SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the Second Amendment to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for a Coordinated Integrated Monitoring Program (CIMP) and Nutrient Special Study in the Malibu Creek Watershed Management Area.

BACKGROUND:

On May 14, 2020, the Cities of Agoura Hills, Westlake Village, Hidden Hills, Calabasas, and the Los Angeles County Flood Control District (LACFCD) and County of Los Angeles entered into the MOU for cost sharing associated with the CIMP and Nutrient Special Study. The CIMP cost share is based on a land area cost sharing formula that has been used to conduct CIMP monitoring since 2016. The Nutrient Special Study cost-share was based upon land use, rather than land area, to target high, medium, low nutrient contribution areas, which are then applied to a weighted formula and flat fee. The first amendment to the MOU corrected an error in the calculation of open space land under the jurisdiction of state parks that was mistakenly assigned to the parties in the analysis. The first amendment was approved by City Council on May 26, 2021.

This agenda item addresses a recommendation to approve the Second Amendment to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with members of the Malibu Creek Watershed (MCW) for the sharing of the cost and management of the Coordinate Integrated Monitoring Program (CIMP) and continued management of the Nutrient Special Study.

DISCUSSION:

The MCW agencies propose to enter into a second amendment to the MOU. The second amendment extends the term of the MOU for an additional four fiscal years, and shares the cost for implementation of the CIMP as set forth in Exhibit B-1, Table A2 of Attachment A.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The total to implement the CIMP will be approximately \$459,130.90 for the fouryear term of the agreement. The below table demonstrates the fiscal year budget impact.

The City receives an estimated \$390,000 annually of Measure W municipal funding. Measure W guidelines allow the City to use as much as 30% of its municipal return monies on existing water quality projects or programs. The City's annual cost to implement the subject MOA could be paid in whole, or in part, by the municipal return. The City General Funds Account No. 10-313-5252-00 shall be adjusted accordingly.

SECOND AMENDMENT TO THE MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT, THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, AND THE CITIES OF AGOURA HILLS, CALABASAS, HIDDEN HILLS, AND WESTLAKE VILLAGE

REGARDING THE ADMINISTRATION AND COST SHARING FOR IMPLEMENTING THE COORDINATED INTEGRATED MONITORING PROGRAM AND NECESSARY REPORTS FOR THE MALIBU CREEK WATERSHED, AND SPECIAL STUDY TO ADDRESS TECHNICAL AND REGULATORY ISSUES IN ATTAINABILITY AND APPLICABILITY OF MALIBU CREEK WATERSHED NUTRIENT AND BENTHIC COMMUNITY TOTAL MAXIMUM DAILY LOADS

This SECOND AMENDMENT ("SECOND AMENDMENT"), made and entered into as of the date of the last signature set forth below by and between the LOS ANGELES COUNTY FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT ("LACFCD"), a body corporate and politic, the COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES ("COUNTY"), a political subdivision of the State of California, and the CITIES OF AGOURA HILLS, CALABASAS, HIDDEN HILLS AND WESTLAKE VILLAGE. Collectively, these entities shall be known herein as "PARTIES" or individually as "PARTY."

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the PARTIES entered into the original Memorandum of Understanding ("AGREEMENT" or "MOU") on May 14, 2020 regarding the administration and cost sharing for implementing the Coordinated Integrated Monitoring Program ("CIMP") and necessary reports for the Malibu Creek Watershed, and the Enhanced Watershed Management Plan ("EWMP") described Nutrient Special Study as part of the PARTIES compliance with the Malibu Creek Watershed Nutrient and Benthic Community Total Maximum Daily Loads ("NUTRIENT SPECIAL STUDY"); and

WHEREAS, in May of 2021 the PARTIES agreed to the First Amendment to correct an error in the calculation of open space ("VACANT") land under the jurisdiction of state parks was mistakenly assigned to the PARTIES in the analysis; and

WHEREAS, the PARTIES have agreed to extend the terms of this AGREEMENT for an additional four fiscal years, fund the annual California Stormwater Quality Association regional membership fee ("CASQA FEE") and to share costs in the continued implementation of the Malibu Creek CIMP as set forth in Table A2 of Exhibit B, that maintains the same land area-based cost sharing formula that was used to conduct CIMP monitoring since 2016.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual benefits to be derived by the PARTIES, and of the promises contained in this SECOND AMENDMENT and the AGREEMENT, the PARTIES agree as follows:

1. **Section 5 (Term)** of the AGREEMENT is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. Term. This MOU shall become effective on the last date of execution by a PARTY and shall remain in effect until June 30, 2027."

- 2. **Exhibit "B"** to the AGREEMENT is hereby amended by replacing said **Exhibit "B"** in its entirety with a new **Exhibit "B-1"** as set forth in **Attachment "A"** to this SECOND AMENDMENT, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein as though set forth in full.
- 3. Except for the changes specifically set forth herein, all other terms and conditions of the AGREEMENT shall remain in full force and effect.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council approve the Memorandum of Agreement Between the City of Calabasas and San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments and 19 Agencies Regarding the Administration and Cost Sharing for Implementing the Coordinated Integrated Monitoring Program (CIMP) and Watershed Management Plan (WMP) for the Upper Los Angeles River Watershed Management Area (ULAR WMA).

BACKGROUND:

On November 8, 2012, the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board (Regional Board) adopted Order R4-2012-0175, the Municipal National Pollutant Discharge Elimination Systems Permit (MS4 Permit), which became effective on December 28, 2012. This MS4 Permit incorporated 33 Total Maximum Daily Loads (TMDLs) and incentives for permittees willing to work cooperatively with

other agencies in watershed efforts. The 2021 MS4 Permit became effective on September 11, 2021, superseding the 2012 MS4 Permit.

On December 2, 2013, the City Council approved participation in the Upper Los Angeles River Enhanced Watershed Management Plan Group (ULAR Group) and authorized the City's participation in the development of a WMP and the associated CIMP. On August 5, 2015, the Regional Board approved the CIMP. Per the requirements of the 2021 MS4 Permit, a revised CIMP was submitted to the Regional Board on March 13, 2023 and is pending approval.

On April 20, 2016, the Regional Board approved the EWMP. Per the requirements of the 2021 MS4 Permit, a revised WMP was submitted to the Regional Board on June 28, 2021 and received a conditional approval on May 1, 2023.

In 2016, the City of Calabasas, and 18 other agencies entered into an agreement with the City of Los Angeles for the administration and cost sharing for the implementation of the CIMP for the ULAR Group. This agreement was set to expire on June 30, 2018. On May 23, 2018, the City of Calabasas, and 18 other agencies entered into an MOA with the City of Los Angeles for the administration and cost sharing for the implementation of the CIMP for the ULAR Group. The San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments (SGVCOG) was utilized for the contracting services and financial management of the MOA, as it provided various program efficiencies. This MOA will expire on June 30, 2023.

DISCUSSION:

The established cost sharing agreement has worked well. The proposed MOA is being presented to continue the administration and establish the cost share based on services used by each member of the Group. The SGVCOG will continue to manage the financial and contracting obligations of this MOA for an annual fee, included in the cost sharing of the MOA. Cost sharing will continue to be based off of land area percentage in the ULAR WMA; the City of Calabasas's land area percentage is 1.29%.

The City of Los Angeles has performed monitoring and WMP activities within the Los Angeles River Watershed for the last four years under the terms of the expiring MOA and proposes to continue to perform the monitoring and WMP services for the three (3) three-year term of the new MOA, which is through the fiscal year 2025-26.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The City's total cost to implement the CIMP will be approximately \$64,755 for the three-year term of the agreement. The below table demonstrates the fiscal year budget impact, as set forth in Exhibit B Table 1 of Attachment A.

The City receives an estimated \$390,000 annually of Measure W municipal funding. Measure W guidelines allow the City to use as much as 30% of its municipal return monies on existing water quality projects or programs. The City's annual cost to implement the subject MOA could be paid in whole, or in part, by the municipal return.

REQUESTED ACTION:

That the City Council approve the MOA regarding the administration and cost sharing for implementing the Coordinated Integrated Monitoring Program (CIMP) and Watershed Management Plan (WMP) in the amount of \$64,755 for the Upper Los Angeles River Watershed Management Area.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

This Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), including its attachments, exhibits and schedules, is made and entered into as of July 1st, 2023 by and between The SAN GABRIEL VALLEY COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS (SGVCOG), a California Joint Powers Authority, THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES (CITY), a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF ALHAMBRA, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF BURBANK, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF CALABASAS, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF GLENDALE, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF HIDDEN HILLS, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF LA CANADA FLINTRIDGE, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF MONTEBELLO, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF MONTEREY PARK, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF PASADENA, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF ROSEMEAD, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF SAN FERNANDO, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF SAN GABRIEL, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF SAN MARINO, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF SOUTH EL MONTE, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, a municipal corporation, THE CITY OF TEMPLE CITY, a municipal corporation, LOS ANGELES COUNTY FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT (LACFCD), a body corporate and politic, and the COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES (COUNTY), a political subdivision of the State of California. Collectively, these entities shall be known herein as PARTIES or individually as PARTY.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and the California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Los Angeles Region (Regional Board) have classified the Greater Los Angeles County Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System

(MS4) as a large MS4 pursuant to 40 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) section 122.26(b)(4) and a major facility pursuant to 40 CFR section 122.2; and

WHEREAS, the Regional Board adopted the 2012 National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System MS4 Permit No. R4-2012-0175 on November 8, 2012, which was readopted in the 2021 Regional Phase I MS4 Permit Order No. R4-2021-0105; and

WHEREAS, the 2012 MS4 Permit became effective on December 28, 2012, and required that the LACFCD, the COUNTY, and 84 of the 88 cities within the County comply with its prescribed elements; and

WHEREAS the 2021 MS4 Permit became effective on September 11, 2021, superseding the 2012 MS4 Permit, and requires the COUNTY, LACFCD, 85 cities within the coastal watersheds of Los Angeles County, the Ventura County Watershed Protection District, the County of Ventura, and 10 cities within Ventura County to comply with its prescribed elements; and

WHEREAS, the MS4 Permit identifies the PARTIES as MS4 permittees responsible for compliance with the Permit's requirements pertaining to the PARTIES' collective jurisdictional area in the Upper Los Angeles River Watershed Management Area as identified in Exhibit D of this MOA; and

WHEREAS, the CITY and the cities of Alhambra, Burbank, Calabasas, Glendale, Hidden Hills, La Canada Flintridge, Montebello, Monterey Park, Pasadena, Rosemead, San Fernando, San Gabriel, San Marino, South El Monte, South Pasadena, and Temple City and LACFCD and the COUNTY formed the Upper Los Angeles River Watershed Management Group (ULAR WMG) to collaborate on the Watershed Management Program (WMP) and the Coordinated Integrated Monitoring Program (CIMP) in accordance with the MS4 Permit, with the CITY serving as the ULAR WMG Lead Agency; and

WHEREAS, the PARTIES desired to collaborate on the development of a WMP and a CIMP in accordance with the MS4 Permit for a portion of the Upper Los Angeles River Watershed Management Area as identified in Exhibit D of this MOA to comply with all applicable monitoring requirements of the MS4 Permit; and

WHEREAS, the first WMP was submitted to the Regional Board by the PARTIES on June 25, 2015 and was approved by the Regional Board on April 20, 2016; and

WHEREAS, a revised WMP was submitted to the Regional Board on June 28, 2021 and is pending approval; and

WHEREAS, the first CIMP was submitted to the Regional Board by the PARTIES on April 30, 2015 and was approved by the Regional Board on August 5, 2015; and

WHEREAS, a revised CIMP was submitted to the Regional Board on March 13, 2023 and is pending approval; and

WHEREAS, the PARTIES have agreed to cooperatively share and fully fund the estimated costs of the implementation of the CIMP and WMP; and

WHEREAS, the PARTIES agree that each shall assume full and independent responsibility for ensuring its own compliance with the MS4 Permit notwithstanding this MOA; and

WHEREAS, the PARTIES desire to have the SGVCOG: (a) invoice and collect funds from each of the PARTIES to cover the costs of MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS and pay the CITY; (b) perform tasks identified in CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION in Exhibit A of this MOA;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual benefits to be derived by the PARTIES, and of the promises contained in this MOA, the PARTIES agree as follows:

Section 1. <u>Recitals</u>. The recitals set forth above are true and correct and fully incorporated into this MOA.

Section 2. <u>Purpose</u>. The purpose of this MOA is to cooperatively fund the MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS, as set forth in Exhibit A of this MOA.

Section 3. <u>Cooperation.</u> The PARTIES shall fully cooperate with one another to attain the purposes of this MOA.

Section 4. <u>Voluntary.</u> The PARTIES have voluntarily entered into this MOA for the implementation of the MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS, and to authorize the SGVCOG to administer the cost-sharing.

Section 5. <u>Term.</u> This MOA shall become effective on July 1, 2023 and shall remain in effect for three (3) years up to and including June 30, 2026. The MOA may be extended, through mutual agreement of the PARTIES.

Section 6. <u>Commitment.</u> Once effective, the PARTIES agree to uphold the promises contained in this MOA for the duration of the agreed upon term. The Parties agree that costs, expenses, fees, liabilities, and obligations incurred by the CITY in performing MONITORING SERVICES in accordance with Tables 2-2C(i) of Exhibit B and WMP-

RELATED TASKS in accordance with Table 3-3B of Exhibit B prior to the execution date of this MOA but after July 1, 2023, shall be cost-shared under this Agreement according to the amounts specified in Exhibit B and shall be included in the first invoice.

Section 7. THE PARTIES AGREE:

- a. Monitoring Services. The CITY will perform the MONITORING SERVICES as defined in Exhibit A.
- b. <u>WMP-Related tasks.</u> The CITY and the SGVCOG will perform the WMP-RELATED TASKS, as defined in Exhibit A.
- c. <u>Reporting.</u> Each PARTY hereto authorizes the CITY to prepare and submit reports to the Regional Board as required by the MS4 Permit. In addition, the CITY will submit to the PARTIES the data used to prepare the reports. This data will be transmitted electronically to all PARTIES and as requested by the Regional Board. The CITY will provide sufficient time to the PARTIES to review the prepared reports. The CITY shall consider incorporating such comments received and answering a PARTY's questions to the best of its abilities prior to its submittal to the Regional Board.
- d. <u>Contract Administration</u>. The SGVCOG will be responsible for CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION, as defined in Exhibit A.
- e. <u>Communication</u>. To the extent the PARTIES have communications related to CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION as defined in Exhibit A, such communications shall be directed to the SGVCOG. Communications concerning MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS under this Agreement shall be directed to the ULAR WMG lead agency. Written notice will be provided to the PARTIES should contact information from the SGVCOG and/or the ULAR WMG lead agency change.
- f. <u>Contracting.</u> The PARTIES contemplate that other individual NPDES permit holders may wish to participate in the MONITORING SERVICES without being a party to this MOA. In the event that another NPDES permittee wants to participate in the MONITORING SERVICES, the SGVCOG may enter into an individual separate agreement with such individual NPDES permittee. The individual NPDES permittee will not become a party to this MOA but will be responsible for its proportionate share of the costs for those MONITORING SERVICES. If other individual NPDES permit holders' participation modifies the PARTIES' proportionate cost share, each PARTIES' proportional payment obligation shall be modified administratively in Exhibit B.

Section 8. Invoicing and Payment.

- a. Invoicing. The SGVCOG will invoice all PARTIES, except the CITY, annually in amounts not exceeding the invoice amounts shown in Table 1 of Exhibit B. The annual invoices will be issued by the SGVCOG to the PARTIES in July of each calendar year for their proportional share of the estimated cost for MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS, including SGVCOG's Contact Management Fee, for the fiscal year, as shown in Exhibit B. The first invoice will be issued in July 2023 or upon the execution of this Agreement, whichever is later. The PARTIES hereby acknowledge and ratify services performed on or after the earlier of July 1st, 2023 or the date of the last signature of the PARTIES that are performed in accordance with the terms and conditions of the MOA. Such services shall be included in the first invoice and reimbursable pursuant to this MOA. The CITY will invoice the SGVCOG for tasks performed, deducting the CITY's cost portion for such tasks and the CITY's cost portion for the SGVCOG's program management fee. The CITY shall provide SGVCOG an accounting of the MONITORING SERVICES, and any WMP-RELATED TASKS completed during each annual payment term consistent with the format as shown in Exhibit E.
- b. <u>Annual Payment.</u> Each PARTY, excluding the CITY, shall pay the SGVCOG for their invoice within sixty (60) days of receipt of the invoice from the SGVCOG.
- c. <u>Late Payment Penalty</u>. Any payment that is not received within sixty (60) days following receipt of the invoice from SGVCOG shall be subject to a late payment of 10%. Interest on any late payments shall accrue at the rate of 1% per month for each month a payment is past due.
- d. <u>Delinquent Payments</u>. A payment not made within three hundred and sixty-five (365) days after receipt of the invoice from the SGVCOG shall result in the SGVCOG notifying the Regional Board and the PARTIES that the delinquent PARTY is no longer a participating member of the CIMP or WMP. The PARTY shall be deemed to have withdrawn from this MOA and the remaining PARTIES' cost share allocation shall be adjusted in accordance with the cost allocation formula in Table 1 of Exhibit B. Withdrawal shall not relieve a PARTY's obligation to pay its proportionate share of costs that were due at the time of the deemed withdrawal.
- e. <u>Contingency</u>. Each PARTY's annual invoice will include a contingency of fifteen percent (15%) for MONITORING SERVICES and fifteen percent (15%) for WMP-RELATED TASKS, as shown in Exhibit B. Contingency funds will be held by SGVCOG until such time as they are needed. Contingency funds that are used will be applied to each PARTY based on its proportional share. No PARTY will be

obligated to pay for additional expenditures which exceed its contingency amounts without an amendment to this MOA.

- Monitoring Services Contingency. The CITY shall have access to the MONITORING SERVICES Contingency, for paying for or otherwise implementing the MONITORING SERVICES defined in Exhibit A of this MOA. The CITY shall notify the PARTIES before use of the MONITORING SERVICES Contingency is appropriate or required as soon as practicable but any failure to notify any PARTY or the PARTIES shall not alter, eliminate, or affect the CITY's right to payment. The CITY will indicate the amount of MONITORING SERVICES Contingency used in its applicable invoice(s) to the SGVCOG for implementation of the MONITORING SERVICES. Should the CITY determine in its reasonable discretion that the SERVICES Contingency not MONITORING be MONITORING SERVICES, the PARTIES may administratively shift these funds to be used for WMP-RELATED TASKS and do so using the process defined in Section 9(c).
- ii. WMP-Related Tasks Contingency. The PARTIES may utilize WMP-RELATED TASKS Contingency to complete projects consistent with the WMP-RELATED TASKS defined in Exhibit A. To utilize WMP-RELATED TASKS Contingency, the ULAR WMG shall discuss the proposed activity and the ULAR WMG will come to a majority consensus, using the process defined in Section 9(c), as to whether to move forward with the use of WMP-RELATED TASKS Contingency and the process for implementation. The SGVCOG shall utilize the WMP-RELATED TASKS Contingency to reimburse the entity responsible for administering the approved WMP-RELATED TASK funded by the WMP-RELATED TASKS Contingency. Should the WMP-RELATED TASKS Contingency not be necessary for WMP-RELATED TASKS, the PARTIES may administratively shift these funds to be used for MONITORING SERVICES, using the process defined in Section 9(c).
- f. Shifting of Funds. The PARTIES may shift funds collected under this MOA between MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS administratively, without an amendment to this MOA, provided that the overall amount does not exceed the total not-to-exceed amount of this MOA or a PARTY'S annual proportional cost, as set forth in Table 1 of Exhibit B, and if approved by a majority consensus, using the process defined in Section 9(c). Should the CITY require a shift in funds between MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS in order to implement the MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS, it shall notify the SGVCOG before shifting these funds.

- g. <u>Contract Management Fee</u>. The SGVCOG will receive a Contract Management Fee of \$100,000 per year for administration of this MOA by the SGVCOG. Each PARTY will be assessed its proportionate share of the annual Contract Management Fee as shown in Table 4 of Exhibit B.
- h. Reconciliation of this MOA. At the end of the MOA, the SGVCOG will provide the PARTIES with an accounting of actual expenditures, consistent with the format as shown in Exhibit E, within ninety (90) days. Any unexpended funds held by SGVCOG at the termination of this MOA will be rolled-over to cover expenses in any subsequent MOA. PARTIES may request in writing a refund or credit of any unexpended funds by the SGVCOG, in accordance with the distributed cost formula set forth in Table 1 of Exhibit B.

Section 9. THE PARTIES FURTHER AGREE:

- a. <u>Documentation</u>. The PARTIES agree to promptly provide at no cost to the CITY all requested information and documentation in their possession that the CITY, in its discretion, deems to be necessary or helpful for the performance of the MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS.
- b. Access. During the term of this MOA on an as-needed basis, each PARTY shall allow the CITY or its contractor reasonable access and entry to land, facilities and structures owned, operated, or controlled by the PARTY, which access and entry are necessary or helpful for the CITY or its contractor to perform MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS (FACILITIES). The FACILITIES shall include but not be limited to the PARTY's storm drains, channels, catch basins, and similar, provided, however, that prior to entering any of the PARTIES FACILITIES, the CITY or its contractor, as applicable, shall provide seventy-two (72) hours advance written notice of entry to the applicable PARTY, or in the cases where seventy-two (72) hours' advance written notice is not possible, such as in cases of unforeseen wet weather, the CITY or its contractor shall provide written notice to the applicable PARTY as early as reasonably possible. Any PARTY, including LACFCD, agrees to provide the CITY or its contractor a "no-fee" Access Permit to its FACILITIES. This Access Permit does not cover any fees that may be required for Construction Permits for the installation of permanent monitoring equipment. The CITY shall secure any required necessary permits prior to entry.
- c. <u>Consensus</u>. The PARTIES agree that consensus in the ULAR WMG will be determined by a two-thirds supermajority (66.66%) voting of the ULAR WMG members based on each PARTY's percentage land area of the Watershed as shown in Exhibit D. Consensus shall be reached using an email vote of ULAR WMG members. Any PARTY that does not respond to a vote within five business days, shall be considered to support the majority consensus.

- d. <u>Participation</u>. Each PARTY shall designate an individual to provide representation at the ULAR WMG that is authorized to provide official input on behalf of the PARTY. Each PARTY shall ensure that a representative attends the ULAR WMG meetings and, if necessary, responds to email communication.
- e. Additional Activities. The PARTIES agree that additional activities may arise in the course of implementing this MOA, and there may be interest in utilizing funds collected through this MOA or pursuing additional funds, including but not limited to the Safe Clean Water Program, to complete those projects. The ULAR WMG, led by the ULAR WMG Lead Agency, shall discuss and determine additional activities to be completed and the implementation approach to completing those projects. The ULAR WMG will determine which activities to pursue in accordance with the consensus process defined in Section 9(c). Any other PARTY that does not desire to participate in an additional activity can submit a written request to the SGVCOG that they do not desire to be part of the activity. The non-participating PARTY will not be responsible for its proportionate share of funds to complete the additional project, and the cost will be recalculated amongst the remaining PARTIES.

Section 10. <u>Indemnification.</u> Each PARTY shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless each other PARTY, on a pro rata basis, including its special districts, their member agencies, elected and appointed officers, employees, agents, attorneys, and designated volunteers from and against any and all liability, including, but not limited to, demands, claims, actions, fees, costs, and expenses (including reasonable attorneys and expert witness fees), arising from or connected with this MOA; provided, however, that no PARTY shall indemnify another PARTY for that PARTY's own negligence or willful misconduct.

Section 11. Termination

a. <u>Noticing</u>. Any PARTY may withdraw from this MOA for any reason, in whole or part, by giving the SGVCOG and the Regional Board thirty (30) days written notice thereof. Withdrawing PARTIES shall remain wholly responsible for their proportional share of the costs of MONITORING SERVICES and WMP-RELATED TASKS for any fiscal year for which the PARTY has not withdrawn. Withdrawing PARTIES shall not be entitled to any refunds. Each PARTY shall also be responsible for the payment of its own fines, penalties or costs incurred as a result of the non-performance of the CIMP and/or WMP. Upon withdrawal by the SGVCOG, the PARTIES shall meet and confer to designate an alternate organization to accept the SGVCOG's responsibilities under this MOA.

- b. <u>Default</u>. If a PARTY fails to comply with any of the terms or conditions of this MOA, that PARTY shall forfeit its rights to the work completed through this MOA, but no such forfeiture shall occur unless and until the defaulting PARTY has first been given notice of its default and a reasonable opportunity to cure the alleged default
- c. Equipment Ownership. Devices such as automatic sampling stations inclusive of a cabinet, sampling equipment, ancillary devices, power supplies (EQUIPMENT) may be installed to implement the CIMP. Any PARTY voluntarily terminating membership will not be entitled to a refund for the portion of the share paid to acquire and to operate the EQUIPMENT nor for the remaining value of the EQUIPMENT, if any. The operational life of such EQUIPMENT is approximately seven years, and after which it may be obsolete or may require major remodel or replacement of electrical and mechanical components costing equivalent to a purchase of a new EQUIPMENT. The remaining PARTIES agree to own, operate and maintain and or replace the EQUIPMENT.

Section 12. General Provisions

- a. Notices. Any notices, bills, invoices, or reports relating to this MOA, and any request, demand, statement, or other communication required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing and shall be delivered to the representatives of the PARTIES at the addresses set forth in Exhibit C attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. PARTIES shall promptly notify each other of any change of contact information, including personnel changes, provided in Exhibit C. Written notice shall include notice delivered via e-mail or fax. A notice shall be deemed to have been received on (a) the date of delivery, if delivered by hand during regular business hours, or by confirmed facsimile or by e-mail; or (b) on the third (3rd) business day following mailing by registered or certified mail (return receipt requested) to the addresses set forth in Exhibit C.
- b. <u>Administration.</u> For the purposes of this MOA, the PARTIES and SGVCOG hereby designate as their respective representatives the persons named in Exhibit C. The designated representatives, or their respective designees, shall administer the terms and conditions of this MOA on behalf of their respective entities. Each of the persons signing below on behalf of a PARTY or the SGVCOG represents and warrants that he or she is authorized to sign this MOA on behalf of such entity.
- c. <u>Relationship of the Parties</u>. The PARTIES to this MOA are, and shall at all times remain as to each other, wholly independent entities. No PARTY shall have power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability on behalf of any other PARTY unless expressly provided to the contrary by this MOA. No employee, agent, or officer of a PARTY shall be deemed for any purpose whatsoever to be an agent, employee, or officer of another PARTY.

- d. <u>Amendment.</u> The terms and provisions of this MOA may not be amended, modified, or waived, except by an instrument in writing signed by all non-delinquent PARTIES and the SGVCOG. Such amendments may be executed by those individuals listed in Exhibit C or by a person authorized to execute such amendment on behalf of each PARTY.
- e. <u>Law to Govern.</u> This MOA is governed by, interpreted under, and construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California. In the event of litigation related to this MOA, venue in the State Superior Court or Federal District Court shall lie exclusively in the County of Los Angeles.
- f. No Presumption in Drafting. The PARTIES to this MOA agree that the general rule that an MOA is to be interpreted against the PARTY drafting it, or causing it to be prepared shall not apply.
- g. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this MOA shall be determined by any court to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable to any extent, then the remainder of this MOA shall not be affected, and this MOA shall be construed as if the invalid, illegal, or unenforceable provision had never been contained in this MOA.
- h. <u>Entire Agreement.</u> This MOA constitutes the entire agreement of the PARTIES to this MOA with respect to the subject matter hereof.
- i. <u>Waiver</u>. Waiver by any PARTY to this MOA of any term, condition, or covenant of this MOA shall not constitute a waiver of any other term, condition, or covenant. Waiver by any PARTY to this MOA of any breach of the provisions of this MOA shall not constitute a waiver of any other provision, nor a waiver of any subsequent breach or violation of any provision of this MOA.
- j. <u>Counterparts</u>. This MOA may be executed in any number of counterparts, which execution may be by electronic means as defined in Civil Code section 1633.2 and each of which shall be an original, but all of which taken together shall constitute but one and the same instrument, provided, however, that such counterparts shall have been delivered to all PARTIES to this MOA.
- k. All PARTIES to this MOA have been represented by counsel in the preparation and negotiation of this MOA. Accordingly, this MOA shall be construed according to its fair language.

EXHIBIT A MOA Scope of Work

The purpose of this MOA is to facilitate compliance by the ULAR WMG with the MS4 Permit. The tasks below outline the broadly-expected work anticipated to comply with the Permit.

MONITORING SERVICES

This includes any and all tasks required to comply with the monitoring requirements established in the MS4 Permit and associated documents. This includes but is not limited to implementation of the ULAR CIMP (Coordinated Integrated Monitoring Program), which includes but is not limited to the following activities:

- Receiving Water Monitoring
- Stormwater Outfall Monitoring
- Non-Stormwater Outfall Monitoring
- Urban Lakes Monitoring
- Data Management
- Capital, Operation, and Maintenance Activities
- Purchasing, maintaining, and replacing equipment (capital costs) necessary for monitoring activities
- Development of the monitoring sections to be included in the Annual Report (e.g. trends analysis, Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) attainment, summary of monitoring activities)
- Annual Reconciliation of the MONITORING SERVICES under the MOA.
- This work may include additional activities and requirements based upon the March 2023 CIMP revisions, any other future CIMP revision, and subsequent requirements for the Regional Board.

The City is responsible for completing the MONITORING SERVICES in this MOA, including by utilizing consultant support services.

WMP-RELATED TASKS

This includes any and all tasks required to comply with the MS4 Permit, as well as other work that is determined to advance the cities' efforts in complying with the MS4 Permit. The ULAR WMG is required to complete the following activities as part of the ULAR Watershed Management Program (WMP). This includes but is not limited to the sub-tasks defined below:

- Annual Reporting (including the WMP Progress Report)
- Report of Waste Discharge (ROWD)
- Adaptive Management
- Trash Monitoring and Reporting Plan (TMRP)
- WMP Revisions
- Website management (lastormh2o.org)
- California Stormwater Quality Association (CASQA) Membership

Contracts regarding WMP-RELATED TASKS will be administered by the SGVCOG utilizing a consultant(s) selected in coordination with the ULAR WMG, unless otherwise determined by the ULAR WMG. The lead agency of the ULAR WMG will provide subject-matter expertise and project management support to the SGVCOG and its consultants for the purposes of completing this task.

CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION

This includes any and all tasks associated with administering this MOA, including but not limited to the following:

- Facilitate the development of agreements and subsequent amendments for the ULAR WMG.
- Manage procurements, contracting, and contract administration for consultants and contractors, with the lead agency of the ULAR WMG providing subject-matter expertise and project management support. This could include establishing and managing a bench of technical consultants that could be utilized by any PARTY.
- Distribute invoices and collect payment from PARTIES.
- Pay invoices from the City, upon receipt of invoice, as established in Section 8(a) of the MOA.
- Manage the MOA budget in coordination with the lead agency of the ULAR WMG.
- Facilitate the preparation of ULAR WMG administrative procedures by ULAR WMG and ensure compliance with these procedures.
- Annual Reconciliation of WMP-RELATED TASKS under the MOA.

The CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION tasks will be completed by the SGVCOG.

Additional tasks may be identified in the process of complying with the Permit, at which point the ULAR WMG would determine the optimal approach to ensuring that the ULAR WMG remains in compliance with any and all aspects of the MS4 Permit and its associated documents.

EXHIBIT D Upper Los Angeles River Watershed

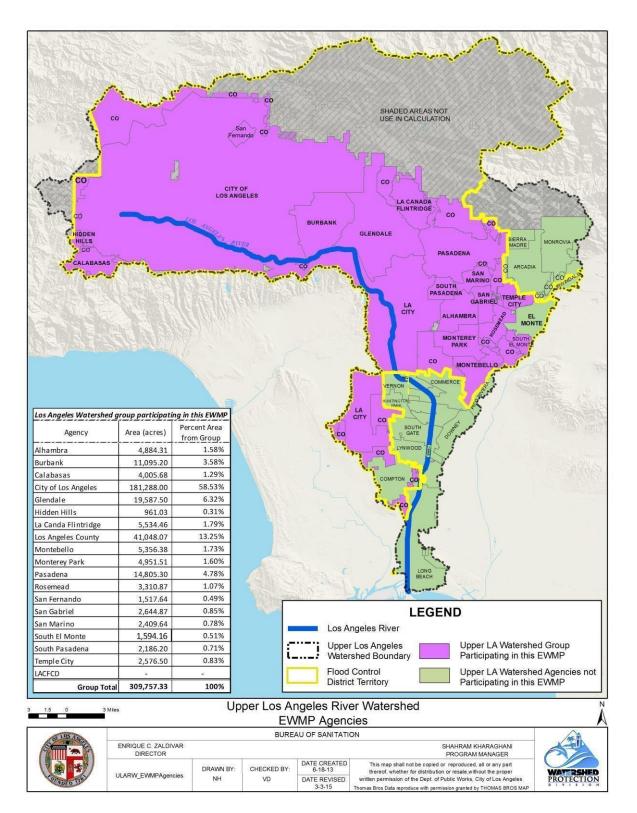

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff is providing this end-of-year budget update to City Council for discussion. Staff is proposing certain changes to the adopted budget at this time to reflect more accurately revenue and expenditure estimates. City staff is requesting City Council adopt the attached resolution of appropriation to reflect these changes.

BACKGROUND:

The City Council adopted the fiscal year (FY) 2022-23 budget on June 22, 2022. The mid-year budget report was presented to the City Council on March 23, 2023. This end-of-year report and resolution makes certain increases to appropriations to reflect actual expenses versus the budget estimates.

DISCUSSION:

There are no adjustments proposed for the General Fund.

The adjustments below are for the Transit Fund and the Capital Improvement Fund.

TRANSIT FUND (Fund 29)

The Transit Fund receives its revenues from: Prop A, Prop C, Measure R and Measure M. Each one of these four voter approved taxes are a one-half cent (½%) Sales Tax on transactions in Los Angeles County for a total of 2% Sales Tax dedicated to public transportation. Staff is adjusting the transfers from these sources into the Transit Fund. The Transit fund requires budget adjustments to increase/(decrease) the funding for six programs/projects:

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND (Fund 40)

There are two capital improvement projects that need to have their appropriations increased or decreased for FY 2022-23. Staff is adjusting the Transfers as well. The projects are:

Increase of \$10,000. Source of funding are development impact fees and grants.

Mulholland

Increase of \$1,500,000. Source of funding is Measure M.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Appropriations totaling \$1,564,000 as per the attached resolution from various funds as explained above.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council authorizes to approve Amendment Number 2 to allow for the extension of the professional services agreement with Cooksey's Lifeguard and Swim Academy, LLC. until November 15, 2023, and increase the not to exceed amount \$80,000 for a total of \$280,000. This amendment will allow the Calabasas Tennis and Swim Center to remain fully open for swim classes, lessons, swim team, family swim and lap swim.

BACKGROUND:

Due to the fact that the Community Services Department has been experiencing a staffing shortage, specifically with the Lifeguard position, on April 27, 2022 a Professional Services Agreement for \$110,000 with Cooksey's Lifeguard and Swim Academy, LLC. was approved by the City Council for a (1) one-year term for lifeguard services at the Calabasas Tennis and Swim Center. While the Community Services Department has made great strides through a variety of creative efforts to attract and hire new staff, the Department still does not have

enough City Lifeguards to handle a full schedule of aquatics programming at the Calabasas Tennis and Swim Center, and because of this, the agreement was amended in January of this year. So far in 2023, the Community Services Department has hired 12 new lifeguards, however most of them are high school students with limited experience. The City trains the new Lifeguards through a certified Red Cross Lifeguard Training Course, which prepares them to be entry level Lifeguards, but the City has not been able to attract the experienced Lifeguards needed to serve in the Senior Guard, Head Guard and Water Safety Instructor positions. These guards are needed to teach swim lessons to the public and oversee the Junior Guards.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

As we experienced last Summer, there is once again a nation-wide shortage of Lifeguards that is affecting cities, counties and public beaches across the country. Where many other agencies have dealt with this shortage by reducing or even eliminating pool services, or posting "No Lifeguard on Duty" signs and advising the public to swim at their own risk and closely monitor their children, The City of Calabasas is continuing to provide full programming, lessons and special events to our residents while taking every needed precaution to keep our patrons safe.

Cooksey's Lifeguard and Swim Academy, LLC. will continue to provide Senior Lifeguards, Head Lifeguards and Water Safety Instructors to supplement the City Lifeguards for swim lessons (our swim lessons offering has doubled from last summer), camps, events, swim team, Aqua Fit, family swim, masters swim, and open swim until November of 2023. City staff will supervise the contracted Lifeguards and contract.

Staff will continue to recruit Lifeguards and, if successful, place them on the schedule as required. The pool will close for 3-4 months beginning November 1, 2023 to complete the approved Capital Improvement Program pool renovations. During that time, the Community Services Department will conduct a formal bid process for additional lifeguard services, if needed for the upcoming year.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

An additional \$80,000 spent from the Contractual Services account, which will be offset with savings in Hourly Salaries account.

REQUESTED ACTION:

That the City Council authorizes to approve Amendment Number 2 to allow for the extension of the professional services agreement with Cooksey's Lifeguard and

Swim Academy, LLC. until November 15, 2023, and increase the not to exceed amount \$80,000 for a total of \$280,000.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council hold a public hearing with respect to the increased assessments and levy of assessments in connection with Landscape Lighting Act District Nos. 22, 24, 27 & 32. Once City Council has considered all oral and written testimony and protests with respect to the proposed assessments for Fiscal Year 2023-24, it can close the public hearing.

Adopt Resolution 2023-1861, approving a Final Engineer's Report in connection with the Landscape Lighting Act District Nos. 22, 24, 27, & 32 and confirming diagrams and assessment for such districts for the Fiscal Year 2023-2024.

BACKGROUND:

The Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972 regulates the annual administration of special assessment districts. The City of Calabasas administers four Landscape Lighting Act Districts, as follows:

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22 - Calabasas Park Area (LLAD 22)

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 24 – Lost Hills Road & The Saratogas (LLAD 24)

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 27 – Las Virgenes Road (LLAD 27)

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 32 – Agoura Road/Lost Hills Road

Commercial District (LLAD 32)

On May 10, 2023 the City Council approved resolutions initiating the annual proceedings in connection with these districts and declaring the council's intention to impose assessments for Fiscal Year 2023-2024.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The purpose of this agenda item is to hold a public hearing on the annual landscape districts assessments and to adopt Resolution No. 2023-1861, approving the Final Engineer's Report in connection with the Landscape Lighting Act District Nos. 22, 24, 27, & 32 and Confirming Diagrams and Assessments for such districts.

The assessment units assigned to each parcel are used in the assessment formula to compute the assessment amount. If the zone has one single land use, then each parcel is assigned one assessment unit. Where more than one land use exists within a zone, traffic generation factors are used as a means to define the benefit a single-family residence receives as compared to an apartment or a commercial property. The following traffic generation factors for the City of Calabasas and resulting Assessment Units are incorporated in the Engineer's Report. The City provided updated Trip Generation Data in FY2023/2024, which results in a change in the assessment unit factor, causing the maximum assessment on Multi-Family Residential and Commercial property to exceed the maximum assessment allowed. Therefore, the assessment units utilized in years prior will be used in the calculation of the assessments for the current year and consideration for a 218 election to amend the maximum assessment will be presented for next year.

A 7.446% CPI adjustment to Landscape Lighting Act District Nos. 22, 24, 27 and 32 as allowed by the formation, and Proposition 218 process will be implemented.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The Landscape Lighting Act District Program is funded through dedicated special assessment funds.

WHEREAS, by its Resolution No. 2023-1861, the City Council declared its intention to levy and collect assessments for Fiscal Year 2023-24 in connection with Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22, Landscape Lighting Act District No. 24, Landscape Lighting Act District No. 27, and Landscape Lighting Act District No. 32 (collectively the "Districts" and each a "District") pursuant to the Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972 (California Streets & Highways Code Section 22500 et seq.) (the "Assessment Law"); and

WHEREAS, on June 28, 2023, the City Council held a full and fair public hearing at which all interested persons could give oral and written testimony with respect to the Fiscal Year 2023-24 assessment, which is at the same rate as in effect in Fiscal Year 2022-2023 plus 7.46% CPI inflation adjustment for Landscape Lighting Act Districts Nos. 22, 24, 27, and 32; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered all oral and written testimony and protests with respect to the proposed assessment for Fiscal Year 2023-24; and

WHEREAS, Willdan Financial Services filed a Final Report with the City Clerk for Fiscal year 2023-24 titled Final Engineer's Report for the Landscape Lighting Act Districts; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has received and reviewed the contents of the report; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to cause the levy and collection of assessments for Fiscal Year 2023-24 in the Districts;

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The forgoing recitals are each true and correct.

SECTION 2. The City Council hereby approves the Final Report of Willdan Financial Services, as Assessment Engineers, entitled Final Engineer's Report for the Landscape Lighting Act Districts, and dated June 28, 2023, which is on file in the

Office of the City Clerk and available for public inspection. Any protests against the proposed assessments for Fiscal Year 2023-24 are hereby overruled.

<u>SECTION 3</u>. The Diagram and Assessment contained within such Report is hereby approved pursuant to Section 22631 of the Assessment Law.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. The adoption of this Resolution constitutes the ordering of the levy and collection of the assessment within each of the Districts for Fiscal Year 2023-24.

<u>SECTION 5</u>. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this resolution and shall cause the same to be processed in the manner required by law.

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I. Introduction

The City of Calabasas (the "City") under the provisions of the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, Part 2 of Division 15 of the California Streets and Highways Code (the "1972 Act"), and the provisions of the California Constitution Article XIII D (the "Constitution"), annually levies and collects special assessments for the City's maintenance assessment districts designated as:

Landscaping Lighting Act District Nos. 22, 24, 27 & 32 (1972 Act Districts)

The County of Los Angeles formed the Landscaping Lighting Act Districts (the "Districts") pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 (Streets & Highways Code Section 22500et seq.), prior to the incorporation of the City of Calabasas. In July 1995, the County of Los Angeles transferred the following four Districts to the City of Calabasas:

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22 (Calabasas Park Area) (Formed in 1979)

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 24 (Lost Hills Road and The Saratogas) (Formed in 1984)

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 27 (Las Virgenes Road) (Formed in 1984)

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 32 (Agoura Road/Lost Hills Road Commercial District) (Formed in 1989)

This report presents the engineering analysis for the annual administration of the four Districts. Through the levy and collection of benefit assessments, the four Districts fund maintenance and operation of landscape improvements. For Fiscal Year 2023-24, Landscape Lighting Act District Nos. 22, 24, 27 and 32 assessments will be levied based on the previously approved methodology, at the rates indicated on page 25 through 29 of this report as recommended by the City of Calabasas' Chief Financial Officer. The assessments are levied on the basis of benefit, they are not considered a tax, and, therefore, are not governed by Article XIII A of the Constitution of the State of California. The assessments are governed by Articles XIII D of the Constitution.

In accordance with the 1972 Act, the Districts utilize benefit zones ("Zones") to address variations in the nature, location, and extent of the improvements that provide special benefits to parcels in the Districts. Within the boundaries of the Districts, parcels are assigned to various Zones each of which is associated with a set of improvements and/or type of improvements that provide special benefit to properties within that Zone.

These 1972 Act Districts fund landscape maintenance services and are funded by annual benefit assessments levied against each parcel in each District. The word "lighting" was apparently included in their names as a reference to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972.

HISTORICAL INFORMATION

In Fiscal Year 1997-98, assessment ballot proceedings were conducted pursuant to Proposition 218 (Articles XIII C and XIII D of the California Constitution) for each of the four Districts. There was not a majority protest against any of the assessments, and the assessment methodology was approved by the City Council. The approved methodology reserved to the City Council the right each year to implement an inflation adjustment in these Districts. Implementation of the annual inflation adjustment, which is based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI), does not constitute an assessment increase for purposes of Proposition 218, because landowners in the Fiscal Year 1997-98 assessment ballot and subsequent balloting's authorized these adjustments.



Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22

In Fiscal Year 2002-03, fifteen (15) parcels located in the City of Calabasas were annexed into the Commercial Area, Calabasas Road. The Assessor Parcel Numbers are as follows:

In Fiscal Year 2009-10, Zone 15, Park Sorrento Condominium HOA was detached from LLAD 22.

In Fiscal Year 2011-12, Zone 18, Calabasas Ridge HOA was detached from LLAD 22.

In Fiscal Year 2018-19, the District attempted to increase the assessment rate for Classic Calabasas Park. In compliance with Proposition 218, the proposed rate was submitted to the property owners via mailed ballots. The ballots were tabulated on June 18, 2018, where majority protest denied the increase in assessment.

In Fiscal Year 2019-20, the District proposed a rate increase for Classic Calabasas Park. In compliance with Proposition 218, the proposed rate increase was submitted to the property owners via mailed ballots. The ballots were tabulated on June 17, 2019 and 54% of the ballots returned were in favor of the rate increase.

For Fiscal Year 2022-23, the District proposed a rate increase for Las Villas HOA. In compliance with Proposition 218, the proposed rate increase was submitted to the property owners via mailed ballots. The ballots were tabulated on June 27, 2022, and ballots returned were not in favor of the increase.

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 24

In Fiscal Year 2000-01, Mira Monte (Tract No. 52150) (Assessor's Parcel No. 2064-004-91 and its successor parcels) was annexed into LLAD 24, and Calabasas View HOA, was detached from LLAD 24.

In Fiscal Year 2002-03, two hundred seventy (270) parcels in Saratoga Ranch and Saratoga Hills HOAs were annexed into LLAD 24.

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 27

In Fiscal Year 2016-17, the City of Calabasas, at the request of Mont Calabasas member homeowner association (HOA) Board of Directors, proposed annexing Mont Calabasas HOA Zone into Landscaping Lighting District No. 27 (LLAD27). In compliance with Proposition 218, the proposed annexation into the District and assessment was submitted to the property owners via mailed ballots. The ballots were tabulated at the June 22, 2016 Council Meeting and 77.78% of the ballots returned were in favor of annexation. By Resolution No. 2016-1504, the Council adopted Mont Calabasas annexation into District No. 27

In Fiscal Year 2019-20, the District proposed a rate increase for Mont Calabasas. In compliance with Proposition 218, the proposed rate increase was submitted to the property owners via mailed ballots. The ballots were tabulated on June 17, 2019 and 62.50% of the ballots returned were in favor of the rate increase. The Fiscal Year 2018-19 rate increased by 41.23% for Fiscal Year 2019-20, 2020-21 and 2021-22. In Fiscal Year 2022-23, the rate reverted back to the previously approved maximum rate including any inflationary adjustments.



Landscape Lighting Act District No. 32

In Fiscal Year 2000-01 Mira Monte (Tract No. 52150) (Assessor's Parcel No. 2064-004-91 and its successor parcels) was detached from LLAD 32 and annexed into LLAD 24.

ANNUAL CONSUMER PRICE INDEX ADJUSTMENT

The maximum assessment rate may increase each fiscal year based on the annual change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI), during the preceding year, for All Urban Consumers, for the Los Angeles-Long Beach-Anaheim areas, published by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics (or a reasonably equivalent index should the stated index be discontinued).

Assessments for the Districts are subject to an increase each year equal to the 12-month average percent change in the annual Consumer Price Index, All Urban Consumers, for the Los Angeles-Long Beach-Anaheim areas ("CPI"), from January 1st through December 31st of the fiscal year prior to the subject fiscal year. Future annual budgets within this limit may be approved by the City Council without additional property owner ratification. A CPI increase may be exceeded only by a majority parcel owner approval. For fiscal year 2023-24, Landscape Lighting Act District Nos. 22, 24, 27, and 32 maximum assessment rates will be increased by 7.446% annual CPI inflation adjustment per the City of Calabasas' Chief Financial Officer.

For fiscal year 2023-24, the maximum assessment rates will continue to increase by the stated CPI above. Districts 22, 24, 27 and 32 will be charged at the maximum assessment rate.

REPORT CONTENT AND ANNUAL PROCEEDINGS

This Engineer's Annual Report (the "Report") has been prepared pursuant to Chapter 1, Article 4 and Chapter 3 of the 1972 Act, and presented to the City Council for their consideration and approval of the proposed improvements and services to be provided within the District and the levy and collection of annual assessments related thereto for fiscal year 2023-24. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, portion, or Zone, of this Report is, for any reason, held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions of the Report and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, portion, or zone, thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, portions, or zones, might subsequently be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

This Report outlines the Districts Zone structures, the improvements, and the proposed assessments to be levied in connection with the benefits the properties will receive from the maintenance and servicing of the District improvements for fiscal year 2023-24. The annual assessments to be levied on properties within the Districts provide a funding source for the continued operation and maintenance of landscaping improvements within various zones of benefit ("Zones") that provide special benefits to the properties within the Districts and each respective Zone. Each fiscal year, the City establishes the assessments for the Districts based on an estimate of the costs to maintain, operate and service the improvements and based upon available revenues including fund balances, general benefit contributions and additional City contributions and assessment limits. The costs of the improvements and the proposed annual assessments budgeted and assessed against properties within the Districts may include, but are not limited to the estimated expenditures for regular annual maintenance and repairs; incidental expenditures related to the operation and administration of the District; deficits or surpluses from prior years; revenues from other sources; and the collection of funds for operational reserves or for periodic maintenance and improvement rehabilitation projects as authorized by the 1972 Act. Each parcel is assessed proportionately for only those improvements, services and expenses for which the parcel will receive special benefit.

Each District outlined in this Report is a reflection of the various improvements and the types of improvements and services to be provided by the Districts for the properties that are directly associated with and benefit from those improvements. The net annual cost to provide the improvements for each District are allocated to the benefiting properties within that District using a weighted method of apportionment (refer to Assessment Methodology, Method of



Apportionment) that calculates the proportional special benefit and assessment for each parcel as compared to other properties that benefit from the improvements in the Districts and services.

The word "parcel," for the purposes of this Report, refers to an individual property assigned its own Assessor's Parcel Number ("APN") by the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office. The Los Angeles County Auditor/Controller uses Assessor's Parcel Numbers and specific Fund Numbers to identify properties to be assessed on the tax roll for the District assessments.

At a noticed annual Public Hearing, the City Council will accept all public comments and written protests regarding the District and the annual levy of assessments. Based on those public comments and written protests, the City Council may order amendments to the Report or confirm the Report as submitted. Following final approval of the Report and confirmation of the assessments the Council will, by Resolution, order the improvements to be made and confirm the levy and collection of assessments pursuant to the 1972 Act. The assessments as approved will be submitted to the Los Angeles County Auditor/Controller to be included on the property tax roll for each parcel.

As required by the 1972 Act, this Engineer's Report describes the improvements to be provided, maintained and serviced by the District, an estimated budget for the District improvements, and the proposed assessments to be levied upon each assessable lot or parcel within the District for fiscal year 2023-24.

While the budgets outlined in this Report reflect the estimated costs necessary to fully and adequately provide for the maintenance and operation of the improvements within the District, many of these estimated costs and associated services cannot be funded by the current special benefit assessment revenues and the City contribution for those improvements or portions thereof determined to be general benefits. Therefore, in addition to the City's contribution for general benefit costs, in some Districts, at the discretion of the City Council, the City may also provide additional funding to support the improvements and/or implement service reductions. To fully fund the improvements that are considered special benefits, it may be necessary in the future to increase assessment revenues which would require the support of the property owners for new or increased assessments through a ballot proceeding conducted under the provisions of the California Constitution Article XIII D.



II. Plans and Specifications

The lines and dimensions of each lot or parcel within the Districts are those lines and dimensions shown on the maps of the Assessor of the County of Los Angeles for the year when this Report is prepared. The Assessor's maps and records are incorporated by reference herein and made part of this Report.

Plans and specifications showing each District's exterior boundaries; and indicating the general nature, location and extent of improvements.

Several items related to the Districts are on file and available for review at the City of Calabasas Public Works Department, Landscape Maintenance Division office.

For Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22, each member of the HOA has an individual maintenance contract. The member HOAs have been designated as "Zones"; each Zone has been given a number. The City has on file for each Zone a maintenance contract listing the work contracted and a diagram(s) detailing maintenance service work areas.

IMPROVEMENT AUTHORIZED BY THE 1972 ACT

As applicable or may be applicable to the Districts, the 1972 Act defines improvements to mean one or any combination of the following:

- The installation or planting of landscaping.
- The installation or construction of statuary, fountains, and other ornamental structures and facilities.
- The installation or construction of public lighting facilities.
- The installation or construction of any facilities which are appurtenant to any of the foregoing, or which are
 necessary or convenient for the maintenance or servicing thereof, including, but not limited to, grading,
 clearing, removal of debris, the installation or construction of curbs, gutters, walls, sidewalks, or paving, or
 water, irrigation, drainage, or electrical facilities.
- The maintenance or servicing, or both, of any of the foregoing.
- The acquisition of any existing improvement otherwise authorized pursuant to this section.

Incidental expenses associated with the improvements including, but not limited to:

- The cost of preparation of the report, including plans, specifications, estimates, diagram, and assessment;
- The costs of printing, advertising, and the publishing, posting and mailing of notices;
- Compensation payable to the County for collection of assessments;
- Compensation of any engineer or attorney employed to render services;
- Any other expenses incidental to the construction, installation, or maintenance and servicing of the improvements;
- Any expenses incidental to the issuance of bonds or notes pursuant to Section 22662.5.
- Costs associated with any elections held for the approval of a new or increased assessment.

The 1972 Act defines "Maintain" or "maintenance" to mean furnishing of services and materials for the ordinary and usual maintenance, operation, and servicing of any improvement, including:

Repair, removal, or replacement of all or any part of any improvement.



- Providing for the life, growth, health, and beauty of landscaping, including cultivation, irrigation, trimming, spraying, fertilizing, or treating for disease or injury.
- The removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste.
- The cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti.

DESCRIPTION OF IMPROVEMENTS

As authorized by the 1972 Act, the improvements provided by the Districts and associated with each Zone incorporate various improvements that are maintained and serviced for the benefit of real property within the Districts. The maintenance of the improvements may also include various appurtenances that may include but is not limited to entry monuments; various types of fencing; retaining walls; ornamental lighting or other ornamental fixtures; signage; and irrigation, drainage, and electrical equipment. The work to be performed within each respective Zone may include but is not limited to (as applicable), the personnel, materials, equipment, electricity, water, contract services, repair and rehabilitation of the improvements and incidental expenses required to operate the District and provide the improvements and services for each Zone. The improvements provided within the District and for which parcels receive special benefits are generally described in the following

Note: The four Districts do not necessarily provide every service authorized under the 1972 Act. For example, while these Districts provide electrical current to power irrigation systems, fountains, landscape lighting, Calabasas Lake aeration systems, and Association Park lake sidewalk lighting, they do not fund LLAD residential or commercial district street lighting.

IMPROVEMENTS AND SERVICES WITHIN THE DISTRICTS

The purpose of the District is to fund the maintenance and servicing of parkway landscape improvements installed in connection with development of properties within the District. The landscape improvements maintained by each District are generally described as follows:

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22

LLAD 22 provides for the maintenance of landscape of the common areas and open space areas located within member homeowner associations (HOA) referred to as "Zones". The HOA common areas are either owned in common or privately owned, with easements granted to the District for landscape maintenance purposes. The maintenance of landscape also includes greenbelt and slope areas as well as annual weed abatement/brush clearance for fuel reduction/fire safety.

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 24

LLAD 24 provides maintenance of landscape within street right-of-way and open space areas. The open space areas include slopes and creek banks. Maintenance of landscape on streets within right-of-way includes parkways, center medians, adjacent turf areas, trees, and annual weed abatement/brush clearance for fuel reduction/fire safety.

Roadways with landscape in the public right-of-way includes landscaped center medians, trees, and adjacent turf areas that are conditions of development and are maintained by the District to soften and mitigate the impacts of traffic on the residential tracts within the District. The landscape improvements are located on the residential roadway serving the Malibu Lost Hills community, including Lost Hills Road south of Malibu Hills Road to Las Virgenes Road, Calabasas Hills Road, Meadow Creek Lane, portions of Las Virgenes Road, and designated slope areas along Las Virgenes Creek.

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 27

LLAD 27 provides maintenance of landscape within street right-of-way. Maintenance of landscape on streets within right-of-way includes parkways, center medians, and street trees.



The area of landscape improvements generally referred to as Las Virgenes Road are: On Las Virgenes Road, the east sidewalk and center medians beginning at 3560 Las Virgenes Road and continuing north to Thousand Oaks Blvd.; on Las Virgenes Road north of Thousand Oaks Blvd., the east sidewalk area north to the end of Las Virgenes Rd.; at the northwest corner of Thousand Oaks Blvd. and Ruthwood Drive the public right-of-way area located immediately behind the sidewalk; on the south side of Thousand Oaks Blvd., the sidewalk area from Las Virgenes Road to the flood control channel; and the sidewalk area on the north side of Thousand Oaks Blvd. from Las Virgenes Road to Ruthwood Drive.

For the Mont Calabasas HOA Zone, the improvements include the maintenance of Las Virgenes Road as described above and in addition, provides for the maintenance of landscape of common areas and open space areas located within the Zone. The HOA common areas are either owned in common or privately owned, with easements granted to the District for landscape maintenance purposes. The maintenance of landscape may also include greenbelt and slope areas, as well as annual weed abatement/brush clearance for fuel reduction/fire safety.

Landscape Lighting Act District No. 32

LLAD 32 provides maintenance of landscape within street right-of-way. Maintenance of landscape on streets within right-of-way includes center medians and street trees.

The landscape improvements maintained by the District are located on the major streets serving the Lost Hills Commercial Area, including Agoura Road from the west side of Malibu Hills Road to the eastern boundary of 26750 Agoura Road, Malibu Hills Road, Shadow Hills Road, and the portion of Lost Hills Road from Interstate 101 to the south side of Malibu Hills Road.



III. METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

Proposition 218 requires that a parcel's assessment may not exceed the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel. The Articles provide that only special benefits are assessable. The City must separate the general benefits from the special benefits conferred on a parcel; a special benefit being a particular and distinct benefit over, and above general benefits conferred on the public at large, including real property within the district.

In Fiscal Year 1997-98, the four Districts conducted an assessment ballot proceeding pursuant to Proposition 218; the assessment methodology was approved by a majority of District parcel owners and the City Council. The City reserves the right to implement the previously approved inflation adjustment in these Districts. Implementation of the annual inflation adjustment, which is based on the annual Consumer Price Index (CPI), does not constitute an assessment increase for purposes of Proposition 218, because parcel owners in the Fiscal Year 1997-98 assessment ballot and subsequent balloting's authorized these adjustments.

Each District will be discussed in terms of background, special benefit, general benefit, and assessment formula. Certain terms used throughout the Method of Assessment are defined below.

DEFINITIONS

Special Benefit: Articles XIII C and XIII D of the California Constitution define special benefit as "a particular and distinct benefit over and above the general benefits conferred on real property located in the District or to the public at large. General enhancement of property value does not constitute 'special benefit.'" The following Method of Apportionment of Assessment for each District analyzes the special benefit each parcel receives from the improvements funded in each District. The cost of landscape maintenance is distributed to parcels in each District based on the special benefit each parcel receives by an assessment formula. Within the Districts, zones of benefit may be designated based on spreading the cost of the improvements associated with each Zone over the parcels within that Zone.

Each assessed parcel within each District receives a particular and distinct Special Benefit from the improvements. The operation and maintenance of the landscape improvements provides a Special Benefit to the parcels within each District even though there may not be landscaping immediately adjacent to a particular parcel. Special Benefits associated with landscaped improvements are:

- The proper maintenance of landscape along streets provides noise abatement and visual barriers to reduce the negative impact of the streets upon nearby parcels within the District.
- Landscape improvements provide environmental enhancement to nearby parcels through erosion control, dust and debris control, and weed abatement for fire safety.
- The aesthetic desirability of parcels within the District is specifically enhanced by the presence of well-maintained open space, greenbelts, street medians, and frontage landscape.
- Having properly maintained landscape readily accessible to properties within the District means the owners of
 the assessed parcels may enjoy the benefits of having such improvements available for use while avoiding the
 effort and expense of individually installing and maintaining similar improvements.
- Where the District is providing maintenance along easements on privately held property, it is providing landscape services that otherwise would be direct expenses of the owners of such property.
- State and City laws generally hold property owners individually responsible for the safe and proper maintenance of their frontages.



Zones: Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22 (1972 Act District) Calabasas Park Area has been divided into "Zones" of benefit by individual communities or neighborhoods that receive distinct Special Benefit. In most cases, Zones are defined by the boundaries of a homeowners' association. In a few cases, the Zone is based on master plan boundaries (Old Town Master Plan) or street boundaries. The landscape maintenance activities that provide a Special Benefit are separately identified by the City for each Zone. Based on an assessment formula, the cost of these landscape maintenance activities is then spread to the parcels within that Zone.

Assessment Units: The assessment units assigned to each parcel are used in the assessment formula to compute the assessment amount. If the zone has one single land use, then each parcel is assigned one assessment unit. Where more than one land use exists within a zone, traffic generation factors are used as a means to define the benefit a single-family residence receives as compared to an apartment or a commercial property. The following traffic generation factors for the City of Calabasas and resulting Assessment Units are incorporated in this Report.

Land Use	Traffic Generator Factor	Assessment Unit
Single Family Residential (Houses and Condominiums)	10 trips per day	1.0 (10 trips/10 trips) per parcel
Multi-Family Residential (Apartments)	6 trips per day	0.6 (6 trips/10 trips) per unit
Commercial Parcel	40 trips per day	4.00 (40 trips/10 trips) per acre

Note: Traffic Generation Factor is based on information provided by the City of Calabasas in 1997-98. Due to minor changes in development in the area since this time, these results continue to be representative of the traffic generated in the assessment district.

ASSESSMENT METHODOLOGY

Proposition 218 requires the City to ballot property owners to obtain consent for the increased assessment exceeding the anticipated maximum permissible increase per assessment formula, for example CPI (Consumer Price Index) increase.

ASSESSMENT RANGE FORMULA

Section 22573 of the 1972 Act states that "The net amount to be assessed upon lands within an assessment district may be proportioned by any formula or method which fairly distributes the net amount among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefit to be received by each such lot or parcel from the improvements."

Section 22547 of the 1972 Act permits the designation of benefit zones within any individual assessment district if ".... by reasons or variations in the nature, location, and extent of improvements, the various areas will receive different degrees of benefit from the improvements." Thus, the 1972 Act requires the levy of true "assessment" rather than a "special tax".

Within each District, it is determined that each parcel benefits equally from the services provided. Therefore, costs of providing services (as well as a proportional share of incidental expenses) are spread evenly across each parcel in that District but not exceeding the maximum permissible assessment rates as approved by the property owners.

Proposition 218 requires that a parcel's assessment may not exceed the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel. The Articles provide that only special benefits are assessable. The City must separate the general benefits from the special benefits conferred on a parcel; a special benefit being a particular and distinct benefit over, and above general benefits conferred on the public at large, including real property within the district.

In Fiscal Year 1997-98, the four Districts conducted an assessment ballot proceeding pursuant to Proposition 218; the assessment methodology was approved by a majority of District parcel owners and the City Council. The City reserves the right to implement the previously approved inflation adjustment in these Districts. Implementation of the annual inflation adjustment, which is based on the annual Consumer Price Index (CPI), does not constitute an assessment



increase for purposes of Proposition 218, because parcel owners in the Fiscal Year 1997-98 assessment ballot and subsequent balloting's authorized these adjustments.

The Method of Assessment for each District is provided in the following pages below.

METHODOLOGY LANDSCAPE LIGHTING ACT DISTRICT No. 22

The following methodology described pertains to Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22 (1972 Act). The landscape services provided to all properties within the district boundary have been reviewed to identify the General Benefit and Special Benefit conferred to each parcel.

GENERAL BENEFIT

Articles XIII C and XIII D of the California Constitution require that the benefit to the public at large be identified for any improvements being funded through an assessment district. This so-called "general" benefit may not be assessed to the parcels through an assessment district. The following Method of Apportionment of Assessment for the District analyzes the benefit to the public at large from the landscape improvements provided by the City for the District.

In LLAD 22, certain portions of improvements are identified as providing general benefit. The costs associated with these improvements are not included in the LLAD 22 budget assessed to parcels in the District. Instead, these costs are funded through Landscape Maintenance District No. 22 (LMD 22), via an existing ad valorem tax levy. Proposition 218 does not govern the ad valorem levy, and the proceeds of this ad valorem levy may be used toward any landscape improvements providing general benefit within the LMD 22/LLAD 22 boundary.

The following landscape improvements provide general benefit and are funded solely by LMD 22, via the existing ad valorem tax levy and are not funded by LLAD 22. Maintenance of landscape on major thoroughfare roadways, including portions of Calabasas Road, Civic Center Way, Park Capri, Park Entrada, Park Granada, median islands on Park Helena and Park Sienna, Park Ora, certain parkway areas on Park Sorrento, Parkway Calabasas, Association Park, Calabasas Lake, and natural areas such as McCoy Creek, and open space areas within the district boundary.

The roadways are thoroughfares for the community, providing access to schools, shops, freeways, and recreational facilities, and therefore, confer a General Benefit to the community. The landscape along these streets includes parkway landscape that serves to improve the stabilization of slopes adjacent to these roadway sections within the District.

SPECIAL BENEFIT

With the exception of the major public thoroughfare roadways located within the boundaries of District LLAD 22 as described above in General Benefit, all of the areas maintained by LLAD 22 are either owned in common or are privately owned and are solely accessible to (or primarily accessible to) owners of the assessed properties, their tenants, and/or guests. These areas have easements granted to LLAD 22 for landscape maintenance purposes.

The local landscape improvements associated within member homeowner associations, provide special benefits to the properties within those developments, and have no benefit to the public at large, to individuals rather than property, or to properties located outside of the district. The landscape improvements of the common areas located within member homeowner associations are of direct and special benefit to the assessed properties. Consequently, 100% of these costs are allocated to special benefit.

In order for the methodology to be in compliance with Articles XIII C and XIII D of the California Constitution, a thorough study of the landscape funded by the District was performed in 1997-98. The District was divided by tracts into member homeowner associations and a commercial district that are called "Zones". These Zones receive distinct special benefit. In a few cases, the Zone is based on master plan boundaries (Old Town Master Plan) or street boundaries. Each Zone's specific usage and landscape maintenance activities were identified to determine the level of special benefit each property receives within that Zone.



The landscape maintenance activities that provide a Special Benefit have been determined for each Zone. The LLAD 22 Zones are as follows:

A complete landscape maintenance service level was developed for each Zone to determine the Zone's aggregate LLAD 22 assessment levy and detail the Special Benefit each Zone receives from the District.

The aggregate LLAD 22 assessment levy for each Zone includes costs associated with maintaining improvements that specially benefit the given Zone. Many of the costs are for local landscape improvements that can be accessed only by member homeowner association parcel owners, their tenants, or guests. In virtually all cases, the improvements were part of a condition of development and the assessed properties are responsible for the ongoing landscape maintenance.

PARCEL CLASSIFICATION

These costs are apportioned to each parcel within each Zone based on the Special Benefit associated with the type of land use. The benefit relationship between land uses is based on the assignment of vehicle trip generation factors. Trip rates are used as a measure of benefit because they are a representative land use comparison factor for the type of improvements being funded, namely street landscape, slopes, common areas, parks, and open space. From the traffic generation factors Assessment Units are calculated. The Assessment Unit for each land use is computed based on its traffic generation compared to the traffic generated by a single-family residence.

Single Family Residence parcels in the City of Calabasas generate an average of 10 trips per day. A parcel is classified as a Single-Family Residential use upon recordation of a subdivision map for houses or condominiums. The Single-Family Residences are assigned the base Assessment Unit of 1 and are used as the basis of comparison for all other land uses in the District.

Multiple Family Residential parcels the City of Calabasas generate an average of 6 trips per day, or 0.6 Assessment Unit per unit. Therefore, the Assessment Units assigned to a multiple family parcel would be the product of the number of dwelling units on a parcel and 0.6 Assessment Units per unit. For instance, a 20-unit apartment house would be assigned $20 \times 0.6 = 12$ Assessment Units.

Residential Vacant (un-subdivided but buildable) property receives a Special Benefit from the improvements as a result of the increased desirability of a parcel that is located in an area with landscape and park amenities. In addition, vacant parcels specially benefit from the availability of a landscape program and access to the City's landscape manager.

Commercial property within the City of Calabasas generates on average 40 trips per day. Therefore, the Assessment Units assigned to a commercial property is 4.0 Assessment Units per acre. At this time, all commercial properties in the District are within the Calabasas Road/ Old Town Commercial Zone, which also encompasses the Old Town Master Plan area. The commercial properties in the Calabasas Road/ Old Town Commercial Zone receive benefit from Calabasas Road maintenance. The cost for these specific improvements will be distributed to the properties within the Zone based on each parcel's land area (acreage).

^{**}The Oaks of Calabasas Zone is comprised of The Oaks of Calabasas and The Estates of The Oaks of Calabasas HOAs.



Public Agency parcels within the District that have people working on the premises and have parkway landscape maintained by the District, benefit from the landscape improvements to their parkway maintenance, as do other similar parcels. The only Public Agency parcels subject to the assessment are the Civic Center and the Tennis and Swim Center. For purposes of the assessment, these parcels are considered part of the Calabasas Road Commercial/Old Town Master Plan Zone. Therefore, the Civic Center and the Tennis and Swim center will receive the same per acre charge as the Commercial properties in the Calabasas Road Commercial/Old Town Master Plan Zone.

Homeowner's Association and Common Area parcels within the District are not assessed. These parcels include large park parcels, small sliver parcels, and parking lot parcels that cannot be developed. These 'unbuildable' properties do not receive a special benefit from the District's improvements and are not assessed. In many cases, the common area parcels provide the same use and function that the District funded improvements provide. In addition, the property owners paying the Homeowner's Association bill are already paying for the District's funded improvements by their parcel's assessment. The common area property is incidental to the primary residential parcels. Therefore, the assessment will go directly to the source and assess the properties that benefit from the Zone's improvements and maintenance.

FORMULA OF ASSESSMENT

The District budget requirements for the special benefit improvement costs have been assembled in order to determine the aggregate levy of assessment for Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22 (1972 Act) by Zone. The total aggregate levy for each LLAD 22 Zone is divided by the number of assessment units to determine the assessment amount per unit. The assessment amount per unit is multiplied by the number of assessment units assigned to the parcel to determine each parcel's assessment. See Exhibit B for the Landscape Lighting Act District No. 22 (1972 Act) Assessments by Zone.

For example, a Zone that only has single-family residence parcels is assigned 1 assessment unit per parcel, and the assessment per parcel is calculated as follows:

Zone Total Levy Amount
Zone Total Assessment Units (Parcels) = Assessment Amount Per Unit (Parcel)

METHODOLOGY LANDSCAPE LIGHTING ACT DISTRICT No. 24

The following methodology described pertains to the Landscape Lighting Act District No. 24 (1972 Act) herein referred to in this section as LLAD 24. The landscape services provided to all properties within the district boundary have been reviewed to identify the General Benefit and Special Benefit conferred to each parcel.

GENERAL BENEFIT

Articles XIII C and XIII D of the California Constitution require that the benefit to the public at large be identified for any improvements being funded through an assessment district. This so-called "general" benefit may not be assessed to the parcels through an assessment district. The following Method of Apportionment of Assessment for the District analyzes the benefit to the public at large from the landscape improvements provided by the City for the District.

Other residential areas of the City that are not included in an assessment district receive a minimal standard of City-funded landscape maintenance. The standard City landscaping for streets includes minimal median and parkway landscape. The City policy, therefore, is to have homeowner associations or landscaping and lighting districts fund certain landscaping maintenance, enhancements, and servicing. As a result, there is no general benefit from the funded improvements.



SPECIAL BENEFIT

The local landscape improvements provide special benefits to the properties within those developments, and have no benefit to the public at large, to individuals rather than property, or to properties located outside of the district. The maintenance of landscape improvements within street right-of-way and open space located within the District are of direct and special benefit to the assessed properties. Consequently, 100% of these costs are allocated to special benefit, and the special benefits associated with the landscaped improvements include:

- The aesthetic desirability of parcels within the District is specifically enhanced by the presence of wellmaintained open space, greenbelts, street medians, and frontage landscaping.
- Public rights-of-way with landscaped center medians, trees, and adjacent turf areas maintained by the District
 provide noise abatement and visual barrier to mitigate the negative impact of streets upon nearby parcels
 within the District.
- The special benefits derived from the maintenance of these landscape improvements provide environmental enhancement to nearby parcels through erosion control, dust and debris control, and weed abatement for safety.
- Additional special benefits of landscape maintenance are described earlier in this Report.

PARCEL CLASSIFICATION

Residential Parcels within the District all receive direct and special benefit. All of the parcels in this District are residential and each parcel is assigned 1 Assessment Unit per parcel.

Public Agency parcels within the District that have people working on the premises and have parkway landscape maintained by the District that benefit from the landscape improvements to their parkway maintenance, similar to other parcels. However, at this time, there are no Public Agency parcels in LLAD 24.

Homeowner's Association and Common Area parcels within the District are not assessed. These parcels include large park parcels, small sliver parcels, and parking lot parcels that cannot be developed. These 'unbuildable' parcels do not receive a special benefit from the District's improvements and are not assessed. In many cases, the common area parcels provide the same use and function that the District funded improvements provide. In addition, the parcel owners paying the Homeowner's Association bill are already paying for the District's funded improvements by their parcel's assessment. The common area property is incidental to the primary residential parcels. Therefore, the assessment will go directly to the source and assess the properties that benefit from the Zone's improvements and maintenance.

FORMULA OF ASSESSMENT

In order for the methodology to be in compliance with Articles XIII C and XIII D enacted by Proposition 218, in 1997-98 a thorough study of the landscape provided to each Zone within the District was performed. Specific usage and services were identified by zones of benefit to determine the level of benefit received by each Zone within the District. The District was divided into naturally bounded communities, usually by tracts, but sometimes by street boundaries, and within each community, there is a single residential land use.

The Zones located within the District are as follows:

The assessment per assessment unit is determined by dividing the total aggregate levy by Zone by the number of assessment units in the Zone. The assessment per parcel is determined by multiplying the assessment per assessment unit by the number of units assigned to the parcel. See Exhibit B for the Landscape Lighting Act District No. 24 (1972 Act) Assessments by Zone.



For example, a Zone that only has residential parcels is assigned 1 assessment unit per parcel, and the assessment per parcel is calculated as follows:

=Assessment Amount Per Unit (Parcel)

METHODOLOGY LANDSCAPE LIGHTING ACT DISTRICT No. 27

The following methodology described pertains to Landscape Lighting Act District No. 27 (1972 Act) herein referred to in this section as LLAD 27.

GENERAL/SPECIAL BENEFIT

The local landscape improvements provide special benefits to the properties within those developments, and have no benefit to the public at large, to individuals rather than property, or to properties located outside of the district. The landscape improvements within the street right-of-way located within the District are of direct and special benefit to the assessed properties. Consequently, 100% of these costs are allocated to special benefit. The special benefits of landscape maintenance are described earlier in this Report.

Other residential areas of the City that are not included in an assessment district receive a minimal standard of City-funded landscape maintenance. The standard City performed landscape for arterial streets in the City includes minimal median and parkway landscape maintenance. The City policy, therefore, is to have fronting property in the District fund the enhanced landscape maintenance, operation, and servicing of arterial streets. The parcels in the District are funding only the cost of their frontage landscape maintenance. As a result, there is no General Benefit from the funded improvements.

Special Benefit - Mont Calabasas HOA Zone

The Mont Calabasas HOA Zone special benefit includes the maintenance of landscape within Las Virgenes Road street right-of-way. In addition, the special benefit also includes areas to be maintained by LLAD 27 which are either owned in common or are privately owned and are solely accessible to (or primarily accessible to) owners of the assessed properties, their tenants, and/or guests. These areas have easements granted to LLAD 27 for landscape maintenance purposes.

The local landscape improvements associated within the Mont Calabasas HOA Zone, provide special benefits to the properties within the Mont Calabasas HOA, and have no benefit to the public at large, to individuals rather than property, or to properties located outside of the district. The landscape improvements of the common areas located within the member homeowner association are of direct and special benefit to the assessed properties. Consequently, 100% of these costs are allocated to special benefit. The specific usage and landscape maintenance activities were identified to determine the level of special benefit each property receives within the Mont Calabasas HOA Zone.

PARCEL CLASSIFICATION

Public Agency parcels within the District that have people working on the premises and have parkway landscape maintained by the District that benefit from the landscape improvements to their parkway maintenance, similar to other parcels. There are no Public Agency parcels in LLAD 27 at this time.

Homeowner's Association and Common Area parcels within the District that are not assessed. These parcels include large park parcels, small sliver parcels, and parking lot parcels that cannot be developed. These 'unbuildable' parcels do not receive a special benefit from the District's improvements and are not assessed. In many cases, the common area parcels provide the same use and function that the District funded improvements provide. In addition, the parcel owners paying the Homeowner's Association bill are already paying for the District's funded improvements by their parcel's assessment. The common area parcel is incidental to the primary residential parcels. Therefore, the



assessment will go directly to the source and assess the parcels that benefit from the Zone's improvements and maintenance.

FORMULA OF ASSESSMENT

In order for the methodology to be in compliance with Articles XIII C and XIII D enacted by Proposition 218, in 1997-98 a thorough study of the landscape provided to zones of benefit within the District was performed. Specific usage and services were identified for each Zone to determine the level of benefit received by each Zone within LLAD 27. The District was divided into naturally bounded neighborhoods, usually by tracts, but sometimes by street boundaries, and each parcel is assigned 1 assessment unit. The Zones are as follows:

Assessment Formula (Las Virgenes Road)

The following Zones receive special benefit: Casden Malibu Canyon LP, Las Virgenes Park, Las Virgenes Village and Mont Calabasas. The assessment per assessment unit (parcel) is determined by dividing the total aggregate levy by the total number of assessment units (parcels) in the Zones.

Assessment Formula (Mont Calabasas Zone)

Costs of services for maintaining Mont Calabasas landscape of common areas and open space areas located and specific to Mont Calabasas HOA Zone are spread only across the parcels in that Zone. Each developed residential parcel within the Zone is allocated an equal share of costs applicable to that zone. The assessment per assessment unit (parcel) is determined by dividing the total aggregate levy by the total number of assessment units (parcels) in the Zone.

For example, a Zone that only has residential parcels is assigned 1 assessment unit per parcel, and the assessment per parcel is calculated as follows:

$$\frac{\textit{Zone Total Levy Amount}}{\textit{Zone Total Assessment Units (Parcels)}} = \textit{Assessment Amount Per Unit (Parcel)}$$

METHODOLOGY LANDSCAPE LIGHTING ACT DISTRICT No. 32

The following methodology described pertains to the Landscape Lighting Act District No. 32 (1972 Act) herein referred to in this section as LLAD 32.

GENERAL/SPECIAL BENEFIT

The local landscape improvements provide special benefits to the properties within those developments, and have no benefit to the public at large, to individuals rather than property, or to properties located outside of the district. The landscape improvements of the common areas located within member homeowner associations are of direct and special benefit to the assessed properties. Consequently, 100% of these costs are allocated to special benefit. The special benefits of landscape maintenance are described earlier in this Report.

PARCEL CLASSIFICATION

Because there is basically a single land use in the District, commercial, each parcel is assigned 1 assessment unit. The assessment levy is spread equally to each parcel. The only nonconforming land use in the District is related to the Community Center, which is owned by the City of Calabasas and the City of Agoura Hills. The Community Center parcel's frontage landscape will be funded by the District, similar to the commercial properties in the District. Therefore, the Community Center benefits from the assessment and will be assessed as a parcel.



Common Area or Easement parcels within the District include primarily open space parcels that cannot be developed and parking lots that are considered 'unbuildable'. These parcels do not receive special benefit and will not be assessed. In many cases, the common area parcels provide the same use and function that the District funded improvements provide. Furthermore, these parcels are incidental to the primary parcels. Therefore, the assessment will go directly to the source and assess the parcels that benefit from the Districts improvements and maintenance.

FORMULA OF ASSESSMENT

In order for the methodology to be in compliance with Articles XIII C and XIII D enacted by Proposition 218, in 1997-98 a thorough study of the landscape provided to the District was performed. Specific usage and services were identified to determine the level of benefit each parcel within the District receives. These costs are apportioned to each parcel based on the Special Benefit associated with the type of land use. Two land uses exist in LLAD 32: Commercial and Public Agency (a sheriff station and a community center).

The assessment per assessment unit is determined by dividing the total aggregate levy by parcel by the number of assessment units in the District. The assessment per parcel is determined by multiplying the assessment per assessment unit by the number of units assigned to the parcel. See Exhibit D for the Landscape Lighting Act District No. 32 (1972 Act) Assessments by parcel.

For example, a District that only has commercial land use parcels is assigned 1 assessment unit per parcel, and the assessment per parcel is calculated as follows:

IV. DISTRICT BUDGET

ESTIMATE OF COSTS

Section 22569 of the 1972 Act requires the Engineer's Report to contain an estimate of the costs of the Improvements including:

- total costs of improvements including incidental expenses,
- the amount of the surplus to be carried over from a previous fiscal year,
- the amount of any contributions to be made from sources other than the assessment.
- the amount, if any, to be collected in annual installments for the estimated cost of improvements.
- the net amount to be assessed within the Assessment District.

Estimates of these amounts are as follows:

Cost of Improvements:

As mentioned earlier, some zones are assessed at fixed annual rate without the CPI adjustment. In such areas, the level of service (i.e., gardening and watering) is reduced so that the costs of providing services does not exceed assessment revenues. For the areas where the CPI adjustments have been approved, an attempt is made to provide the same levels of service from year to year.

The Community Services Department oversees the operation of the landscape maintenance while outside contractors as well as in-house staff are used to maintain these areas. The expenditures are listed in the fiscal year 2023-24 budget listed below. Contract maintenance expenses are based on actual contractual costs. Water and electricity utility bills and routine supplies are estimated based on current expenditures.

Incidental Expenses:

Incidental expenses to be paid with assessment amounts of the Assessment District for FY 2023-24 ("Incidental Expenses") are included in the definition of "incidental expenses" as defined in Section 22526 of the 1972 Act.

Four types of incidental expenses are included in the costs associated with the Maintenance District: (i) compensation for special counsel providing advice in connection with the establishment of the Maintenance District, (ii) costs of the preparation of this Report, including preparation of plans, specifications, estimates, diagram, and assessment ("Assessment Engineering"), (iii) costs associated with printing, advertising, and the giving of published, posted, and mailed notices, including the balloting required by Article XIII D of the California Constitution, and (iv) compensation payable to the County of Los Angeles for the collection of assessments. The budget shows the total amounts for incidental expenses for Fiscal Year 2023-24.

Contribution from Other Sources

This is included to subsidize any shortfalls for Zones in the District.

Annual Installments

The entire amount of the net assessment assessed in FY 2023-24.



The estimated budget for fiscal year 2023-24 for each District is shown in the table below. The beginning fund balance estimated for July 1, 2023, is projected from the 2022-23 budget year. These fund balances are used to finance all work from July 1, 2023 until June 30, 2024. The first deposit from the County Assessor's Office to the District's accounts is December 2023. The projected carryover from FY 2022-23 will be the beginning fund balance for Fiscal Year 2023-24 and so forth.

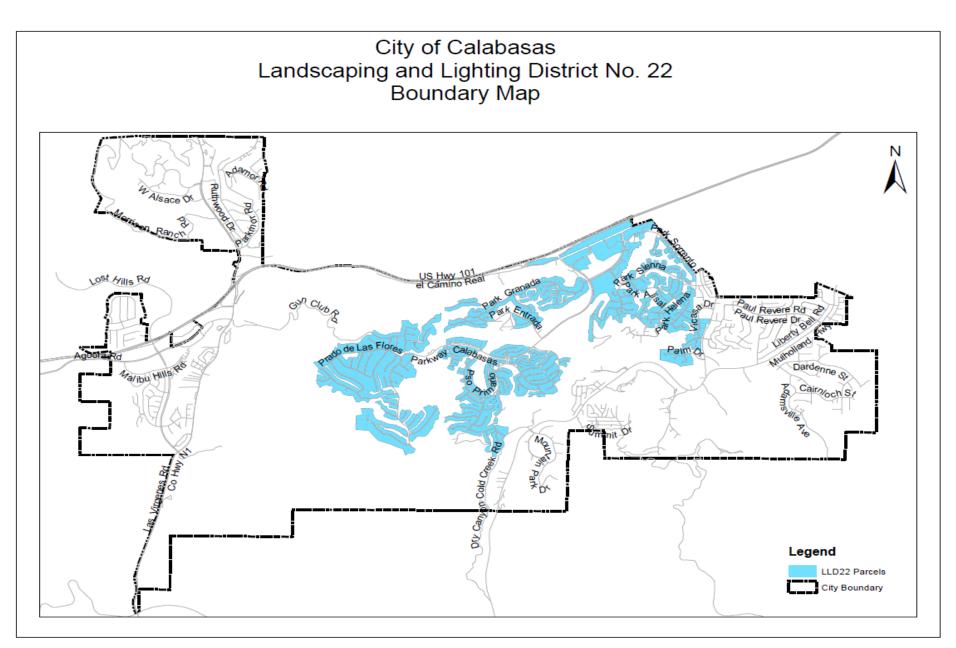

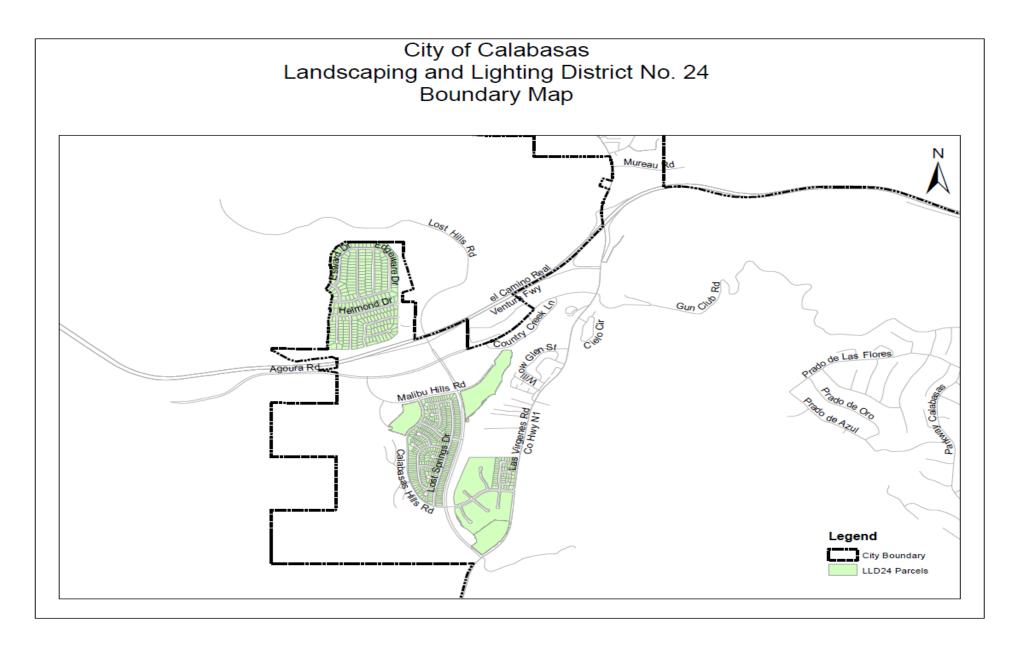
V. DISTRICT BOUNDARY MAPS

Reference is hereby made to the Assessor's Maps of the County of Los Angeles for an exact description of the lines and dimensions of each parcel within the Assessment District.

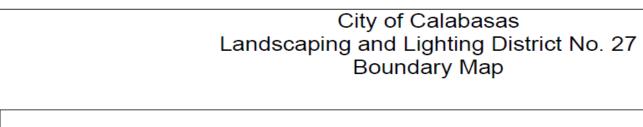


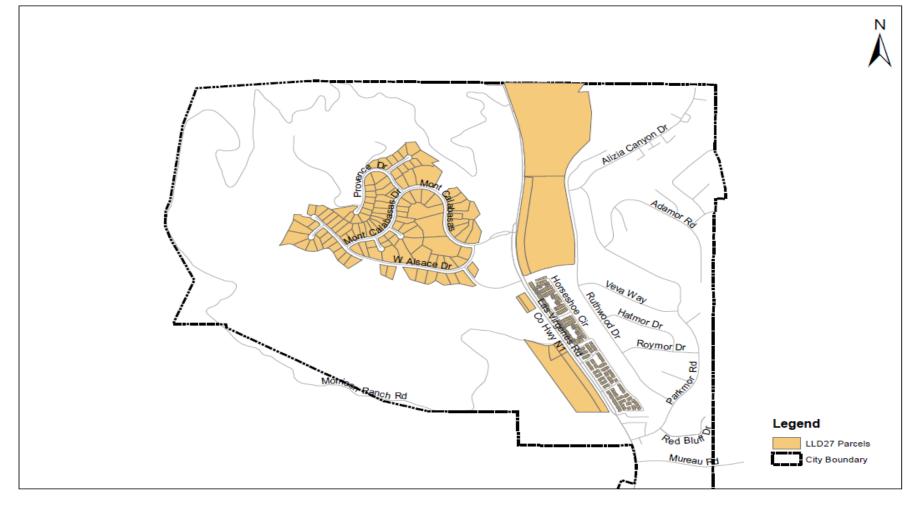














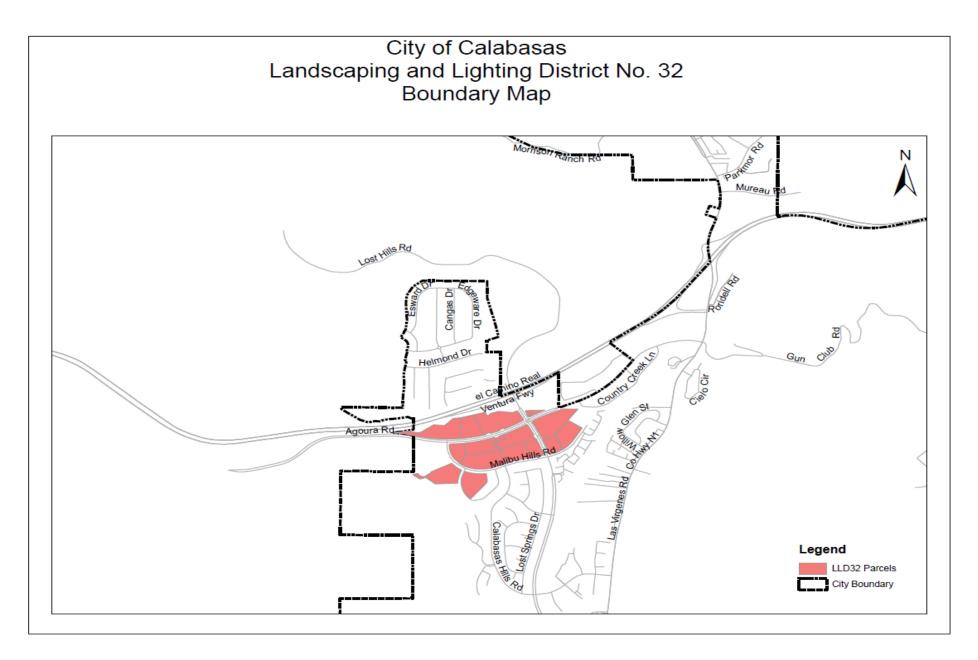




Exhibit A- 2023-24 ASSESSMENT ROLL

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that City Council award the construction contract for the Citywide Green Street Project, Phase I, Specification No. 22-23-04, to GMZ Engineering Inc. for the amount of \$4,858,806.75. The maximum guaranteed price includes the original bid amount of \$4,627,435.00 and a 5% additional allowance for unexpected site conditions.

Staff further recommends appropriations of \$200,000.00 to cover costs associated with material testing and special inspections for this project.

Staff also recommends that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2023-1854 directing the transfer of \$473,970 from the AB 939 fund to the project account.

Finally, staff recommends that the City Council direct the transfer of \$473,970 from the Measure W fund to the project account.

BACKGROUND:

A Green Street is a stormwater management approach that incorporates vegetation, soil, and engineered systems (e.g., permeable pavements) to slow, filter, and cleanse stormwater runoff from impervious surfaces. Green streets are designed to capture rainwater at its source, where rain falls.

Public Works engineering staff has been working on Green Street design for several locations throughout the City. The first Green Street project was constructed on Malibu Hills Road in 2018.

The Citywide Green Street project was designed for three locations: Las Virgenes Road north of Mont Calabasas Drive, Mureau Road east of the intersection with Las Virgenes Road, and Calabasas Road within the CAR Zone.

The Project outcomes include:

- · Capturing, Treatment, and Infiltration of Stormwater Runoff;
- Mitigation of Local Flooding;
- Improved Trail and Emergency Vehicle Access;
- Improved Parking Space to Local Residents and Hikers;
- Enhanced Pedestrian Safety;
- Improved Aesthetics by Utilizing Green Street Elements and Cleaner Road;
- Elimination of mudflows and washouts to the street from unpaved shoulder and adjacent slopes.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The project was advertised for bidding on April 26, 2023, with Bid Opening scheduled for June 8, 2023. The bid was advertised on the City website and distributed to six Plan Rooms, which have from 500,000 to 1,000,000 + construction professional subscribers. Five local constitution companies purchased a bid package (see Attachment A). One bid was submitted for this project and received by the City Clerk's Department. The bid amounts for three project locations are listed below:

1	Las Virgenes Road	\$ 5,044,935
2	Mureau Road	\$ 529,940
3	Calabasas Road	\$ 892,325

The bid from GMZ Engineering Inc. (GMZ) was evaluated by the City's staff based on the bid amount and bidder's background in constructing similar projects.

GMZ Engineering, Inc. has been licensed for over twenty-five years. Its classifications include: general engineering contractor; general building contractor; electrical contractor and other classifications. GMZ Engineering, Inc. recently completed the Old Town Sidewalk Replacement Project and is currently working on the Old Topanga Canyon Road/Mulholland Hwy Improvements project.

Since GMZ Engineering, Inc. was the only bid received for the project, staff negotiated unit prices for several bid items. After evaluation, GMZ revised the bid for Las Virgenes Road location to \$4,627,435.00 (see Attachment B).

Even after price negotiations, the bid put forth exceeded the engineer's cost estimate and the funding secured for the project. A majority of this increase was a result of high cost of traffic control due to the project locations, traffic and parking patterns and significantly higher than estimated concrete unit prices.

Staff considered eliminating two out of three project locations with consideration of the project budget. Staff prioritized the locations and suggested granting top priority to Las Virgenes Road. As part of the funding plan, Staff has proposed to remove Mureau Road and Calabasas Road improvements from this project and seek a grant for future construction of improvements at these two locations.

Las Virgenes Road improvements include construction of a 6ft wide vegetated swale that is approximately 2,100ft long on the shoulder located on the West side of the road. The swale will serve as a pretreatment Best Management Practices (BMPs), that will capture and treat surface flows from the street. The swale will slow down flow velocities and allow for gradual infiltration through the soil media. The overflow of treated flows will be discharged into the detention basin by Mont Calabasas Rd. The city will also be incorporating a multipurpose trail that will begin by Mont Calabasas Rd and end at the connection for the Las Virgenes trail on the northern end of the street. Having the trail will provide a safe path for pedestrians. Since the area is currently unpaved, the City will add permeable pavement for parallel and double row parking areas. This would provide approximately 100 parking spots.

To fully fund the scaled back project, staff also recommends using additional sources of eligible funding to cover the shortfall. The project, which reduces the amount of waste taken to landfill, is eligible for AB 939 funding. By eliminating mudflows and washouts to the street from the unpaved shoulder and adjacent slopes, and thereby eliminating the need for it to be collected by street sweeping and taken to landfill, the project contributes to AB 939's goal. Staff recommends sharing any funding shortfall equally between the AB 939 fund money and available Measure W – Safe Clear Water funds to cover the costs.

An Environmental Information form was filed with Department of Water Resources and California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection for the project.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The Citywide Green Street Project is funded by Measure M and Prop 1 Round 1 funds in the amounts of \$3.5M and \$536,336K respectfully. The current AB 939 fund balance allows \$473,970 to be transferred to the project. The current Measure W – Safe Clear Water fund balance allows \$473,970 to be transferred to the project. Account No. 40-319-6503-37 is used to track all costs associated with the project. The requested funds should be appropriated to this account and the budget adjusted accordingly.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Staff recommends that City Council award the construction contract for the Citywide Green Street Project, Phase I, Specification No. 22-23-04, to GMZ Engineering Inc. for the amount of \$4,858,806.75. The maximum guaranteed price includes the original bid amount of \$4,627,435.00 and a 5% additional allowance for unexpected site conditions.

Staff further recommends appropriations of \$200,000.00 to cover costs associated with material testing and special inspections for this project.

Staff also recommends that the City Council adopt Resolution No. 2023-1854 directing the transfer of \$473,970 from the AB 939 fund to the project account.

Finally, staff recommends that the City Council direct the transfer of \$473,970 from the Measure W fund to the project account.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT

CITY-WIDE GREEN STREET PROJECT PHASE I SPECIFICATION NO. 22-23-04, AGREEMENT IN THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA

THIS CITY-WIDE GREEN STREET PROJECT PHASE I SPECIFICATION NO. 22-23-04, AGREEMENT ("AGREEMENT") is made and entered into for the above-stated project this 28th day of June, 2023, BY AND BETWEEN the City of Calabasas, a municipal corporation, hereafter designated as "AGENCY", and GMZ Engineering, Inc, a California Corporation, hereafter designated as "CONTRACTOR."

WITNESSETH that AGENCY and CONTRACTOR have mutually agreed as follows:

ARTICLE 1: Contract Documents

The contract documents for the CITY-WIDE GREEN STREET PROJECT PHASE I, SPECIFICATION NO. 22-23-04, shall consist of the Notice Inviting Sealed Bids, Instructions To Bidders, Bid Proposal, Bid Schedule, Standard Specifications, Special Provisions, and all referenced specifications, details, standard drawings, and appendices; together with two signed copies of the AGREEMENT, two signed copies of required bonds; one copy of the insurance certificates, permits, notices, and affidavits; and also including any and all addenda or supplemental agreements clarifying, amending, or extending the work contemplated as may be required to ensure its completion in an acceptable manner (collectively referred to herein as the "Contract Documents"). All of the provisions of the Contract Documents are made a part hereof as though fully set forth herein.

ARTICLE II: Scope of Work

For and in consideration of the payments and agreements to be made and performed by AGENCY, CONTRACTOR agrees to furnish all materials and equipment and perform all work required for the above-stated project, and to fulfill all other obligations as set forth in the aforesaid Contract Documents.

AGENCY hereby employs CONTRACTOR to provide the materials, do the work, and fulfill the obligations according to the terms and conditions herein contained and referred to, for the prices provided herein, and hereby contracts to pay the same at the time, in the manner, and upon the conditions set forth in this AGREEMENT.

In entering into a public works contract or a subcontract to supply goods, services, or materials pursuant to this AGREEMENT, CONTRACTOR offers and agrees to assign to the AGENCY all rights, title, and interest in and to all causes of action it may have under Section 4 of the Clayton Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 15) or under the Cartwright Act (Chapter 2 (Section 16700, et seq.) of Part 2 of Division 7 of the Business and Professions Code), arising from purchases of goods, services, or materials pursuant to the public works contract or the subcontract. This assignment shall be made

and become effective at the time the awarding body tenders final payment to CONTRACTOR, without further acknowledgment by the parties.

ARTICLE III: Compensation

A. CONTRACTOR agrees to receive and accept the prices set forth in the Bid Proposal and Bid Schedule as full compensation for furnishing all materials, performing all work, and fulfilling all obligations hereunder. In no event shall the total compensation and costs payable to CONTRACTOR under this Agreement exceed the sum of Four Million Six Hundred and Twenty-Seven Thousand Four Hundred and Thirty-Five Dollars (\$4,627,435.00) unless specifically approved in advance and in writing by AGENCY.

Such compensation shall cover all expenses, losses, damages, and consequences arising out of the nature of the work during its progress or prior to its acceptance including those for well and faithfully completing the work and the whole thereof in the manner and time specified in the aforesaid Contract Documents; and also including those arising from actions of the elements, unforeseen difficulties or obstructions encountered in the prosecution of the work, suspension or discontinuance of the work, and all other unknowns or risks of any description connected with the work.

B. This AGREEMENT is subject to the provisions of Article 1.7 (commencing at Section 20104.50) of Division 2, Part 3 of the Public Contract Code regarding prompt payment of CONTRACTORs by local governments. Article 1.7 mandates certain procedures for the payment of undisputed and properly submitted payment requests within 30 days after receipt, for the review of payment requests, for notice to CONTRACTOR of improper payment requests, and provides for the payment of interest on progress payment requests which are not timely made in accordance with that Article. This AGREEMENT hereby incorporates the provisions of Article 1.7 as though fully set forth herein.

C. At the request and expense of CONTRACTOR, securities equivalent to the amount withheld shall be deposited with AGENCY, or with a state or federally chartered bank in this state as the escrow agent, who shall then pay those moneys to CONTRACTOR upon AGENCY's confirmation of CONTRACTOR'S satisfactory completion of this AGREEMENT. At any time during the term of this AGREEMENT CONTRACTOR may, at its own expense, substitute securities for funds otherwise withheld as retention (or the retained percentage) in accordance with Public Contract Code § 22300.

ARTICLE IV: Labor Code

AGENCY and CONTRACTOR acknowledge that this AGREEMENT is subject to the provisions of Division 2, Part 7, Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 1720) of the California Labor Code relating to public works and public agencies and agree to be bound by all the provisions thereof as though set forth fully herein. Full compensation for conforming to the requirements of the Labor Code and with other Federal, State and local laws related to labor, and rules, regulations and

ordinances which apply to any work performed pursuant to this AGREEMENT is included in the price for all contract items of work involved.

This AGREEMENT is further subject to prevailing wage law, including, but not limited to, the following:

A. The CONTRACTOR shall pay the prevailing wage rates for all work performed under the AGREEMENT. When any craft or classification is omitted from the general prevailing wage determinations, the CONTRACTOR shall pay the wage rate of the craft or classification most closely related to the omitted classification. The CONTRACTOR shall forfeit as a penalty to AGENCY \$200.00 or any greater penalty provided in the Labor Code for each Calendar Day, or portion thereof, for each worker paid less than the prevailing wage rates for any work done under the AGREEMENT in violation of the provisions of the Labor Code whether such worker is employed in the execution of the work by CONTRACTOR or by any Subcontractor under CONTRACTOR. In addition, CONTRACTOR shall pay each worker the difference between such prevailing wage rates and the amount paid to each worker for each Calendar Day, or portion thereof, for which each worker was paid less than the prevailing wage rate.

B. CONTRACTOR shall comply with the provisions of Labor Code Section 1777.5 concerning the employment of apprentices on public works projects, and further agrees that CONTRACTOR is responsible for compliance with Section 1777.5 by all of its subcontractors.

C. Pursuant to Labor Code § 1725.5, CONTRACTOR and any subcontractor must be registered with the California Department of Industrial Relations for any bid proposal submitted on or after March 1, 2015, and for any contract for public work entered into on or after April 1, 2015. Further, this project is subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the Department of Industrial Relations.

D. Pursuant to Labor Code § 1776, CONTRACTOR and any subcontractor shall keep accurate payroll records, showing the name, address, social security number, work classification, straight time and overtime hours worked each day and week, and the actual per diem wages paid to each journeyman, apprentice, worker, or other employee employed by him or her in connection with this AGREEMENT. Each payroll record shall contain or be verified by a written declaration that it is made under penalty of perjury, stating both of the following: (1) The information contained in the payroll record is true and correct; and (2) The employer has complied with the requirements of Labor Code §§ 1811, and 1815 for any work performed by his or her employees on the public works project. The payroll records enumerated under subdivision (a) shall be certified and shall be available for inspection at all reasonable hours as required by Labor Code § 1776.

E. This AGREEMENT is further subject to 8-hour work day and wage and hour penalty law, including, but not limited to, Labor Code Sections 1810 and 1813, as well as California nondiscrimination laws, as follows:

CONTRACTOR shall strictly adhere to the provisions of the Labor Code regarding the 8-hour day and the 40-hour week, overtime, Saturday, Sunday and holiday work and nondiscrimination on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, sex or sexual orientation, except as provided in Section 12940 of the Government Code. Pursuant to the provisions of the Labor Code, eight hours' labor shall constitute a legal day's work. Work performed by CONTRACTOR's employees in excess of eight

hours per day, and 40 hours during any one week, must include compensation for all hours worked in excess of eight hours per day, or 40 hours during any one week, at not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay. CONTRACTOR shall forfeit as a penalty to AGENCY \$25.00 or any greater penalty set forth in the Labor Code for each worker employed in the execution of the work by CONTRACTOR or by any Subcontractor of CONTRACTOR, for each Calendar Day during which such worker is required or permitted to the work more than eight hours in one Calendar Day or more than 40 hours in any one calendar week in violation of the Labor Code.

F. This AGREEMENT is subject to Public Contract Code Section 6109: CONTRACTOR shall be prohibited from performing work on this project with a subcontractor who is ineligible to perform work on the project pursuant to Sections 1777.1 or 1777.7 of the Labor Code.

ARTICLE V: Work Site Conditions

A. In compliance with and pursuant to Government Code Section 4215, AGENCY shall assume the responsibility, as between the parties to this AGREEMENT, for the timely removal, relocation, or protection of existing main- or trunk-line utility facilities located on the site of any construction project that is a subject of this AGREEMENT, if such utilities are not identified by AGENCY in the plans and specifications made a part of the invitation for bids. The Contract Documents shall include provisions to compensate CONTRACTOR for the costs of locating, repairing damage not due to the failure of CONTRACTOR to exercise reasonable care, and removing or relocating such utility facilities not indicated in the plans and specifications with reasonable accuracy, and for equipment on the project necessarily idled during such work. CONTRACTOR shall not be assessed liquidated damages for delay in completion of the project, when such delay was caused by the failure of AGENCY or the owner of a utility to provide for removal or relocation of such utility facilities.

B. To the extent that the work requires trenches in excess of five feet (5') and is estimated to cost more than \$25,000, prior to any excavation, CONTRACTOR must provide the AGENCY, or a registered civil or structural engineer employed by the AGENCY to whom authority has been delegated to accept such plans, a detailed plan showing the design of shoring, bracing, sloping, or other provisions to be made for worker protection from the hazard of caving ground during the excavation of such trench or trenches. If such plan varies from the shoring system standards, the plan shall be prepared by a registered civil or structural engineer. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to allow the use of a shoring, sloping, or protective system less effective than that required by the Construction Safety Orders.

C. This AGREEMENT is further subject to Public Contract Code Section 7104 with regard to any trenches deeper than four feet (4') involved in the proposed work as follows:

CONTRACTOR shall promptly, and before the following conditions are disturbed, notify AGENCY, in writing, of any:

(1) Material that CONTRACTOR believes may be hazardous waste, as defined in Section 25117 of the Health and Safety Code, which is required to be removed to a Class I, Class II, or Class III disposal site in accordance with existing law.

- (2) Subsurface or latent physical conditions at the site differing from those indicated by all available information provided prior to the deadline for submission of bids.
- (3) Unknown physical conditions at the site of any unusual nature, different materially from those ordinarily encountered and generally recognized as inherent in work of the character provided for in the contract.

AGENCY shall promptly investigate the conditions, and if it finds that the conditions do materially so differ, or involve hazardous waste, and cause a decrease or increase in CONTRACTOR's cost of, or the time required for, performance of any part of the work, AGENCY shall issue a change order under the procedures described in this AGREEMENT.

In the event that a dispute arises between AGENCY and CONTRACTOR whether the conditions materially differ, or involve hazardous waste, or cause a decrease or increase in CONTRACTOR's cost of, or time required for, performance of any part of the work, CONTRACTOR shall not be excused from any scheduled completion date provided in the AGREEMENT, but shall proceed with all work to be performed under the AGREEMENT. CONTRACTOR shall retain any and all rights provided either by contract or by law which pertain to the resolution of disputes and protests between the contracting parties.

ARTICLE VI: Insurance

A. With respect to performance of work under this AGREEMENT, CONTRACTOR shall maintain, and shall require all of its subcontractors to maintain, insurance as required by Section E "Standard Specifications" of the Contract Documents.

B. This AGREEMENT is further subject to Workers' Compensation obligations, including, but not limited to, California Labor Code Sections 1860 and 1861 as follows:

CONTRACTOR shall take out and maintain, during the life of this contract, Worker's Compensation Insurance for all of CONTRACTOR's employees employed at the site of improvement; and, if any work is sublet, CONTRACTOR shall require the subcontractor similarly to provide Worker's Compensation Insurance for all of the latter's employees, unless such employees are covered by the protection afforded by CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR and any of CONTRACTOR's subcontractors shall be required to provide AGENCY with a written statement acknowledging its obligation to secure payment of Worker's Compensation Insurance as required by Labor Code § 1861; to wit: 'I am aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and I will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this contract.' If any class of employees engaged in work under this AGREEMENT at the site of the Project is not protected under any Worker's Compensation law, CONTRACTOR shall provide and shall cause each subcontractor to provide adequate insurance for the protection of employees not otherwise protected. CONTRACTOR shall indemnify and hold harmless AGENCY for any damage resulting from failure of either CONTRACTOR or any subcontractor to take out or maintain such insurance.

ARTICLE VII: Indemnification

To the fullest extent permitted by law, CONTRACTOR shall, at its sole cost and expense, fully defend, indemnify and hold harmless AGENCY, its authorized representatives and their respective subsidiaries, affiliates, members, directors, officers, employees and agents (collectively, the "Indemnitees") from and against any and all claims, actions, demands, costs, judgments, liens, penalties, liabilities, damages, losses, and expenses, including but not limited to any fees of accountants, attorneys or other professionals (collectively "Liabilities"), arising out of, in connection with, resulting from or related to, any act, omission, fault or negligence of CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR's Representative, or any of its officers, agents, employees, Subcontractors or Suppliers, or any person or organization directly or indirectly employed by any of them (Collectively, the "Indemnitors"), in connection with or relating to or claimed to be in connection with or relating to the work performed under this AGREEMENT.

If CONTRACTOR is a joint venture or partnership, each venturer or partner shall be jointly and severally liable for any and all of the duties and obligations of CONTRACTOR that are assumed under or arise out of this AGREEMENT. Each of such venturers or partners waives notice of the breach or non-performance of any undertaking or obligation of CONTRACTOR contained in, resulting from or assumed under this AGREEMENT, and the failure to give any such notice shall not affect or impair such venturer's or partner's joint and several liability hereunder.

ARTICLE VIII: Binding Effect

AGENCY and CONTRACTOR each binds itself, its partners, successors, assigns, and legal representatives to the other party hereto and to its partners, successors, assigns, and legal representatives in respect of all covenants, agreements, and obligations contained in the Contract Documents. This AGREEMENT is not assignable nor the performance of either party's duties delegable without the prior written consent of the other party. Any attempted or purported assignment or delegation of any of the rights of obligations of either party without the prior written consent of the other shall be void and of no force and effect.

ARTICLE IX: Dispute Resolution

A. Any court action arising out of this AGREEMENT shall be filed in the Los Angeles County Superior Court. Any alternative dispute resolution proceeding arising out of this AGREEMENT shall be heard in the County of Los Angeles.

B. AGENCY shall have full authority to compromise or otherwise settle any claim relating to this AGREEMENT or any part hereof at any time. AGENCY shall provide timely notification to CONTRACTOR of the receipt of any third-party claim relating to this AGREEMENT. AGENCY shall be entitled to recover its reasonable costs incurred in providing the notification required by this section.

C. This AGREEMENT is further subject to the provisions of Article 1.5 (commencing at Section 20104) of Division 2, Part 3 of the Public Contract Code regarding the resolution of public works claims of less than \$375,000. Article 1.5 mandates certain procedures for the filing of claims and supporting documentation by CONTRACTOR, for the response to such claims by the AGENCY, for a mandatory meet and confer conference upon the request of CONTRACTOR, for mandatory

nonbinding mediation in the event litigation is commenced, and for mandatory judicial arbitration upon the parties' failure to resolve the dispute through mediation. This AGREEMENT hereby incorporates the provisions of Article 1.5 as though fully set forth herein.

ARTICLE X: Independent CONTRACTOR

CONTRACTOR is and shall at all times remain as to AGENCY, a wholly independent CONTRACTOR. Neither AGENCY nor any of its agents shall have control of the conduct of CONTRACTOR or any of CONTRACTOR's employees, except as herein set forth. CONTRACTOR shall not at any time or in any manner represent that it or any of its agents or employees are in any manner agents or employees of AGENCY.

ARTICLE XI: Taxes

CONTRACTOR is responsible for paying all retail, sales and use, transportation, export, import, special or other taxes and duties applicable to, and assessable against any work, materials, equipment, services, processes and operations incidental to or involved in this AGREEMENT. The CONTRACTOR is responsible for ascertaining and arranging to pay such taxes and duties. The prices established in this AGREEMENT shall include compensation for any taxes the CONTRACTOR is required to pay by laws and regulations in effect as of the execution of this AGREEMENT.

ARTICLE XII: Notices

All notices and communications shall be sent in writing to the parties at the following addresses:

ARTICLE XIII: Entire Agreement

This AGREEMENT supersedes any and all other agreements, either oral or written, between the parties and contains all of the covenants and agreements between the parties pertaining to the work of improvements described herein. Each party to this AGREEMENT acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises or agreements, orally or otherwise, have been made by any party, or anyone acting on behalf of any party, which are not embodied herein, and that any other agreement, statement or promise not contained in this AGREEMENT shall not be valid or binding. Any modification of this AGREEMENT will be effective only if signed by the party to be charged.

The benefits and obligations of this AGREEMENT shall inure to and be binding upon the representatives, agents, partners, heirs, successors and assigns of the parties hereto. This AGREEMENT shall be construed pursuant to the laws of the State of California.

ARTICLE XIV: Authority to Contract

The signatories hereto represent that they are authorized to sign on behalf of the respective parties they represent and are competent to do so, and each of the parties hereto hereby irrevocably waives any and all rights to challenge signatures on these bases.

ARTICLE XV: General Provisions

- A. All reports, documents or other written material ("written products" herein) developed by CONTRACTOR in the performance of this Agreement shall be and remain the property of AGENCY without restriction or limitation upon its use or dissemination by AGENCY. CONTRACTOR may take and retain copies of such written products as desired, but no such written products shall be the subject of a copyright application by CONTRACTOR.
- B. In the performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall not discriminate against any employee, subcontractor, or applicant for employment because of race, color, creed, religion, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, national origin, ancestry, age, physical or mental disability, medical condition or any other unlawful basis.
- C. The captions appearing at the commencement of the sections hereof, and in any paragraph thereof, are descriptive only and for convenience in reference to this Agreement. Should there be any conflict between such heading, and the section or paragraph at the head of which it appears, the section or paragraph hereof, as the case may be, and not such heading, shall control and govern in the construction of this Agreement. Masculine or feminine pronouns shall be substituted for the neuter form and vice versa, and the plural shall be substituted for the singular form and vice versa, in any place or places herein in which the context requires such substitution(s).
- D. The waiver by AGENCY or CONTRACTOR of any breach of any term, covenant or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant or condition or of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant or condition herein contained. No term, covenant or condition of this Agreement shall be deemed to have been waived by AGENCY or CONTRACTOR unless in writing.
- E. Each right, power and remedy provided for herein or now or hereafter existing at law, in equity, by statute, or otherwise shall be cumulative and shall be in addition to every other right, power, or remedy provided for herein or now or hereafter existing at law, in equity, by statute, or otherwise. The exercise, the commencement of the exercise, or the forbearance of the exercise by any party of any one or more of such rights, powers or remedies shall not preclude the simultaneous or later exercise by such party of any of all of such other rights, powers or remedies.
- F. CONTRACTOR shall maintain any and all ledgers, books of account, invoices, vouchers, canceled checks, and other records or documents evidencing or relating to charges for services or expenditures and disbursements charged to AGENCY under this Agreement for a minimum of three (3) years, or for any longer period required by law, from the date of final payment to CONTRACTOR under this Agreement. All such documents shall be made available for inspection, audit, and/or copying at any time during regular business hours, upon oral or written request of AGENCY. In addition, pursuant to Government Code Section 8546.7, if the amount of public funds expended under this Agreement exceeds ten thousand dollars, all such documents and

this Agreement shall be subject to the examination and audit of the State Auditor, at the request of AGENCY or as part of any audit of AGENCY, for a period of three (3) years after final payment under the Agreement.

RESOLUTION NO. 2023-1854

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA, DIRECTING THE TRANSFER OF \$473,970 FROM THE AB 939 FUND TO THE CITY-WIDE GREEN STREET PHASE I PROJECT TO COVER THE CONSTRUCTION COSTS OF LAS VIRGENES ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

WHEREAS, The Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939), was passed because of an increase in the waste stream and the decrease in landfill capacity; and

Whereas, AB 939 requires cities and counties to reduce, reuse, recycle, and compost all discarded materials to the maximum extent feasible before any landfilling or other destructive method is used; and

Whereas, AB 939 authorized local jurisdictions to impose and collect fees based on the types or amounts of solid waste generated; and

WHEREAS, AB 939 funds can be used for projects reducing the amount of waste taken to landfill; and

WHEREAS, The City-Wide Green Street Phase I project includes storm water management techniques eliminating collection and disposal of waste and debris which would be taken to landfill; and

WHEREAS, City intends to award the project to GMZ Engineering, Inc. at the June 28, 2023 City Council meeting; and

WHEREAS, on June 21, 2023 the City Council adopted the Operating and Capital Improvement Budget for FY 2023-24; and

WHEREAS, Exhibit "A" hereof describes said budget amendments and the resultant impact to the budget line items; and

WHEREAS, the amount required to be transferred from the AB 939 fund to construct the project, including contingency, is \$473,970.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. A budget amendment appropriating \$473,970 for FY 2023-24 as more particularly described in Exhibit "A", attached hereto, is hereby approved.

Section 2. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of the Resolution and shall cause the same to be processed in the manner required by law.

Section 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this resolution and enter it into the book of original resolutions.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff requests direction from the Council on Sheriff service levels for contracted law enforcement services.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Calabasas contracts with Los Angeles County for municipal law enforcement services. The term of the current agreement is from July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2024. The agreement may be renewed for another 5 years at the option of the County Board of Supervisors with the consent of the City.

Each year the City is able to set sheriff service levels in the community through the Service Level Authorization form or SD-AD-575. The City contracts for Deputy Service Units (minutes/hours not deputies). Deputy Service Units include indirect costs associated with law enforcement services (station leadership, dispatch, admin support, vehicle, etc.) The City may also contract for special assignment deputies and

supplemental positions. Costs associated with deputies and other personnel are set by the County in the Master Rate Sheet that accompanies the SH-AD 575.

The information below summarizes page 1 of the proposed SH-AD 575 for FY 2023-2024:

- Deputy Sheriff Service Unit The City currently contracts for 9 Deputy Service Units (DSU). Each DSU has a base cost of \$499,296 per year. Additionally, the base cost is multiplied by a liability rate factor of 12%. The 9 DSUs total 26,280 hours per year. Approximately 14.688 deputies are required to meet contracted hours. The annual cost for the 9 DSUs totaled \$5,032,903.68.
- Deputy Sheriff Service Unit Bonus Examples of a bonus unit would be a
 detective or a Mental Evaluation Team (MET) deputy. The City does not contract
 for bonus units at this time.
- Growth/Grant Deputy Unit The Growth/Grant Deputy Unit was created to incentivize cities to grow their contracts or obtain grants for funding deputies. This deputy is calculated without some of the overhead cost attributed to a regular deputy. Currently the City is allocated 0.56 of a Special Assignment Deputy (the remaining 0.44 is under the contract of the City of Hidden Hills).
- Supplemental Positions The City contracts for the following:
 - o 1 Motor Deputy at a total annual cost of \$363,124.16
 - 0.29 of a Law Enforcement Technician at a total annual cost of \$39,041.61. This position is a fingerprint technician that is shared among the 5 cities serviced by the Lost Hills Station.
 - 0.5 of a Community Services Assistant at a total annual cost of \$44,298.80 per year. This is a parking enforcement Sheriff's employee that is shared with the City of Agoura Hills.

The following information summarizes page 2 of the SD-AD 575 for FY 2023-2024:

- Deputy Sheriff To meet the 9 DSUs paid for by Calabasas, deputies are scheduled as noted:
 - o 2 DSUs for the EM shift (10pm-6am)
 - o 2.4 DSUs for the AM shift (6am-2pm)
 - o 3 DSUs for the PM shift (2pm-10pm)
 - 0.6 of the 1.6 noted is a deputy sheriff scheduled at the discretion of the Captain.
 - 1.0 of the 1.6 is the Juvenile Team Deputy assigned to the schools
 - 1 deputy is assigned as the Motor Deputy

• Grant Deputy – The .56 Special Assignment Deputy accounts for the Community Liaison Deputy shared with the City of Hidden Hills.

In addition to the above, the City has the option to contract for other services. Historically, the City has not contracted for the services noted below:

- Routine Helicopter This supports ground units during non-life threatening or non-mutual aid activities. The cost is \$2,449 an hour charged on a per minute basis.
- License Detail This service falls under the Major Crimes Bureau and covers special business licensing and compliance on approximately 24 different types of businesses (businesses include ambulance companies, firearm dealers, massage parlors, tow companies, tattoo shops, etc.)
- STAR Deputy The program is currently unavailable but was a program in which deputies taught classes on school campuses.
- Other Supplemental Services Is intended for supplemental overtime if the City needs Sheriff support for community events (parades, festivals, sports events).

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

As currently presented, the City of Calabasas will pay \$5,621,368.01 for law enforcement services provided by the LA County Sheriff's Department for the 2023-2024 fiscal year. This represents an increase of \$441,838.58 from fiscal year 2022-2023.

Costs for Sheriff services are borne by the General Fund (\$5,525,000) and COPS grant funds (\$100,000). Any modification to staffing levels would be reflected in a revised SH-AD-575 Service Level Authorization form and would increase/decrease the annual cost for municipal law enforcement services.

At its June 21, 2023 meeting, the Council adopted a budget with a General Fund surplus of approximately \$180,000. Should changes in the SH-AD 575 be more than \$180,000, the City will need to review General Fund revenues and expense and adjust accordingly.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Provide direction on changes, if any, to Sheriff service levels for the 2023-2024 fiscal year.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the City Council introduce an ordinance adding a new Chapter 5.22 requiring the provision of security by certain commercial retailers to the Calabasas Municipal Code.

BACKGROUND:

The City has recently experienced an increase in commercial retail thefts and property crimes, particularly at certain larger shopping centers. As part of its multi-pronged response effort, the City has reached out to landlords and retailers regarding security improvements and cooperative crime reduction efforts. Most landlords and larger commercial retailers have been responsive and taken proactive steps to improve retail security. Some, however, have failed to do so, and the staff recommends the Council consider the attached ordinance to impose security requirements on certain larger commercial landlords and retailers.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The City Council directed the City Attorney's Office to draft the attached ordinance to impose stronger retail security requirements. The attached ordinance adds a new Chapter 5.22 to the Calabasas Municipal Code, requiring certain landlords and commercial retailers in the Commercial Mixed Use, Commercial Retail, and Commercial Old Town zones to adopt and implement security plans.

Specifically, the proposed ordinance requires commercial landlords with more than six tenants and commercial retailers operating stores with greater than 5,000 square feet in any Commercial Mixed Use, Commercial Retail, and Commercial Old Town zone of the City to provide adequate security for their tenants and customers, requiring all qualifying commercial landlords and retailers to develop and implement a City approved security plan. Qualifying commercial retailers and landlords who fail to submit or implement the security plan, or who experience three or more calls for service within a month, will be required to pay for extra Sheriffs and City security response costs.

The proposed ordinance requires qualifying commercial retailers and landlords to report all suspected crimes, including thefts, to the Sheriff's Department and City. The proposed ordinance also prohibits businesses from disciplining or terminating an employee from employment for reporting a suspected crime to law enforcement or the City that occurred at a commercial business in the City.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The cost of preparing the draft ordinance is accounted for within the budget. Enforcement will entail some additional costs in code enforcement, expected to be offset via cost recovery.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Staff recommends the City Council introduce and conduct a first reading of Ordinance No. 2023-403 and provide direction to staff as deemed appropriate.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA, ADDING CHAPTER 5.22 – PROVISION OF SECURITY BY COMMERCIAL LANDLORDS AND RETAILERS TO THE CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE.

WHEREAS, the City of Calabasas (the "City"), under the police powers delegated to it by the California Constitution, has the authority to enact laws that promote the public health, safety and general welfare of its residents; and

WHEREAS, commercial business in the City are experiencing a rash of thefts; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that in the absence of appropriate security at businesses, the City's citizens, visitors and business employees are vulnerable to abductions, robberies, and other similar criminal acts, despite the provision of law enforcement services; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City to protect its residents and property owners from the potential adverse impacts of crime; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to amend certain sections of the Municipal Code to require commercial retailers to provide adequate security; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to protect the public health, safety, general welfare, and quiet enjoyment of property in the City by the adoption of this ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council finds that all the facts, findings, and conclusions set forth above in this Ordinance are true and correct.

SECTION 2. Environmental Determination. The City Council hereby finds and determines that it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the adoption of this ordinance adding certain retail security requirements will have a significant effect on the environment. Accordingly, under the provisions of § 15061(b)(3) and § 15378(b)(5) of Division 6 of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations, the CEQA Guidelines, the adoption of this ordinance is not subject to the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act.

SECTION 3. The City Council hereby adds Section 5.22 to the Calabasas Municipal Code to read as follows:

Chapter 5.22 – Provision of Security By Commercial Landlords and Retailers

5.22.010. Purpose. The purpose of this article is to protect the public health, safety, and general welfare by requiring retail commercial landlords and retailers to provide adequate security.

5.22.020. Application. Commercial landlords with more than six Retail, Entertainment and Recreation, Services, or Eating/Drinking Places and Food Services tenants, and commercial retailers operating stores with greater than 5,000 square feet, located in any Commercial Mixed-Use zone, Commercial Retail zone, or Commercial Old Town zone of the City are required to provide adequate security for their tenants and customers. Commercial landlords and retailers subject to this Section 5.22.020 are required to develop and implement a security plan, as approved by the City Manager. The security plan shall detail how the commercial retailer will provide adequate security for their tenants and customers, will respond to future criminal acts, and may require the commercial retailer to hire private security or install physical security improvements. Commercial retailers subject to this chapter shall not be required to develop and implement a security plan, if their commercial landlord has already done so and it has been approved by the City Manager.

5.22.030. Responsibility for Cost of Security Response. Commercial landlords and retailers subject to Section 5.22.020 who fail to submit a security plan to the City Manager within 30 days of a written demand by the City, or who fail to comply with their security plan's requirements, are responsible for the cost of any police or City security response to robberies, thefts, and other criminal acts at the property.

Unless provided otherwise by the City Manager in writing, Commercial landlords and retailers subject to section 5.22.020 shall additionally be responsible for the cost of any police or City security response to robberies, thefts, and other criminal acts at their property after:

- having been given written notice by the City stating that the commercial landlord or retailer will be held liable for the costs of providing police response and City security response personnel over and above the normal services provided by the City via the Sheriff's Department to those premises; and
- 2. three or more calls for service related to property crimes have occurred in a month or three or more documented property crimes have occurred at the property in a month.

Commercial landlords and retailers subject to section 5.22.020 shall be jointly and severally liable for the costs of each subsequent police response and city security response necessary to respond to calls for service until one year has passed after the City issued the written notice.

5.22.040. Reporting of Crime. Commercial landlords and retailers subject to section 5.22.020 shall report all suspected crimes, including any thefts of merchandise worth at least \$500, to the Sheriff's Department and City within fifteen days. Commercial landlords and retailers subject to section 5.22.020 shall pay a fine of \$100 for each day that any such mandatory report is delayed.

5.22.050. Misdemeanor to Terminate an Employee for Reporting a Crime. Any employer in the City is prohibited from disciplining or terminating an employee from employment for reporting a suspected crime to law enforcement or the City that occurred at a commercial business in the City. Any person or business that terminates an employee from employment or who disciplines them for reporting a suspected crime to law enforcement or the City that occurred at a commercial business in the City is guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to punishment as provided in this Code, including, but not limited to, under Section 1.16.020 of this Code.

5.22.060 - Violation—Penalty.

- A. Every person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable, after lawful conviction, by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or by imprisonment in the county jail for a period not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
- B. Every violation of any provision of this chapter shall constitute a public nuisance and shall be subject to civil nuisance abatement proceedings as allowed by this Code and under applicable law.
- C. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prevent a person from being prosecuted, convicted, or sentenced for a violation of any lesser or related city, state, or federal statutes which might impose different penalties.
- D. The enforcement authority provided in this chapter shall be cumulative and in addition to any other procedures provided by the laws of the city or the state for the abatement or enforcement of any of the conditions described in this chapter, and abatement or enforcement pursuant to the provisions of this chapter shall not prejudice or affect any other action, civil or criminal, for the abatement or enforcement of any such condition.

<u>SECTION 4.</u> Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council of the City of Calabasas hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each

section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

<u>SECTION 5.</u> Effective Date: This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its passage and adoption pursuant to California Government Code Section 36937 and shall supersede any conflicting provision of any City of Calabasas ordinance.

SECTION 6. Certification: The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published or posted according to law.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council receive and file this progress update on the FY 22/23 Strategic Priorities.

BACKGROUND:

On April 13, 2022, the City Council formally adopted the FY 2022/23 Strategic Priorities as a means of prioritizing the City's policy areas of focus, as well as aligning specific projects and initiatives in support of the City's mission. The final Strategic Priorities selected were: (1) Environmental Leadership, (2) Fiscal Resiliency, (3) Public Safety & Emergency Preparedness, (4) Recreation, Youth & Senior Services, (5) Organizational Excellence, and (6) Development & Infrastructure.

To accomplish the adopted Strategic Priorities, the City Council also approved the fiscal year 2022/23 Workplan, which outlines staff action items and due dates towards the accomplishment of 12 Objectives to be carried out by the end of the fiscal year. As a result, the Workplan provides the benefit of properly allocating City resources and staff time, while also measuring project performance and staff deliverables throughout the year.

DISCUSSION:

This report serves as a progress update on the FY 2022/23 Strategic Priorities. The following is a brief summary on the status of each Objective:

OBJECTIVE 1: IDENTIFY POTENTIAL REAL PROPERTY ACQUISITIONS FOR THE PURPOSES OF FUTURE PARKLAND OR OPEN SPACE DESIGNATION.

Over the last year, the City Council has directed staff to consider several properties that could be zoned as parkland or open space. The Open Space Committee convened in April to prioritized potential properties and direct staff on the acquisition of parcels. Staff will continue efforts to acquire property once further direction is received from the City Council.

OBJECTIVE 2: DEVELOP A WATER RESILIENCE PLAN OUTLINING STRATEGIES TO INCREASE THE CITY'S DROUGHT PREPAREDNESS, LOCAL WATER SELF-RELIANCE, AND PLANTING OF NATIVE VEGETATION (INCLUDING MILKWEED FOR MONARCH BUTTERFLY HABITATS).

<u>Water Reduction</u> – Under the 2022 emergency drought conditions, the City met or exceeded all State and LVMWD imposed water restrictions. Effective June 2023, all water restrictions have been eliminated due to above average water reservoir and snow pack levels. In an effort to continues the City's efforts to be water-wise, the City has maintained reductions for all City parks, medians, and parkways.

Landscape Transition to Drought Tolerant Plants -

- Phase 1 of the Mulholland Highway Gap Closure and Shoulder Improvements projects included the removal of turf, conversion of irrigation systems, and installation of drought tolerant plants.
- Thousand Oaks Blvd. was partially transitioned through the installation of drought tolerant trees and modification/shutoff of irrigation. Thousand Oaks Blvd. will continue its transition after the allocation of additional funds in fiscal year 2023/24.
- The south section of the Lost Hills median adjacent to De Anza Park has been transitioned to drought tolerant plants and stone.
- The Calabasas Tennis and Swim entry transition to drought tolerant plants is 50% complete. Project work will continue after the allocation of additional funds in fiscal year 2023/24.
- The Calabasas Civic Center transition to drought tolerant plants is 20% complete. Project work will continue after the allocation of additional funds in fiscal year 2023/24.

OBJECTIVE 3: CREATE AN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PLAN TO ATTRACT BUSINESSES, FILL VACANT PROPERTIES, AND PROMOTE ADVANTAGES OF CONDUCTING BUSINESS IN CALABASAS.

The City has designated the Community Development Director as the primary point of contact for Chamber of Commerce and Valley Economic Alliance, who successfully spotlighted the benefits of conducting business in Calabasas at last year's Valley Economic Alliance Forum. The City also provided complimentary use of the Civic Center to host events for the Calabasas Film Festival, Chamber Spooky Fiesta, and Chamber Silent Auction events.

Staff and the Chamber of Commerce have started negotiations for a new agreement in which the Chamber would conduct an annual business satisfaction survey and manage a dedicated webpage on *How to Start a Business in Calabasas*. Both items will be incorporated into the new agreement that staff anticipates is finalized by the September 2023.

OBJECTIVE 4: CONDUCT A FEASIBILITY STUDY REGARDING THE STATIONING OF CELL TOWERS ON PUBLICLY OWNED SITES TO EXPAND COVERAGE AREAS.

Staff will be reviewing proposals for the stationing of cell towers on public with the Wireless Committee on June 26. After receiving direction, staff will present the Committee recommendation to the Communications and Technology Commission, followed by the City Council for final approval.

DEVELOP A CITY READINESS & EDUCATION INITIATIVE FOR OBJECTIVE 5: EARTHQUAKE AND FIRE EMERGENCIES. SUPPORT HOME **HARDENING** PROGRAMS. FIRE SAFE COUNCILS, AND **EMERGENCY EQUIPMENT** PROCUREMENT.

Emergency Communication

The City coordinated with LA County Office of Emergency Management to successfully launch Zonehaven for LVMCOG cities on October 24, 2022. Following this launch, the City continues to promote the "Know Your Zone" campaign to residents and continues to create new City policies that align with the Zonehaven emergency response notification system. City staff continues regular meetings with EPIC, to coordinate on emergency preparedness matters related to emergency communication and home hardening.

Infrastructure

 The City's AM radio repeater has been modified to allow internet and remote access, as well as solar power battery backup.

- The mobile Emergency Operations Center has been ordered but is backordered until Sep 2023.
- On May 31 the City Council adopted the Woolsey Fire Spending Plan, which included the purchase of 50 battery backup devices for medical baseline and critical care residents

OBJECTIVE 6: REVIEW LOS ANGELES SHERIFF DEPARTMENTS SERVICES AND CONSIDER OPPORTUNITIES TO REALIGN FUNDING AND SERVICES, WITH SPECIFIC FOCUS ON OPEN SPACE BREAK-INS, HOA/NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH COORDINATION, AND REMEDIATION OF STREET RACING.

Staff has met regularly with the Lost Hills Captain to discuss public safety priorities, including those related to on school safety, residential burglaries, and street racing.

In April, staff, the Lost Hills Captain, and Los Angeles County Sheriff Contract Division met to discuss the City's current Sheriff's contract. Staff requested a detailed overview of contract expenses and services, as well as the review of the allotment of Sheriff deputy hours for patrol, motor and J-Team assignments. Staff will present the new Sheriff's Department contract, including proposed service levels, at the June 28 City Council meeting.

Staff are coordinating with the Lost Hills Captain to discuss the Realtime Crime and Disaster Center and its pilot Virtual Patrol Deputy program that would leverage private sector technology to address current public safety concerns. Staff will also be utilizing the services of a public safety consulting firm to review the City's current public safety landscape and to collaborate on innovative solutions.

OBJECTIVE 7: REOPEN THE AGOURA HILLS CALABASAS COMMUNITY CENTER.

Roof repair work started in May 2023, with general repair and maintenance work also ongoing. Due to funding delays related to federal wage compliance requirements, staff anticipates a facility reopening date at the beginning of 2024. In the interim, staffing and programming are being coordinated.

OBJECTIVE 8: CONDUCT FEASIBILITY STUDY OF ADDING BASKETBALL COURTS, SOCCER FIELDS, OR SKATE PARKS TO IMPROVE RECREATION PROGRAMS AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR TEENAGERS.

A contract with Pros Consulting was executed in April 2023 with an expected completion date of August 2023. Staff will present results to the Parks,

Recreation, and Education Commission and City Council before end of the 2023 calendar year.

OBJECTIVE 9: UPGRADE PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT, TRAILS, AND PATHWAYS AT CITY PARKS.

Gates Canyon Park replacement is ongoing. Staff is working with Little Tykes to finalize the design phase and expects Brandon's Village demolition to occur by late Fall 2023.

The RPOSD grant for the refurbishment the De Anza Park court will be submitted to the City Council in August 2023.

The preliminary design of the Freedom Park redesign will be presented to the Parks, Education, and Recreation Commission in October 2023.

OBJECTIVE 10: COMPLETE A FULL AND PERMANENT BUILD OUT OF WILD WALNUT PARK TO INCLUDE A DOG AND CHILDREN'S PARK.

In Aug 2022, City Council approved moving approximately \$700K in CIP funding from fiscal years 2023 and 2024 into 2022 for a total of \$800K for the Wild Walnut Park improvements. Infrastructure improvements made to the Park include included the parking lot, retaining walls, sidewalk, and storm drains.

Staff are preparing the project bid packet and will issue in July 2023, with staff expecting construction start in Fall 2023.

<u>OBJECTIVE 11</u>: COMPLETE ANNEXATION OF CRAFTSMAN'S CORNER. DEVELOP A PLAN TO ANNEX OTHER PROPERTIES WITHIN THE CITY'S SPHERE OF INFLUENCE.

Staff met with the CEO's Office to develop draft terms for the property transfer, including a review of the tax sharing agreement. Staff has completed review, provided comments back to CEO's office, and is waiting for additional comments from Hidden Hills and the County.

OBJECTIVE 12: PROVIDE OPTIONS THAT ALLOW FOR THE RELIEF OF TRAFFIC CONGESTION WITHIN THE CITY.

In April staff received \$169,300 in grants to fund intersection improvements recommend by the LRSP. Staff will present budget amendment, contract award, and projects overview before the end of calendar year 2023.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

There is no fiscal impact, as this item is being presented to the City Council for informational purposes only.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Staff recommends that the City Council receive and file this progress update on the FY 22/23 Strategic Priorities.
