Alert LA County is used by the Sheriff for emergency notifications. Nixle is used by the Sheriff and Fire Departments to provide emergency notices and alerts. To sign up, visit www.nixle.com or text zip codes you want alerts from to 888-777 and select LA Co Fire Dept Battalion 5 & Malibu/Lost Hills Sheriff Station.



Wireless Emergency Alerts: Emergency text messages can also be sent by alerting authorities to equipped mobile devices within range of cell towers broadcasting in the affected area. You do not have to sign up for WEA alerts. Visit ready.gov/alerts to find out if your mobile device is capable of receiving WEA alerts.

# **Earthquake Preparedness Tips**

# Prepare Your Household Before

- \* Secure items (water heater, major appliances, TV's, mirrors and picture frames.) Store heavy and breakable items on low shelves.
- \* Create a family emergency plan with an out-of-state contact.

  ID safe spots in each room.
- \* Make your emergency supply kits (home, work, car)
- \* Take a CERT class to be self-sufficient.
- \* Consider earthquake insurance.

### Survive During

- \* Drop, Cover and Hold on until the shaking stops.
- \* If indoors, stay there; if outdoors get into an open area away from trees, buildings, walls & power lines.
- \* If driving, pull over to side of road and stop.
- \* If in bed, stay there, hold on and protect your head.
- \* If in a high-rise building, expect fire alarms & sprinklers to go off. Do not use elevators.

#### Be Safe After

- \* Expect aftershocks
- \* Provide assistance to others, if trained.
- \* If in a damaged building, go outside and move away from the building.
- \* Do not enter damaged buildings.
- \* Check for gas & water leaks, broken electrical or sewage. If damaged, turn off at source & report to utility company. Check for downed power lines; warn others to stay away.
- \* Check building for cracks and damage.
- \* Turn on your portable radio and monitor situation.
- \* If you evacuate, leave a message at your home telling family members where they can find you.
- \* Use text messages instead of email. Text requires less bandwidth.

# **Wildfire Preparation Tips**

## Ready!-Get ready

- \* Create defensible space from house (200'), maintain landscaping.
- \* Keep house & yard clear of debris. Do brush clearance regularly.
- \* Safeguard or "Harden" your home to keep embers out keep property clear of debris (decks, patio cover, rain gutters).
- \* Have a family communications plan.
- \* Properly seal openings on house (vents, chimney).
- \* Know your neighbors!

### Set! - Be prepared

#### INDOORS:

- \* Keep shoes and flashlight handy.
- \* Create your wildfire plan.
- \* Close blinds if they are fire-resistant. Remove flammable window coverings. Leave doors/windows unlocked.
- \* Move flammable furniture to middle of room away from windows and doors
- Leave your lights on for firefighters.

#### **OUTDOORS:**

- \* Face car towards street with windows closed. Keep your keys handy.
- \* Close garage door, unlocked, disconnect garage door opener in case of power failure.
- \* Locate your pets and close the dog/cat door.
- \* Move combustible yard furniture away from house.
- \* Shut off gas meter, pilot lights and propane tanks. Move propane BBQ away from structures.
- \* Connect garden hoses, don't leave sprinklers on or water running.
- \* Have a ladder available.

## Go! - Act early

- \* Put emergency supply kit in your vehicle.
- \* Monitor social media and radio/TV.
- \* Leave if an evacuation order is given.
- \* Be prepared to evacuate those in need of special assistance and possibly pets and equine.
- \* An **Evacuation Order** is a directive from the Sheriff and/or Fire Department to leave your home or business immediately for your own safety.
- \* Failure to follow an evacuation order may result in injury or death.
