


HOLIDAY TOY DRIVE - FINAL COLLECTION DAY NEWS

Huichol Suenos by: Brett Mask

After two years wearing a mask, the one hanging on my living room wall reminds me of a week in the mountains outside Guadalajara. Twenty miles west of the city, I visited a small health spa nestled in the Bosque Primavera, a volcanic region with pine and oak woodlands, nature-trails and thermal hot springs at 7,000 feet. On the recommendation of a friend, away from the microwaves, traffic and drama of my life, the 'espiritu,' (spirit) of the environment, washed over me; I felt calm and relaxed.

The days ebbed and flowed into one another. Cozy and understated with a main club house for meals, adobe cottages with fireplaces, treatment rooms and a pool, I enjoyed the mud wraps, and a horse ride through the woods. Was it the mountains or the desert? There was a serenity to the land.

The mask, reminds me of the evening after I arrived. I went for a dip in the pool and a slight drizzle began. Looking up at the twinkling stars like diamonds against the midnight blue sky, the sliver of the moon reminded me of the nursery rhyme, "when the cow jumped over the moon." The night, the water and rain washed over me. After my swim, I went back to my room and built a fire in the kiva fireplace to warm up.

Good food, fresh air and dips in the hot springs filled the days. Another day I rode around the park on horseback, where bulls were corralled. The high desert looked so barren and is where the Huichol escaped the Spanish troops to retain their culture and spiritual beliefs. They were the last tribe to be conquered by the Spanish.

One day, mid-morning a Huichol Indian wearing a white cotton tunic, baggy white pants, hat, and a bag slung across his body, sat on the ground at the pool holding a 12" x 7" wood shaped mask with slits for the eyes and mouth. A direct descendant of the Aztecs, with one finger he was placing brightly colored glass beads into the beeswax on the wood creating geometric patterns.

I asked him what he was making. (In Spanish I can ask questions, but don't always understand all of the answers.) He said the symbols are from dreams. I later learned the bead art is the Huichol (Wee choe) form of writing that records their ancient wisdom, mythology and traditions. The people learn from the symbols, through their rituals, visions and dreams. In my mind's eye I can still see him add beads to the large yellow, orange and red peyote cactus on the forehead, the essence of life, health, accomplishment and good fortune. A green snake zig zagged down the nose. His spirit peaceful and gentle, I asked if I could buy it when he finished.

He returned two days later, the mask completed with four yellow and orange deer, a turtle on the chin and seven peyote symbols interspersed. The ceremonial mask protects the wearer to enter into a mythical state to communicate with the supernatural. Is this a form of praying and listening to the great spirit from an ancient civilization? The mask, a symbol of a pre-Hispanic culture, the beaded art represents how "Life is a constant object of prayer for the Huichol." The mask reminds me of the places and experiences I have visited over the years, unexpected adventures and suenos (dreams).

JANUARY RECIPE CREAMY MUSHROOM PASTA

It's the start of a new year and the holiday season has wrapped up. Many look for a break from all of the cooking and baking, after a busy season of family and friend gatherings. This is an easy and quick meal that takes less than half hour and is a nice warm meal on a cold day.

- 4 tbsp. olive oil
- 1 lb. mixed mushrooms torn into bite-size pieces
- 2 medium shallots, finely chopped
- 1 lb. spaghetti or bucatini
- 1/2 cup heavy cream
- 1/3 cup finely chopped parsley

- Zest and juice of 1/2 lemon
- 2 tbsp. unsalted butter, cut into pieces
- 1/2 oz. Parmesan, finely grated (about 1/2 cup), plus more for serving
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 1. Heat 2 tbsp. oil in a Dutch oven or other large pot over medium-high. Cook half of mushrooms in a single layer, undisturbed, until edges are brown and starting to crisp, about 3 minutes.
- 2. Give mushrooms a toss and continue to cook, tossing occasionally, until all sides are brown and crisp, about 5 minutes more. Using a slotted spoon, transfer mushrooms to a plate; season with salt.
- 3. Repeat with remaining 2 tbsp. oil and mushrooms and more salt.
- 4. Reduce heat to medium-low and return all of the mushrooms to the pot. Add shallots and cook, stirring often, until shallots are translucent and softened, about 2 minutes.
- 5. Meanwhile, cook pasta in a large pot of boiling salted water, stirring occasionally, until very al dente, about 2 minutes less than package directions.
- 6. Using tongs, transfer pasta to pot with mushrooms and add cream and 1 cup pasta cooking liquid. Increase heat to medium, bring to a simmer and cook, tossing constantly until pasta is al dente and liquid is slightly thickened, about 3 minutes.
- 7. Remove pot from heat. Add lemon zest and juice, parsley, butter, 1/2 oz. Parmesan, and lots of pepper and toss to combine. Taste and season with more salt if needed.

A Savvy Senior Excellent Adventure!

On Saturday, December 2nd 2023, a group of Savvy Seniors had an opportunity to visit one of the largest sports and concert venues in the NFL SoFi Stadium in Inglewood. Located on the former grounds of the Hollywood Park Racetrack, this venue is humongous! That fact was evident from the very beginning of our guided tour, while we were all standing at the very top of the stadium, gazing out over the entire venue. Our guide next shared that the stadium has a total of 100,000 seats. Then he pointed to a large oval ring, which was suspended high above the entire stadium. Called the Samsung Infinity Screen, this state-of-the-art, video board is used to project activities on the field, scores, videos, performers' images, etc. It was so much more impressive than an ordinary Jumbotron!

Our tour also included a stop at SoFi's VIP seats section. We got to try out the section's comfortable seats, as we looked out over the 50-yard line! Next, we checked out one of the Luxury Suites. The suite was the size of a mansion; it had its own restaurant, huge lounge, champagne tasting room, and game viewing room! Our guide mentioned that this wasn't just any Luxury Suite. Turns out it belonged to Stan Kroenke, the real estate developer and owner of the RAMS, who provided the funding to build SoFi Stadium. (He's also involved in building a new RAMS Training Center in Warner Center.) Our tour ended in the stadium's large locker room.

During our tour, we learned about SoFi's many unique architectural elements, such as: its roof canopy, called The Oculus (with translucent properties which allow natural sunlight to illuminate the field, while providing shelter to the fans) and an open-air plaza which makes it easy for fans to navigate the stadium while enjoying a panoramic view of Los Angeles). We also learned some fun facts about the stadium, including:

- ·SoFi This is an acronym for the company that bought the naming rights to the stadium. That company, Social Financing, made its money financing student loans.
- ·100,000 The total number of seats in the stadium.70,000 of those seats are permanent, while 30,000 are SRO (Standing-Room-Only) seats. (There are also 260 Luxury Suites in the complex.)
- ·2 Teams The stadium is home to two teams: the RAMS and the CHARGERS. Systems are in place to change the stadium's signage to reflect which team is currently in residence.
- ·20%/80% Because SoFi is located in LAX's flight path, only 20% of the building could be built above ground, with the remaining 80% had to be built underground.
- ·248,000 LEDs The number of LEDs on the Samsung Infinity Screen.
- •\$5B The amount of money Stan Kroenke provided from his personal wealth to build the stadium.
- •A Falconer SoFi employs a falconer to execute its unique strategy for keeping the stadium pristine and free from bird droppings. Each morning, the falconer releases its three hawks to "survey the premises!"

After our SoFi tour, we had lunch at The Pointe in El Segundo. The Pointe was a wonderful combination of a community park with a mini-lake, and a variety of eateries which surrounded the greenspaces.

All in all, it was a great day exploring a local landmark. Thanks to my Excursion Committee colleague, Dotty Corcoran, for planning this excellent adventure!


