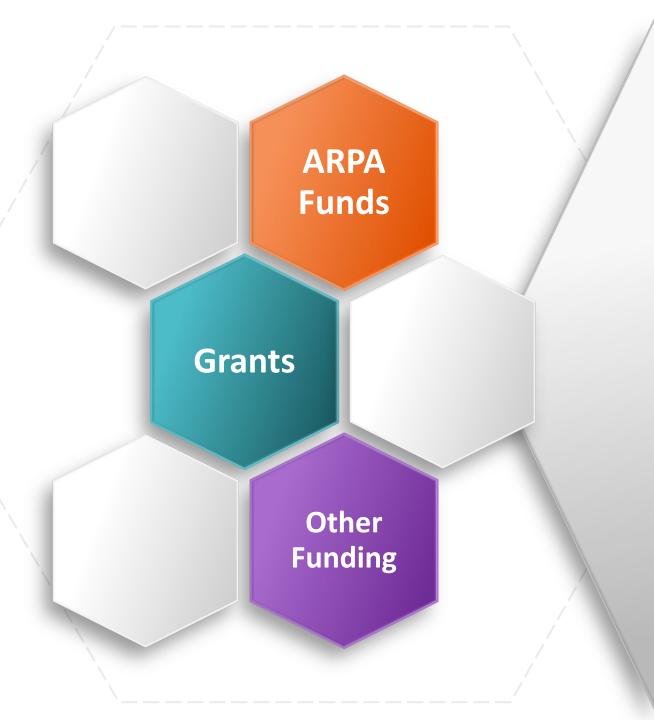

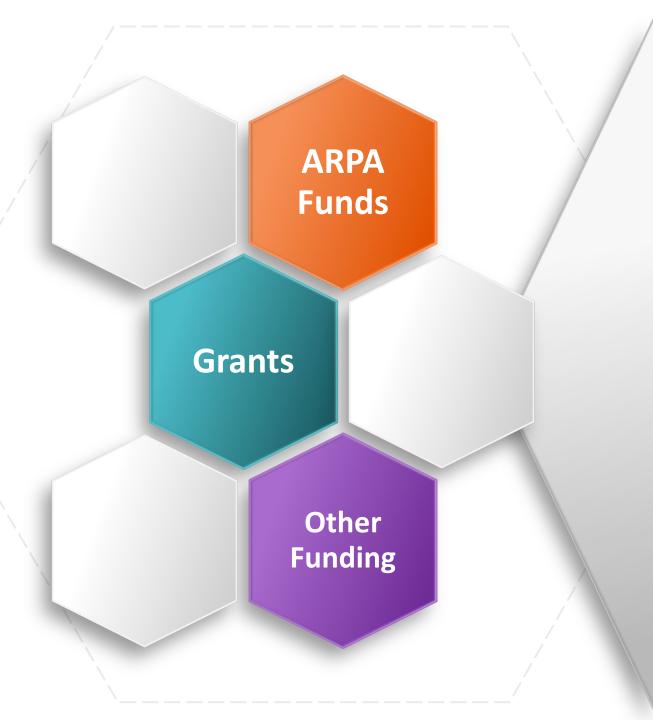

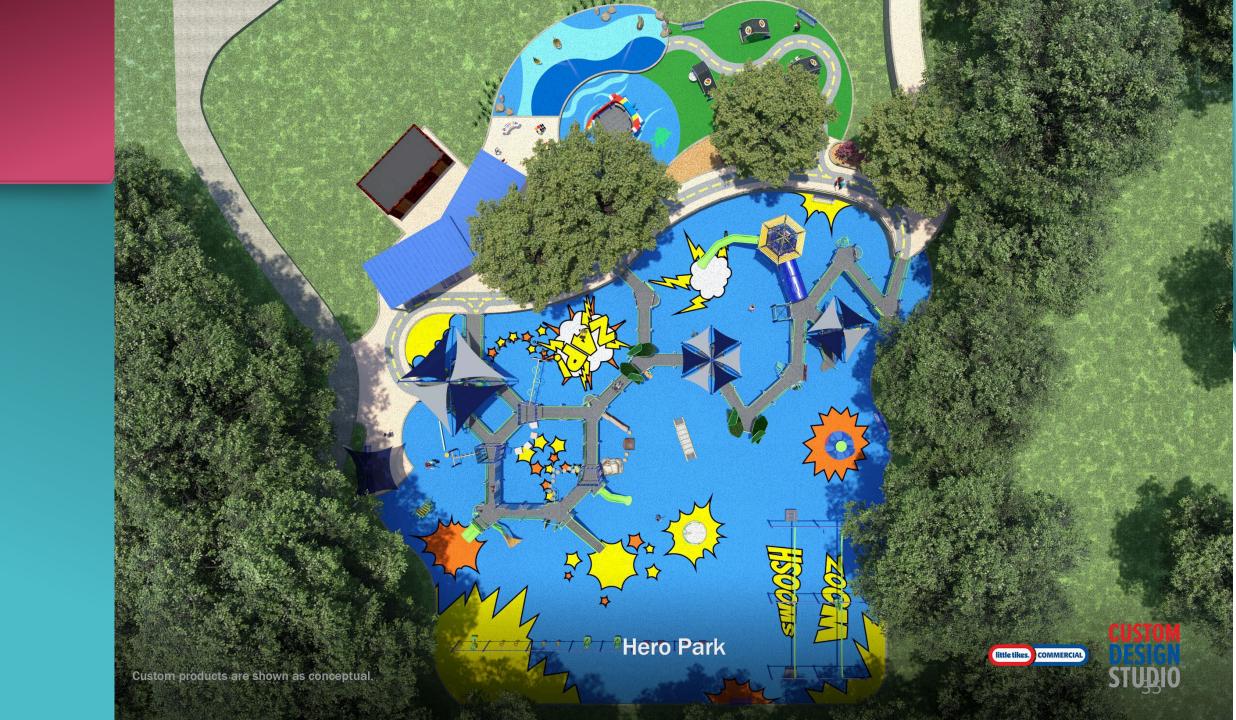

Sourcewell Cooperative Purchasing

What is it?

A cooperative purchasing program combines multiple buyers' requirements on a single contract to aggregate volume and raise the purchasing power of each participating entity.

Cooperative purchasing contracts can save buyers time and money. By the time a buyer is presented with the contract, a competitive bid process has already been completed in accordance with state-specific requirements, and there is no need to write or advertise the bid solicitation, receive and evaluate proposals, or negotiate the award.

The contracts also offer scale and negotiation leverage that helps buyers attain better and more affordable pricing. The transparency of these contracts ensures that the purchasing process is competitive and enhances buyers' confidence that they are getting a fair deal.

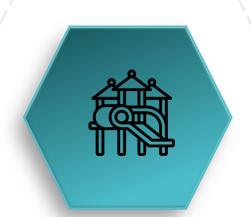

Request for Proposal Solicitation

A consultant will be required to conduct public engagement and fundraising. Estimated at about \$180K-\$200K.

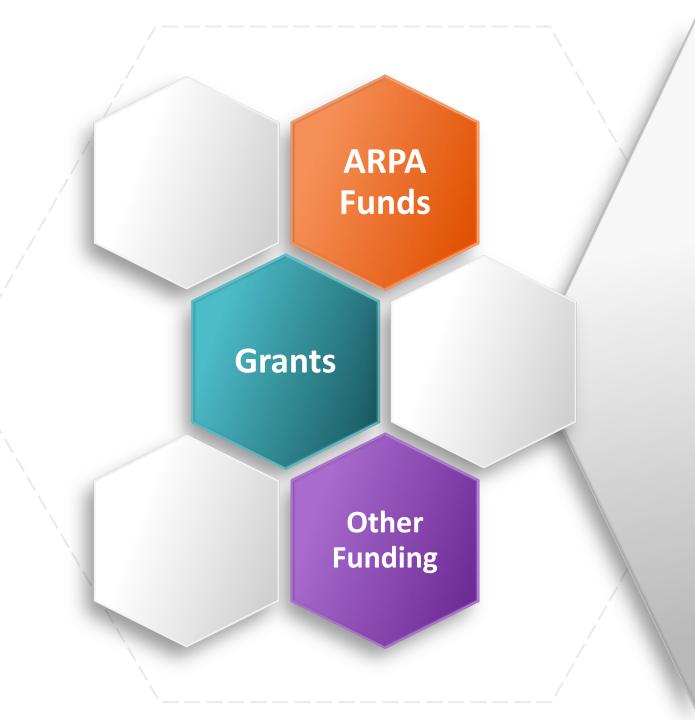

City Council rejected all bids related to the project and gave direction to install a temporary dog park, value engineer the plans and determine other funding sources for a permanent park.

Temporary dog park was opened. Other funding sources sought.

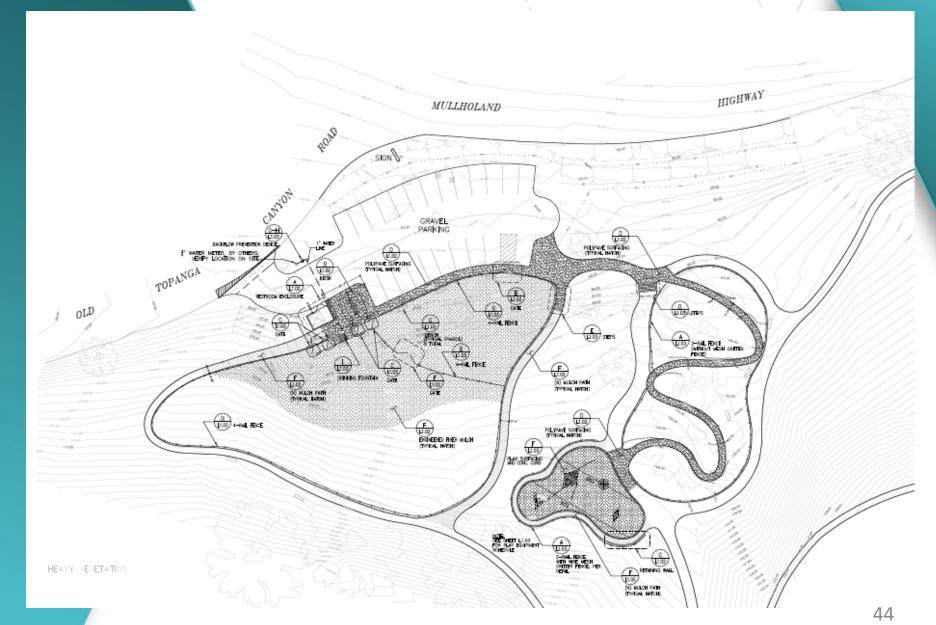

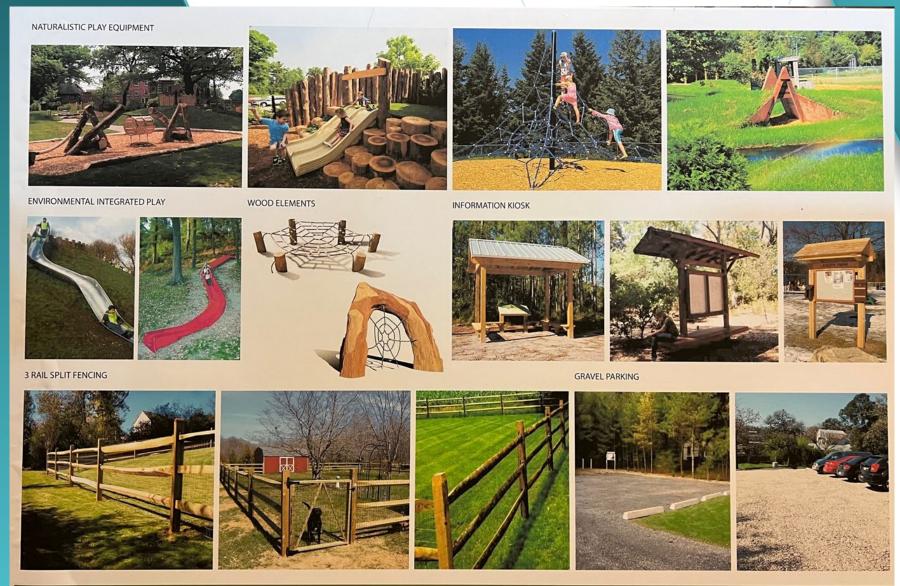
Staff has worked with the landscape architect to value engineer project and revise plans. An ADA accessible parking space was added. Staff re-applied for grant funding from RPOSD.

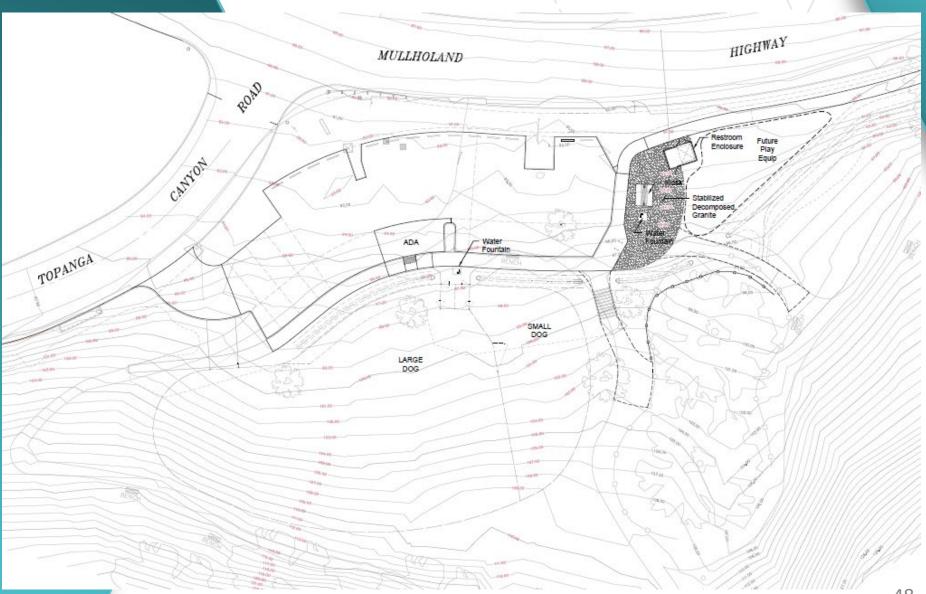

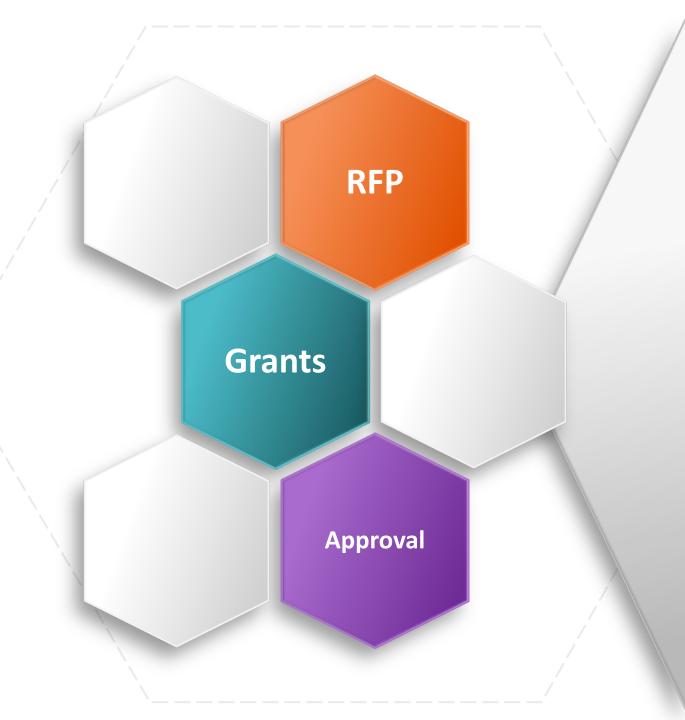
