






SEPTEMBER

Living With Urban Coyotes

Everyone enjoys observing wildlife in its natural environment. However, many well-meaning residents of urban hillside and rural areas have promoted an unnatural boldness in coyotes by intentionally or unintentionally feeding them. Recognize that the coyote is indigenous to Calabasas. We built our city in the coyote's backyard and the coyote has adapted to this environment. We should adapt to the presence of the coyote. There are precautions residents should take to mitigate unwanted interactions.

What You Can Do to Protect Your Family, Pets, Poultry and Livestock?

DO'S

- Keep your cat or small dog indoors at night or any other time when a coyote is known to be in the area
- Accompany your small dog in a well-lighted area at night for comfort walks
- Walk your dog on a leash whenever you take it off of your property
- Confine poultry and rabbits in covered enclouures construteded with heavy mesh wire. Coyotes can break through ordinary chicken wire
- Keep all outdoor trash can lids securely fastened to trash containers
- Pick backyard fruit as soon as it ripens and keep rotten fruit off the ground

DONT'S

- Don't feed wild animals
- Don't leave pet food outside, particularly at night
- Don't allow pets to roam from home, especially at night
- Don't leave water bowls for pets outdoors
- Don't leave garbage containers open
- Don't leave water in birdbaths or bird seed outdoors for songbirds

Explore Your Neighborhood

There are many ways to enjoy nature and wildlife in and around Calabasas, here are just a few family-friendly weekend activities:

- Walk the Las Virgenes Creek Trail. The trail follows the Las Virgenes Creek and runs from north of Agoura Road between Lost Hills Road and Las Virgenes and ends across the street from De Anza Park.
- Visit the Leonis Adobe Museum and see one of the oldest surviving private residences in Los Angeles County. Just down the street you'll find the Calabasas Farmers Market on Saturday mornings.
- King Gillette Ranch is located just south of Calabasas on Mulholland Highway off of Las Virgenes Road. The Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area offers hiking through meadows and along ridgelines which serve as a wildlife corridor for the region.

Anticoagulant Rodenticides Are you poisoning your pets and wildlife?

Using rodenticides produces short-term results but do not solve pest problems in the long term. The poison leads to a slow, painful death for all animals that ingest it, whether it's a pest, wildlife or domestic pet. As the animals weaken, they become easy prey for predators and opportunistic scavengers, killing animals that feed on poisoned prey (secondary exposure). This affects both the predator/scavenger and their offspring.

In 2013, The City adopted Resolution No. 2013-1379 urging businesses in Calabasas to no longer sell or use anticoagulant rodenticides, urging all property owners to cease purchasing or using anticoagulant rodenticides on their properties in Calabasas, and committing the City of Calabasas to not using anticoagulant rodenticides as part of its maintenance program for City-owned parks and facilities.

In 2020, the State of California passed the California Ecosystems Protection Act of 2020 (AB 1788) to minimize unintended poisonings from Second Generation Anticoagulant Rodenticides (SGARs). Despite the Bill's implementation, a 2022 California Department of Fish and Wildlife study found that 70% of the tested animals had exposure to anticoagulant rodenticides, including SGARs. In 2023, AB1322 was passed and adds diphacinone to the existing rodenticide moratorium to better protect wildlife from unintentional rodenticide poisoning. It also requires that the Department of Pesticide Regulation enact stronger, permanent restrictions on second generation anticoagulant rodenticides and diphacinone to limit unintended wildlife poisonings.


To manage pests without harmful poisoning, ensure that you remove sources of food or strong odors around your property Remove any standing water (including fountains) and repair leaky pipes Remove any sources of shelter: wood piles, boxes, tires, debris and overgrown plants. Seal all cracks and crevices that may lead into your home, garage, attic, and crawl space. Use quarter inch metal mesh (not chicken wire) to seal off entry points, and steel wool for smaller holes. Keep a 2 foot space between bushes, remove tree limbs within 3 feet of roofs and keep grass 2 inches tall.

"Pests," such as rodents, serve a very important purpose in our ecosystem as food chain sources for other wildlife and as seed dispersers perpetuating the growth of vegetation. By using alternative methods in our homes and gardens, we can alleviate many rodent and pest problems, while allowing all animals to continue to play the vital roles they fulfill in nature.



Backyard Composting

Backyard composting is an attractive, simple method of managing organic wastes at home. It has the advantage of being readily adaptable to fit individual lifestyles, income, yard size, and overall ambition. Backyard composting can be performed by a variety of methods. Typically, these include placing materials in open piles, burying materials in pits or trenches and enclosing materials in drums or bins (e.g., holding bins, turning bins, and worm bins). In order to heat up properly, compost piles should be at least one cubic yard in size. This provides the minimal insulation required to sustain the high temperatures in the core of the pile. Composting bins can either be commercial units, or can be simply constructed from inexpensive materials with little carpentry skills.



Start the composting process with 50% green materials and 50% brown materials cut into pieces no larger than 1" in size.

Mix the materials and add water every 7-10 days. Your compost is ready to use when it's dark brown, crumbly and smells like fresh turned earth.

The compost produced by composting is an excellent soil conditioner. It enhances the structure of soil by binding soil particles

together. This improves aeration and helps soil to retain water and nutrients. Compost also improves drainage in clay soils and water retention in sandy soils. Compost improves the buffering capacity of the soil and minimizes adverse effects to plants due to extreme shifts in soil pH. Adding compost to soil also attracts earthworms, which aerate the soil and add additional nutrients to the soil. Compost can store nutrients and release them slowly for use by surrounding plants. Although highly beneficial for soil, most composts are not considered fertilizers because they lack the amount of nitrogen necessary to be classed a fertilizer. Recycle Your Batteries the Right Way

More than 97% of lead-acid batteries are recycled, making it one of the most recycled consumer products in the world. However, the recycling rate for lithium-ion batteries is currently around 5%.

When improperly disposed of, batteries can leak heavy harmful metals, such as nickel, cadmium and lithium which contaminate our local soils, groundwater, and streams. If incinerated, batteries release toxic gases containing heavy metals into the atmosphere.

To prevent fires from batteries, tape battery terminals and/or place batteries in separate plastic bags and never put these batteries in household garbage or recycling bins.



Step 1: Use tape or Insulating sticker



Step 2: Place tape on positive (+) end



Step 3: Fold tape over edges

Please ensure the safety of our roads and the continued success of our battery recycling program. Insulate the positive (+) end before disposing of your battery!
