SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 2020-381, amending Title 8 of the Calabasas Municipal Code (CMC), specifically Chapter 8.07, to extend the safe distance siting standard for playgrounds and other outdoor activity areas for children from the current minimum of 300 feet to a minimum of 500 feet from the Ventura Freeway (Attachment A).

BACKGROUND:

On January 22, 2020, following a staff report, and based upon a Planning Commission recommendation of approval, the City Council conducted a public hearing and introduced Ordinance No. 2020-381 to establish within Title 8 of the Calabasas Municipal Code a revised safe siting distance standard of 500 feet (increased from 300 feet) for playgrounds and outdoor activity areas for children.

Following discussion of the draft ordinance and the accompanying staff report, the City Council voted (4 - 1) to introduce and waive further reading of the Ordinance No. 2020-381.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Staff efforts to implement this ordinance will be covered as part of standard Planning and Building and Safety services.

REQUESTED ACTION:

That the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 2020-381, amending Title 8 of the Calabasas Municipal Code (CMC), specifically Chapter 8.07, to extend the safe distance siting standard for playgrounds and other outdoor activity areas for children from the current minimum of 300 feet to a minimum of 500 feet from the Ventura Freeway.

ORDINANCE NO. 2020-381

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING A SAFE DISTANCE SITING STANDARD OF 500 FEET FROM THE VENTURA FREEWAY FOR PLAYGROUNDS AND OTHER OUTDOOR ACTIVITY AREAS FOR CHILDREN.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Calabasas has determined that it is a matter of critical concern to protect our children from undue and potentially harmful exposure to excessive noise, air pollution, and other health safety hazards; and,

WHEREAS, the Calabasas 2030 General Plan Conservation Element identifies young children among the segments of the population particularly vulnerable to periodic exposure of poor air quality, and that automobile traffic is the primary source of air pollution in Calabasas; and,

WHEREAS, the Ventura Freeway accommodates more than 180,000 vehicles per day, a traffic volume nearly eight times greater than the volume carried by the next most heavily traveled roadway in the city; and,

WHEREAS, the Ventura Freeway, inclusive of the freeway segment traversing the City of Calabasas, is a designated hazardous materials haul route, which introduces the potential for additional health hazard exposure risks to vulnerable segments of the city's population, including young children; and,

WHEREAS, the South Coast Air Quality Management District recommends locating sensitive receptor land uses, including outdoor play areas for children, at least 500 feet away from heavily traveled freeways;

NOW THERFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> **CODE AMENDMENT.** Chapter 8.07 of Title 8 of the Calabasas Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows (added text is denoted by <u>underlining</u>; deleted text is denoted as <u>strike through</u>):

CHAPTER 8.07

Safe Siting of Playgrounds and Outdoor Activity Areas for Children

Section 8.07.010: Purpose. The purpose of this chapter is to protect children in the community – especially where they congregate and play outdoors, including on

playgrounds and other outdoor activity spaces -- from undue and potentially hazardous exposure to excessive levels of noise, air pollution and other health hazard exposure risks associated with a major freeway.

Section 8.07.020: Definitions.

- A. <u>Playground or Other Outdoor Activity Space</u>. As used in this chapter, Playground or Other Outdoor Activity Space means any outdoor play space designed and constructed for use and enjoyment by groups of children 12 years of age or under for play and recreation (organized or unorganized), and which may include playground equipment and any combination of soft and hard surfaces.
- B. <u>Freeway</u>. As used in this chapter, Freeway means the Ventura Freeway, which is also known as U.S. Highway 101, for the entire length traversing the City, whether entirely or partially located within the city limits.
- C. <u>Freeway Edge</u>. As used in this chapter, the Freeway Edge means the outside limit of the outermost lane of traffic on the freeway, as delineated by the lane line. Freeway merge lanes, shoulders, walls, slopes and landscape areas fall outside of the freeway edge.

Section 8.07.030: Standards for the Safe Siting of Playgrounds and Outdoor Activity Areas for Children.

Any proposal to develop or locate a playground or outdoor activity area for children shall not develop or locate such facility on any site or in any manner that will result in any portion of the playground or outdoor activity area being closer than <u>fivethree</u> hundred (5300) feet from the nearest freeway edge.

Section 8.07.040. Exceptions.

The following types of playgrounds or outdoor activity areas for children shall be excepted from the requirements set out in Section 8.07.030:

- A. A playground or outdoor activity area for children 12 years of age or under which is proposed in association with, and on the same property as, a singlefamily residence or mobile home, and which is accessory to that residence for customary use by household occupants and their guests;
- B. A playground or outdoor activity area for children 12 years of age or under which is a component of a land use governed by section 17.12.070 or section 17.12.090 of Title 17 in this municipal code.

SECTION 2. **SEVERABILITY**.

Should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this Ordinance be rendered or declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect and, to that end, the provisions hereof are declared to be severable.

SECTION 3. CONSTRUCTION.

The City Council intends this Ordinance to supplement, not to duplicate or contradict, applicable state and federal law and this Ordinance shall be construed in light of that intent. To the extent the provisions of the Calabasas Municipal Code as amended by this Ordinance are substantially the same as the provisions of that Code as it read prior to the adoption of this Ordinance, those amended provisions shall be construed as continuations of the earlier provisions and not as new enactments.

SECTION 4. CEQA.

The City Council determines the adoption of this Ordinance regulating the location of certain playgrounds and outdoor activity areas is exempt from review under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") under section 15308 of the California Code of Regulations because the Ordinance is adopted to protect the City's outdoor, built environment from harmful air quality impacts. This Ordinance is further exempt from CEQA under section 15061, subdivision (b)(3), because "it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment."

SECTION 4. **EFFECTIVE DATE**.

This Ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its adoption pursuant to California Government Code section 36937.

SECTION 5. **CERTIFICATION**.

The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published or posted according to law.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve the renewal of the A.C. Stelle Middle School Joint Use Agreement between the City of Calabasas and the Las Virgenes Unified School District for an additional five years at \$60,000 per year with an annual cost of living adjustment.

BACKGROUND:

Over the years the City of Calabasas and the Las Virgenes Unified School District (LVUSD) have worked together on joint ventures to benefit the citizens of Calabasas. This effort continues to be expanded to suit the growing needs of the City, Community and LVUSD. Joint ventures have included development of four baseball fields and the Camp Calabasas program at Lupin Hill. Joint Use Agreements at both A.C. Stelle and A.E. Wright Middle Schools for gym and field space are also in place. Additionally, the City utilizes the High School for the annual 4th of July Celebration. In turn, the School Districts use of City facilities include: the Agoura Hills/Calabasas Community Center, De Anza Park, the Tennis and Swim Center and the Calabasas Civic Center.

School playgrounds and athletic fields serve as facilities for physical education and recreational programs. Schools are required by State Law to offer their facilities for public use, when not used by the School District in the mornings, afternoons, nights and weekends (Community Recreation Act). LVUSD conforms to this policy through a permit process, whereby an individual or group must complete a facilities use application and pay applicable fees in order to use the facility. LVUSD permits scheduling of many school facilities by the City and several outside groups and organizations. City of Agoura Hills, City of Westlake Village, AYBA, AYSO, WAGS, WVSL, and Agoura Pony Baseball each schedule activities at these facilities.

The City and LVUSD entered into a long term agreement (15 years) for A.C. Stelle Middle School in 2004. This enabled the District to complete school construction and provide much needed field and gym space for the City to expand its programs. This agreement called for an initial payment of \$385,000 by the City followed by fourteen annual payments of \$25,000. In addition to the \$735,000, the City also paid for the landscape maintenance for the upper and lower playfields (not to exceed \$70,000 per year). In August 2019, months before the expiration of the agreement, staff contacted LVUSD with a desire to begin negotiations to renew. After much back and forth, a five year agreement was met with approval by staff of both entities.

DISCUSSION:

Section 10900 of the California Education Code ("Community Recreation Act") authorizes cities and school districts to organize, promote and conduct programs for community recreation. It also authorizes the promotion and attainment of general educational and recreational objectives. As well as construction, maintenance and operation of recreation centers, including playgrounds and outdoor playing fields. As part of a broader effort to cooperatively address local issues, the City and LVUSD desire to jointly undertake the operation, use and maintenance of the recreational facilities in order to reduce capital and operational costs to both governmental jurisdictions. It is the desire of both parties to contract for the City's use and maintenance of certain park and recreational facilities at A.C. Stelle Middle School for community recreation activities.

The areas subject to use by the City are as follows:

- Upper Outdoor Playing Fields
- Lower Outdoor Playing Fields
- Hardscape Playing Surface Adjacent to Outdoor Playing Fields
- Gymnasium
- Restrooms Adjacent to Gymnasium

Parking Lots Serving the Playing Fields and Gymnasium.
 Parking includes the Rear Parking Lot behind the Gym (Monitored for ADA Parking Only).

Times of exclusive use by the City for the Playing Fields, Hardscape, Restrooms and Parking Lots are as follows:

School Days: 4:00 p.m. to dusk
 Non-School Days: 9:00 a.m. to dusk
 (No Outdoor City Use of Fields or Hardscape is permitted on Sundays)

Times of exclusive use by the City for the Gymnasium, Restrooms and Parking Lots are as follows:

• School Days: 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

• Non-School Days: Monday – Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Sundays 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

The term of this agreement shall be for a five year period. The City shall pay to LVUSD an annual sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000) due by January 15th, with annual upward adjustments based on the October published Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the Los Angeles/Orange County Metropolitan Statistical Area. The City shall continue to pay for the landscape maintenance of the upper and lower playfields. Based upon past history, this amount is not expected to exceed Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000) per year. The City and LVUSD shall also share (50/50) the cost for annual inspections of the bleachers and basketball standards. The City's share for these annual inspections shall not exceed Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500) per year.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Facility Use Fee shall be paid from Account No. 10-515-553600 and Maintenance shall be paid from Account No. 10-515-525305.

REQUESTED ACTION:

It is requested that the City Council approve the renewal of the A.C. Stelle Middle School Joint Use Agreement between the City of Calabasas and the Las Virgenes Unified School District for an additional five years at \$60,000 per year with an annual cost of living adjustment.

SCHOOL FACILITIES JOINT USE AGREEMENT

This School Facilities Joint Use Agreement ("Agreement") is hereby made and entered into this day of , by and between the CITY OF CALABASAS, a California municipal corporation ("City") and the LAS VIRGENES UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a California public school district ("District"). City and District are from time to time throughout this Agreement referred to as "Party" or "Parties"

WHEREAS:

- A. District operates Alice C. Stelle Middle School ("School") located at 22450 Mulholland Highway, Calabasas, CA 91302, in order to provide educational facilities for middle school students within the District's territory; and
- B. Section 10900 et seq. of the California Education Code ("Community Recreation Act") authorizes cities and school districts to organize, promote and conduct programs of community recreation for the promotion and attainment of general educational and recreational objectives and to construct, maintain and operate recreation centers, including playgrounds and outdoor playing fields; and
- C. Section 10910 of the Community Recreation Act provides that the governing body of any school district may use or grant the use of grounds of the school district to any other public authority for the purposes of the Act, whenever such use does not interfere with school uses; and
- D. City's Parks and Recreation Master Plan indicates a current need for additional parks and open space within City; and
- E. As part of a broader effort to cooperatively address local issues, the City and District desire to jointly undertake the operation, use and maintenance of recreational facilities in order to reduce capital and operational costs to both governmental jurisdictions, as well as emergency response activities and such other issues of common concern; and
- F. City and District desire to contract for City's use and maintenance of certain park and recreational facilities at the School for community recreation activities, and for use by District for education and recreation purposes pursuant to said Community Recreation Act, as the provisions thereof exist, or hereafter may be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and conditions hereinafter set forth, and pursuant to the provisions of the Community Recreation Act hereinabove referenced, it is agreed by the Parties as follows:

I. The Joint Facilities.

The property subject to this Agreement is located entirely at the School, as more specifically set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto as incorporated herein by reference. ("Joint Facilities") The Joint Facilities are more commonly known as the following properties:

- The upper outdoor playing fields,
- The lower outdoor playing fields, (both collectively, the "Playing Fields")

- The hardscape playing surface adjacent to the Playing Fields, ("Hardscape")
- The gymnasium, ("Gymnasium")
- The restrooms adjacent to the gymnasium ("Restrooms")
- The parking lots serving the Playing Fields, Hardscape and Gymnasium ("Parking Lots")
 Parking is inclusive of the rear parking lot behind gym (monitored for ADA parking only).
 - Access for emergency vehicles in shall be maintained at all times.

The Joint Facilities shall be made available by District to City for public recreation purposes consistent with this Agreement, the Community Recreation Act, and applicable law.

II. Term.

Except as provided herein, the term of this Agreement ("Term") shall be for a period of Five (5) years, commencing on January 1, 2020 ("Commencement Date") and expiring on December 31, 2024.

In the event that either party fails to observe any provision of this Agreement, the non-defaulting party shall send written notice to the defaulting party explaining the default ("Notice of Default") and the defaulting party shall have 30 days from the date of receipt of the Notice of Default to cure said default or, if the default cannot be cured within said 30 day period, to commence to cure said default and diligently pursue to completion a cure within a reasonable time (not to exceed 90 days unless extended by mutual agreement of the parties). If the defaulting party fails to cure the default within the time set forth above, the non-defaulting party may immediately terminate this Agreement by sending written notice of termination to the defaulting party.

Notwithstanding the above, if the default is due to failure to pay any sum required to be paid under this Agreement, the cure period shall be 14 days instead of 30 days.

III. <u>City Use of the Joint Facilities</u>.

A. Times of Exclusive Use. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, City shall have the exclusive right to use the Joint Facilities, or any portion thereof, for public park and recreational purposes during the following non-school hours:

1) Playing Fields, Hardscape, Restrooms and Parking Lots:

School days: 4:00 p.m. to dusk, but no later than 9:00 p.m.

Non-School days: 9:00 a.m. to dusk (Monday through Saturday), but no later than

9:00 p.m.

No City use shall be permitted on Sundays

2) <u>Gymnasium:</u>

School days: Mon - Thurs 4:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Fridays 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Non-School days: Mon - Sat: 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.

Sundays - 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

All other times of use are expressly reserved by District for District's use.

The parties acknowledge that City's right to use the Joint Facilities is exclusive and, except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, District shall not grant a right to use the Joint Facilities to any other person or entity without first obtaining the written consent of City. City staff member(s) shall be present during all times of use.

B. <u>Exception - Times Reserved by District for School Activities.</u> Notwithstanding the above, City shall not use any portion of the Joint Facilities that has been reserved by District in advance for school, District or parent support activities.

District shall provide to City a tentative master schedule of all reserved school, District and parent support activities that will be conducted at the Joint Facilities, or any portion thereof. District shall provide a tentative master schedule to City not later than September 15th of each school year during the Term. District shall make best good faith efforts to ensure that actual scheduled District events conform as closely as possible to the tentative master schedule. However, District shall have the right to change the scheduled time for a school, District or parent support activity upon providing written notice to City no less than 72 hours prior to City's next planned event at the Joint Facilities. Notwithstanding the above, District shall have the right to conduct activities of an emergency nature, as needed, at the Joint Facilities without providing prior written notice to the City.

If District reserves only a portion of the Joint Facilities for school, District or parent support activities, and the remaining portion of the Joint Facilities remains available for City use, City shall have the right to use the remaining non-reserved portion of the Joint Facilities for the purposes set forth in this Agreement, provided that City's use will not conflict or unreasonably interfere with District's activities at the Joint Facilities. If District closes campus due to an emergency situation, City shall honor such closure.

C. <u>City Scheduling of Events -Monthly Calendar.</u> City shall be responsible for scheduling all City use of the Joint Facilities during the Term. City shall provide to District, or its designated representative, a monthly calendar of all City programmed events intended to be conducted at the Joint Facilities, including a list of City employees or contractors who will be conducting each event. City shall submit said calendar not later than 14 days prior to the beginning of each upcoming month and enter use into the District's Facility Use Program (Facilitron).

City reserves the right to amend the scheduled time of an event from that set out in the monthly calendar provided that:

- (i) City provides District with written notice of the schedule amendment not later than 72 hours prior to (a) the time the City event was originally scheduled or (b) the rescheduled time for the City event, whichever is earlier, and
- (ii) the rescheduled event time does not conflict with a previously scheduled school, District or parent support event of District.
- D. <u>Total Time of Use.</u> District shall guarantee to City an annual hourly use of each of the following Joint Facilities as follows:
 - 1) Upper Playing Field not less than 900 hours per year
 - 2) Lower Playing Field not less than 900 hours per year
 - 3) Hardscape not less than 900 hours per year

- 4) Gymnasium- not less than 1,500 hours per year
- 5) Restrooms not less than 1,500 hours per year
- 6) Parking Lot not less than 1,500 hours per year

For purposes of this Agreement, a "year" shall be the time period commencing with the Commencement Date and ending on the 365th day following the Commencement date, and each 365-day period thereafter during the Term.

E. <u>Compliance with Law and Regulations</u>. City shall use the Joint Facilities in accordance with all applicable laws, policies and District regulations, as they may be amended from time to time. Participants at City sponsored events shall follow verbal and written instructions from District or school staff in conducting an event.

City and District may, by mutual agreement, establish such additional rules and regulations with regard to use of the Joint Facilities consistent with existing law and City and District regulations.

- F. <u>Prohibited Uses.</u> City shall not permit the following to occur on the Joint Facilities without first obtaining the written consent of District:
 - 1) No use of electronically amplified sound systems on any Playing Field or the Hardscape
 - 2) No installation of permanent bleachers on any Playing Field or the Hardscape
 - 3) No use of any lighting on any Playing Field or the Hardscape
 - 4) No parking of any vehicle on any Playing Field or the Hardscape, other than City maintenance vehicles
 - 5) No type of animal or pet show allowed at any of the Joint Facilities
 - 6) No inflatables or rebounding (e.g. bounce house) equipment
 - 7) No food or beverages (other than water) allowed inside Joint Facilities
 - 8) Use and/or presence of alcohol, tobacco or any illegal substance are forbidden AT ALL TIMES AT ALL SITES
 - 9) No outside advertising or fence banners allowed on district premises
- G. <u>No Commercial Uses</u>. City may not use the Joint Facilities directly nor may it assign, sublease or otherwise transfer any of its rights under this Agreement to a third party to use the Joint Facilities for commercial uses or events (e.g.: filming, corporate parties), without first obtaining the written consent of District.

In the event that District consents to a commercial use of the Joint Facilities, or any portion thereof, City and District hereby agree that any net proceeds generated from the commercial activity shall be divided evenly fifty percent (50%) to City and fifty percent (50%) to District.

"Commercial Use" shall not include (and this Section III.G shall not prohibit) (i) City's acceptance of public or private sponsorships for events conducted at the Joint Facilities, provided that the sponsorships conform to District policies and regulations, (ii) City's contracting out or leasing the Joint Facilities to outside non-profit or non-commercial groups for the purpose of providing City-sponsored programs, as more particularly set forth in Section VI herein and (iii) the operation of concession stands at City or City-sponsored events at the Joint Facilities.

District to be listed as Additionally Insured and provided insurance for any contracted users. Insurance must be provided to District's Facilities Department a minimum of two weeks in advance, consistent with Section VIII below.

If any signage or banners related to City activities (e.g.: sponsor logos, team symbols, etc.) are posted at the Joint Facilities, City shall remove or cause to be removed said signage or banners each evening at the conclusion of City activities for the day.

- H. <u>Placement of Containers and Equipment.</u> City may place containers for storage of necessary equipment for its activities upon the Joint Facilities, provided (i) the placement of said containers will not conflict or unreasonably interfere with District's activities at the Joint Facilities and (ii) City obtains the prior written consent from District to a mutually agreed location. At the end of each day, and whenever not in use, soccer goals shall be locked to the chain link fence.
- I. <u>Adherence to School Rules</u> the City must comply with directions listed below as well as written and verbal directions of school site staff members as to use of the facilities. This includes but shall not be limited to:
 - a. The City will ensure that children are not allowed in any rooms at any time without adult supervision.
 - b. The City will not allow anyone to enter any other internal building areas that are not part of this agreement (i.e. internal hallways or other classrooms).
 - c. The City will provide both the school site principal and the School District official responsible for City program oversight with current and updated emergency contact numbers for appropriate personnel.
 - d. The City will assume full responsibility for providing participants with pertinent information regarding their programs and applicable school rules.
 - e. The City will comply with site rules on manner and method of entering facilities, use of ancillary facilities (bathrooms, outdoor area, etc.) and available parking areas.
 - f. The City shall comply with the School District's recycling program goals by providing the appropriate training and receptacles for trash/ and recycling collection for their program usage.
 - g. The City is required to turn off lights and HVAC when space is not occupied. Failure to do so will result in penalty charges of costs incurred, plus 10%.
- K. <u>Other Facilities</u>. District shall make available to City other facilities at the School besides the Joint Facilities upon request by City and provided that other facilities are not already committed for a District use. All requests shall be made through the District's online facility use system, and subject to Tier II (Community and Staff) rates.

L. Cleaning of Facilities.

City shall be responsible to clean the facility, including: sweeping, mopping, wiping down surfaces (including walls), disinfecting restroom fixtures, removing trash and recyclables, replacing trash liners, restocking supplies on non-school days, and cleaning mirrors. District shall be responsible for using the floor scrubber on the gym floor a minimum of once per week to maintain a safe and clean surface. Should the City fail to properly clean the facilities, the District will charge the City the labor cost associated with clean-up. The time associated with the clean-up is at the sole discretion of the District.

IV. Consideration.

A. <u>City Consideration for Exclusive Use</u>. In consideration for the exclusive right to use the Joint Facilities as provided herein, second only to the District's rights as previously noted, the City shall

pay to District an annual sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars and No cents (\$60,000), with annual upward adjustment based on the October published Consumer Price Index for the Los Angeles/Orange County Metropolitan Statistical Area ("CPI"). In accordance with Section V (A - Maintenance Obligations), the City's annual cost of maintenance has been factored into the annual consideration.

Payment due annually on January 15th.

V. <u>Maintenance Obligations</u>.

- A. <u>City Maintenance Obligations</u>. City shall continue, at its sole cost and expense, maintain the following portions of the Joint Facilities:
 - 1) Upper Playing Field
 - 2) Lower Playing Field

City's maintenance obligations shall include (i) grass cutting, (ii) aeration, (iii) irrigation maintenance, (iv) fertilizing and such other activities as are necessary to maintain the turf and landscaped areas of the Playing Fields in a good and healthy condition, reasonable wear and tear excepted. In addition, seeding play areas shall occur two times per year using district approved seed and organic fertilizer.

The parties acknowledge that the anticipated maintenance costs to be borne by the City for the Playing Fields is approximately \$70,000 per year, subject to annual upward adjustment according to the Consumer Price Index for the Los Angeles/Orange County Metropolitan Statistical Area ("CPI"). This maintenance investment has been taken into consideration in the calculation of the annual lease amount.

In addition to the above, the City shall be responsible for the setting up, taking down, and routine cleaning of all equipment and facilities used by City. In addition to its general set up/take down obligations, City shall complete the following clean-up once all facility users depart. The following specific actions will be performed <u>at the end of each day</u>:

- 1) Sweep, mop and wipe down the gymnasium and bleachers (including any soiled walls)
- 2) Maintain appropriate recycling receptacles for all usage/events, emptying them into the large outside bins at the end of the day.
- 3) Collect all trash in appropriate receptacles, empty waste into large outside bins and replace trash liners
- 4) Clean bathrooms assigned for the event Cleaning: disinfecting all fixtures, sweep and mop floors, clean mirrors and toilets, restock supplies and remove trash.
- 5) Notifying District Director of Maintenance, Operations and Facilities, immediately in writing, if there are any issues that need repair or addressing.
- 6) Log cleaning activities on the Daily Maintenance sheet that is kept on site. This log should also reflect any concerns with how the facility was received that day, or problems that arose during City use. If any of these concerns are present, a photocopy of the log sheet should be emailed that evening to the Director of Maintenance & Facilities and copied to the Assistant Principal.

All Joint Facilities used by City shall be returned to a clean and safe condition, ready for use by students, teachers and District personnel following the event. If District determines, in its sole and absolute discretion, that additional set up, take down or cleaning is required following a City event,

District may use its own forces or contractors for the performance of the extra work and City agrees to pay any costs (including overtime pay for District staff) associated with the extra work. City shall pay said costs within 20 days following receipt of an invoice for these costs from District.

The City will share in the equipment maintenance costs by paying 50% of basketball backstops, lighting, and bleacher repair and regular service/maintenance fees, not to exceed \$5,000 per year. Standard maintenance is twice per year. District and City shall meet and confer on any substantive facilities improvements, with the intention of shared costs (e.g. gym floor). District and City shall continue to meet on field access improvements, with the intention of shared costs.

Damages: The City will be responsible for any damages that occur during time of use. The District will procure repair estimates (minimum of two quotes) and will oversee the repair.

- C. <u>District Maintenance Obligations</u>. District shall, at its sole cost and expense, pay all costs for electricity, gas, water, sewer, telephone, irrigation, waste hauling and other utility services, building repair costs, and any other costs with respect to the use and operation of the Joint Facilities, except where such cost is to be borne or shared by the City as provided in this Agreement.
- D. <u>Annual Maintenance Schedule.</u> The City's representative, or designee, shall meet with the District's representative or designee, in order to determine an annual maintenance schedule which allows City flexible access to the Joint Facilities, but which does not unreasonably interfere with District's use of the Joint Facilities. Either party may request, in writing, that the schedule be amended to accommodate circumstances that may arise during the year. Such schedule changes may be made only by mutual agreement. Schedule to include no facility usage for one week per year plus an additional (separate) two-day period during one of the school breaks (summer, spring or winter) necessary for LVUSD staff to deep clean the gym facility. District staff shall notify City of the intended schedule to deep clean the gym facility at least three months in advance of such efforts. Facility photos will be taken at the annual meeting and a copy will be emailed to the City for reference.
- E. <u>Emergencies and Hazardous Conditions.</u> The City or District shall have the right to initiate immediate action to resolve an emergency and/or hazardous condition on any portion of the Joint Facilities in the most effective and efficient means possible with the least disruption to City or District use. The party taking the emergency action shall notify the other party of the action taken within 48 hours following the time the action was taken.
- F. <u>Pesticide/Herbicide Use/Special Indemnification.</u> City acknowledges the requirements of the Healthy School Act of 2000 (California Education Code, Section 17608 et seq.) for pesticide/herbicide use on school sites. District policy is that no pesticides or herbicides are allowed to be used on the LVUSD school campus unless deemed an emergency, in writing, by the District's Director of Maintenance and Facilities.

VI. <u>Facility Use Fees - Contracting Out Events.</u>

City may impose reasonable fees upon persons and/or non-commercial entities for use of the Joint Facilities to the extent that doing so complies with applicable laws, including the Community Recreation Act, District's regulations and City's Municipal Code as of the date of this agreement.

City may establish a schedule of such fees, provided that prior to establishing a fee schedule, City shall consult with District and address any comments District may have with regard to the fee schedule.

City may, in its sole and absolute discretion, determine whether to run City-sponsored events with

City staff or to contract out the operations and/or lease the Joint Facilities to outside non-commercial groups for the purpose of providing City-sponsored programs.

District to be listed as Additionally Insured and provided insurance for any contracted users. Insurance must be provided to District's Facilities Department a minimum of two weeks in advance, consistent with Section VIII below.

VII. Sale or Restriction of Joint Facilities.

Should District determine, in its sole and absolute discretion, that it must utilize the Play Fields, Hardscape or any other portion of the Joint Facilities for District purpose that will restrict or prevent future use by City, District shall provide City with no less than 180 days notice prior to District taking such action. Upon City's receipt of the notice, City may (i) continue to be bound to this Agreement and renegotiate reduced future payments due from City to reflect the reduced use of the Joint Facilities or (ii) City may terminate this Agreement by providing not less than 90 days written notice to District.

If District seeks to install equipment and/or facilities at the Joint Facilities, District shall provide City not less than 60 days written notice of its intent to install said equipment and/or facilities. If City determines, in its sole and absolute discretion, that District's installation of equipment and/or facilities will adversely impact City's use of the Joint Facilities, or any portion thereof, City and District shall meet and confer to renegotiate reduced future payments due from City to reflect the reduced use of the Joint Facilities. If the parties cannot agree upon reduced future payments, City may terminate this Agreement by providing not less than 90 days written notice to District.

Should District determine that it desires to sell all or any portion of the Joint Facilities, District shall, to the extent permitted under applicable law, offer to City the right of first refusal to purchase the Joint Facilities, or portion thereof. District shall provide written notice to City of its intention to sell the Joint Facilities, or portion thereof. Within 30 days following receipt of the notice, City and District shall meet to negotiate the terms of a proposed sale to City. If the City and District cannot agree upon terms of sale or if City declines to purchase the property, District shall be relieved of any obligation to sell the property to City. Should District and City agree to terms of sale, City and District shall enter into a purchase and sale agreement for the property on terms agreed to during negotiations.

Whether sold to the City or a third party, upon the close of escrow, this Agreement shall be deemed automatically terminated with respect to the Joint Facilities sold. Not later than 30 days following the close of escrow, City and District shall meet and confer to renegotiate reduced future payments due from City to reflect the reduced size of the Joint Facilities remaining after sale. If the parties cannot agree upon reduced future payments, City may terminate this Agreement by providing not less than 90 days written notice to District.

VIII. <u>Indemnification/Insurance</u>.

A. <u>Indemnification</u>. Each party agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the other party, its Governing Board, officers, officials, agents, employees and volunteers from any and all claims, losses, penalties and liabilities of any nature, at law or equity, including attorneys' fees, to the extent caused by, arising out of, or in connection with, the indemnifying party's actual or alleged negligent acts or omissions pursuant to this Agreement. An indemnifying party's indemnification obligation shall not be limited to insurance proceeds, if any, received by the indemnifying party, its Governing Board, officers, officials, agents, employees or volunteers. This Section VIII.A. shall survive the termination

of this Agreement.

B. <u>Insurance</u>. City and District shall each maintain comprehensive public liability insurance in the amount of Three Million Dollars (\$3,000,000) per occurrence, combined single limit, to protect City and District, their respective Board, officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers against claims for bodily injury, wrongful death, and property damage arising from City's or District's participation in the activities described herein. City shall confirm in writing to the District that the liability insurance for the City does not exclude sexual abuse and molestation coverage. If sexual abuse and molestation coverage is excluded, the City shall separately provide proof of insurance in the amount of one million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence with an endorsement that names the District as an additional insured.

The form of insurance shall be satisfactory to City and District and may include self-insurance at levels acceptable to both parties. Each policy shall be primary coverage and non-contributory to any coverage the other party may obtain. Each party's policy or policies shall name the other party as an additional insured. Each policy shall contain a full waiver of subrogation rights. Parties shall provide proof of insurance.

The City shall maintain Workers' Compensation insurance and other insurance, as required by law, for its employees. The City shall provide proof of insurance to the District.

IX. Continuing Joint Cooperation.

- A. Meetings to Address Mutual Concerns. The City and District agree in concept to meet not less often than quarterly to mutually use best efforts to address City and District concerns with regard to the following:
 - 1. School impacts upon traffic/circulation within the City;
 - 2. Meeting the cleaning & maintenance standards within the Agreement;
 - 3. Coordination of emergency response activities;
 - 4. Such other issues of common concern that may arise from time to time.

X. <u>Miscellaneous Provisions</u>.

- A. <u>Amendment/Modification.</u> This Agreement may be amended only in writing signed by both City and District. The City Council and District Board must approve this Agreement and any amendments or modifications thereto before any changes and/or modifications become effective.
- B. <u>Review.</u> City and District agree to meet not less than quarterly to review the use of the Joint Facilities and any changes in use, to discuss problems and concerns about use, to review schedules and needs, and to determine whether amendments or modifications to this Agreement are needed due to changed circumstances.
- C. <u>Interpretation</u>. The provisions hereof shall be interpreted to give effect to their simple and fair meaning and shall be construed as though prepared by both parties. The entire agreement of the parties is set forth herein, and all prior negotiations, documents and discussions are superseded. The parties acknowledge there are no applicable representations, warranties or terms that are not stated herein. The invalidity of any provision shall not affect the validity of any other provision. Section headings are for convenience only and may not be used in interpretations.

D. <u>Representative's/Notices</u>. For purposes of administering this Agreement, District's representative shall be Dr. Daniel Stepenosky, Superintendent, or his designee. City's representative shall be Dr. Gary Lysik, City Manager, or his designee. City's and District's representatives shall have the authority to coordinate and negotiate issues, review documents and resolve differences in the administration of this Agreement. City or District may designate a different representative by providing notice to the other party in the manner prescribed below.

All notices and consents required or allowed shall be in writing and shall be sent to the addresses shown below. A party may change its address for notices and consents by giving notice to the other party. Notice may be delivered by personal delivery, email to designated representative, facsimile transmission during normal business hours of the recipient, an overnight delivery service, or U.S. Mail sent certified with return receipt requested. Notices and consents are effective on the earlier of the date received, the date of the delivery receipt, or the third day after postmark, as applicable.

All notices, demands, invoices, and written communications shall be in writing and delivered to the following addresses or such other addresses as the parties may designate by written notice:

- E. <u>Counterparts</u>. This document may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be an original and all of which shall constitute one Agreement.
- F. <u>No Agency.</u> Nothing herein: (i) creates any right or remedy for the benefit of any person not a party hereto nor (ii) creates a fiduciary relationship, an agency, or partnership.
- G. <u>Authority.</u> The persons signing below represent and warrant that all hearings have been conducted and findings made to enter into this Agreement and that they have authority to enter into this Agreement on behalf of the entities for which they are signing this Agreement.
- H. <u>Governing Law/Venue</u>. This Agreement shall be construed, interpreted and applied in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Any legal action or proceeding concerning this Agreement shall be filed and prosecuted in the appropriate California state court in the County of Los Angeles. Each Party hereto irrevocably consents to the personal jurisdiction of that court.
- I. <u>Dispute Resolution/Attorney's Fees</u>. In the event of any dispute between the parties with regard to the performance, breach or interpretation of this Agreement, the parties agree to initially attempt to resolve any such dispute informally between the City's representative and the District's representative.

If the dispute is not resolved informally, the parties shall submit the dispute to non-binding mediation. The mediation shall be conducted by a mutually agreeable impartial mediator, or if the parties cannot so agree, a mediator designated by the American Arbitration Association ("AAA") pursuant to applicable AAA Mediation Rules. The mediation will be governed by and conducted pursuant to a mediation agreement negotiated by the parties or, if the parties cannot so agree, by

procedures established by the mediator.

CITY OF CALABASAS

Any dispute between the parties arising out of or relating to this Agreement, or the breach thereof, which has not been resolved in accordance with the procedures set forth above shall be decided by arbitration in accordance with applicable Arbitration Rules of the AAA then in effect, unless the parties mutually agree otherwise. The award of the arbitrator(s) shall be final and binding upon the parties. Judgment may be entered upon it in accordance with applicable law by any court having jurisdiction thereof. The award of the arbitrator(s) shall be subject only to the limited right of appeal to a court of competent jurisdiction as provided by Code of Civil Procedure Section 1285 et seq. or other applicable law.

In the event of the bringing of an arbitration, action or suit by a Party hereto against another Party hereunder by reason of any breach of any of the covenants or agreements arising out of this Agreement or any other dispute between the Parties concerning this Agreement, then, in that event, the prevailing Party in such action or dispute, whether by final judgment or arbitration award, shall be entitled to have and recover of and from the other Party all costs and expenses of suit or claim, including reasonable attorneys' fees. This Section X.I. shall survive any termination of this Agreement.

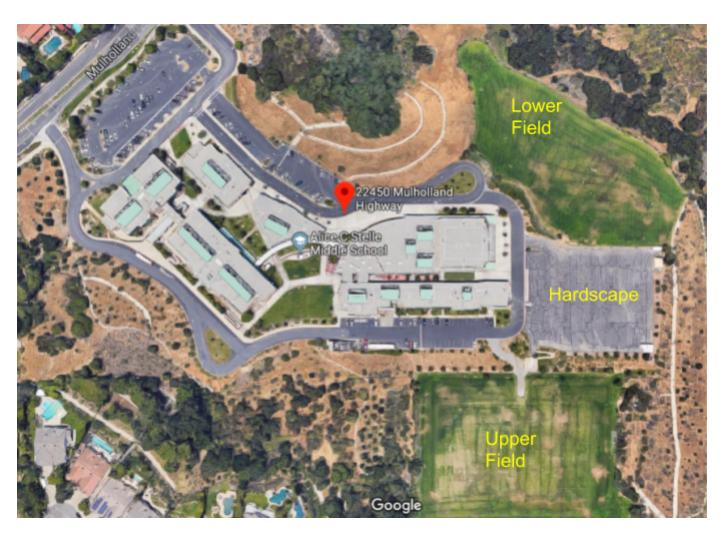

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council approve a Grant of Easement to Southern California Edison to permit the installation and maintenance of a new transformer and meter pedestal for electric vehicle charging stations in Tennis & Swim Center.

BACKGROUND:

In August 2016, through a collaborative effort between the City of Calabasas, South Coast Air Quality Management District and California Energy Commission, a fast dual charging station was installed at the Calabasas City Hall parking lot.

In 2017, City of Calabasas installed two EV charging stations in the City's Park and Ride facility located at Old Town Calabasas. With the increase in popularity of electric vehicles, many City residents have requested additional charging stations in City facilities and public streets.

Two new EV charging stations were recently opened to public in D'Anza Park and two are in process of construction at Tennis & Swim Center.

DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS:

City staff has been in communication with the Southern California Edison Co. to install a new transformers to accommodate 2 Level 3 EV fast chargers at the designated locations. The fast chargers requires 480volt, 200amp, 3-phase power.

In order to provide the necessary power, the SCE has to install a new transformer on Park Sorrento next to the tennis courts and run a cable from the SCE vault on Park Sorrento to the transformer and from the transformer to the meter pedestal. The SCE has prepared maps and easement documents to permit the installation and maintenance of future transformer and meter pedestal that requires City Council approval.

All civil works are being performed by a City contractor while EVGo agreed to install and maintain two EV fast chargers at no cost to the City. City entered into agreement with EVGo for long-term maintenance of the stations. The new EV charging station are expected to open to public in March 2020.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

City staff secured two sources of funding for civil works and securing new a transformer from the SCE:

- 1. MSRC¹'s Clean Transportation Program
- 2. Southern California Incentive Project (SCIP)

The purpose of the MSRC program is to partner with cities that already participate in the AB 2766 Subvention Fund Program and to offer MSRC Clean Transportation Funding, also known as AB 2766 Discretionary Funding, as a means to leverage both funds to implement 2016 AQMP measures.

The Southern California Incentive Project (SCIP) promotes easy access to zeroemission vehicle infrastructure by offering rebates for the purchase and installation of eligible public electric vehicle (EV) chargers in Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside and San Bernardino Counties. Final rebate amounts are determined by the total eligible project costs.

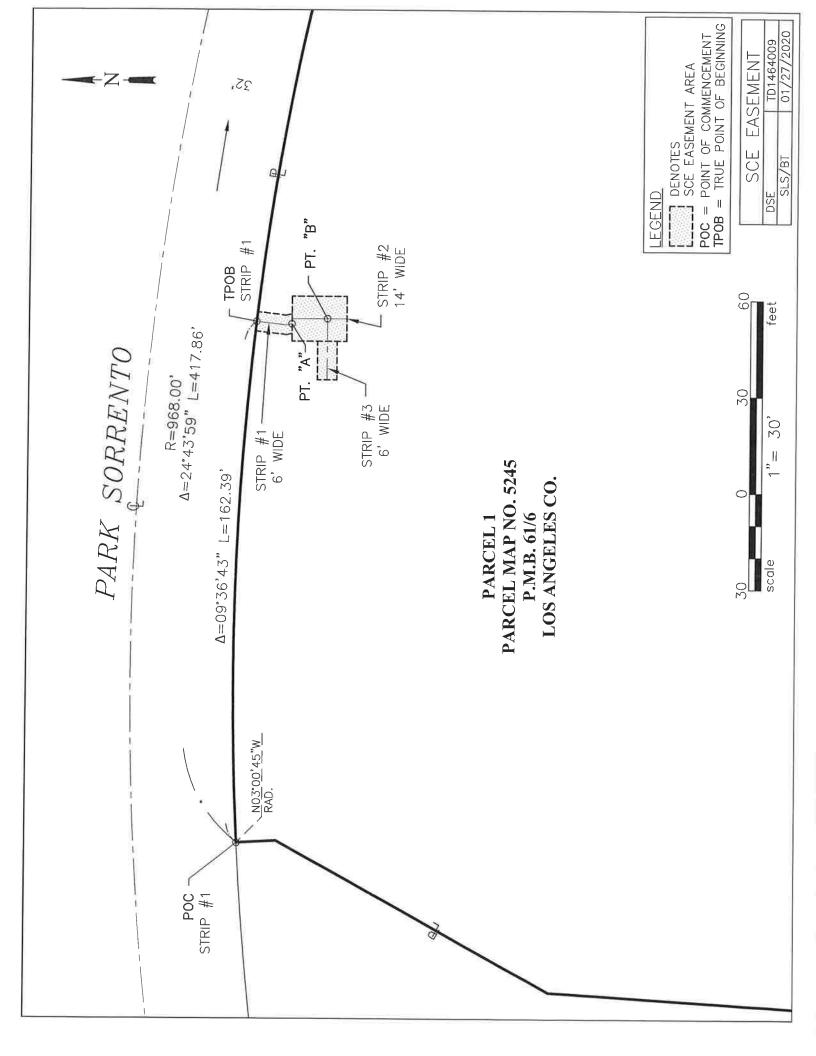

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Authorization to approve a one year contract with Calabasas Chamber of Commerce for an amount not to exceed \$40,000 and to adjust the budget accordingly.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Calabasas contracted with the Calabasas Chamber of Commerce for a number of years to promote the City of Calabasas as an attractive location to live, work and do business. The City has contributed an annual amount for these services.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The City contributed \$21,000 each year for the prior four fiscal years. This year's amount was increased to \$30,000 when the City Council approved the budget in June 2019. The Calabasas Chamber of Commerce has requested the dollar amount be increased an additional \$10,000 to \$40,000 for fiscal year 2019-20. The services provided by the Chamber of Commerce have been expanded to include the following additions to section 1, sub-sections F through O of the contract:

- F. Utilizing pre-existing communications and public relations procedures in place, promote any City sponsored events upon request of the City, understanding that said promotion will be conducted through existing Chamber infrastructure.
- G. Provides services to assist both struggling and growing businesses through advice and counsel coordinated through the Chamber including resources such as SCORE and other similar advisory agencies.
- H. Provide at least (6) workshop environments for businesses which can include networking breakfasts, educational luncheons and other type business seminars.
- I. Participate in at least one community development event such as the, Pumpkin Festival, the Calabasas Wine Tasting, State of the City Address and Mayoral Luncheon.
- J. Sponsor tables provided at no additional cost to the City at Chamber major events, such as the Installation Gala and the Mayor's Luncheon, and include a full table, signage, and media and program acknowledgements as a top supporting sponsor.
- K. Promote the City as a major sponsor for all chamber special events at no additional charge.
- L. Provide City Council with a quarterly report of existing businesses, new businesses and businesses closing or leaving Calabasas.
- M. Schedule six visits to Calabasas Chamber businesses with the sitting Calabasas City Mayor each quarter.
- N. Introduce new businesses who have joined the Calabasas Chamber of Commerce.
- O. Create and provide a Calabasas Guide that includes a map of Calabasas, lists of restaurants, hotels, venues for events and yearly activities in the City of Calabasas.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The General Fund budget for this expense is currently \$30,000. The proposed contract is in the amount of \$40,000.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Authorization to approve a one year contract with the Calabasas Chamber of Commerce in an amount not to exceed \$40,000 and adjust the budget accordingly.

ITEM 5 ATTACHMENT 1 AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF CALABASAS AND THE CALABASAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

THIS AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of the 1st day of August, 2019 by and between the City of Calabasas, California, a Municipal Corporation ("City"), and the Calabasas Chamber of Commerce, a California Non-Profit Corporation ("Chamber"). City and Chamber are sometimes individually referred to as "Party" and collectively as "Parties" in this Agreement.

WHEREAS, the City and Chamber desire to promote the City as an attractive location to live, work and do business; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to make available information concerning its activities, and encouraging and facilitating stability and retention of existing businesses, as well as encouraging the location of new businesses in the community; and

WHEREAS, the state law authorizes the expenditure of public monies for such activities; and,

WHEREAS, the Chamber is organized for and willing to promote existing businesses on behalf of the City and to publicize and assist them.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises, covenants, and promises hereinafter set forth, the Parties do hereby agree as follows:

- 1. The Chamber agrees to perform its usual services and activities during the term of this Agreement, examples of which include:
- A. Maintain adequate facilities, in a convenient location, of a dignified and professional appearance; provide telephone service; retain qualified personnel to respond to telephone or personal inquiries from citizens, visitors, commercial firms, and potential commercial and light industrial developers concerning the City of Calabasas; and maintain such services in the City during regular business hours.
- B. Answer promptly all correspondence directed towards the Chamber relative to facilities and opportunities in or available within the City of Calabasas; and disseminate information in and outside of the City.
- C. Confer with business representatives to encourage and urge the establishment of their business activities within the City of Calabasas.
- D. Provide, from time to time, informational materials (e.g., maps, directories, brochures) that promote the City of Calabasas as an attractive place to live, work and do business.

- E. Welcome new businesses to the City of Calabasas by both written and personal communications.
- F. Utilizing pre-existing communications and public relations procedures in place, promote any City sponsored events upon request of the City, understanding that said promotion will be conducted through existing Chamber infrastructure.
- G. Provides services to assist both struggling and growing businesses through advice and counsel coordinated through the Chamber including resources such as SCORE and other similar advisory agencies.
- H. Provide at least (6) workshop environments for businesses which can include networking breakfasts, educational luncheons and other type business seminars.
- I. Participate in at least one community development event such as the, Pumpkin Festival, the Calabasas Wine Tasting, State of the City Address and Mayoral Luncheon.

- N. Introduce new businesses who have joined the Calabasas Chamber of Commerce.
- O. Create and provide a Calabasas Guide that includes a map of Calabasas, lists of restaurants, hotels, venues for events and yearly activities in the City of Calabasas.
- 2. The term of this Agreement shall be from August 1, 2019 through August 31, 2020 unless extended by written agreement of the parties or terminated earlier in accordance with Section 8 ("Term").
- 3. The Chamber will perform the services set forth in Section 1 during the Term, and the City shall compensate the Chamber for these services in an amount not to exceed FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS ("Compensation"). In his or her sole and absolute discretion, the City Manager may pay the Compensation in three or four installments over the course of the Term.
- 4. The Chamber agrees that it will not use the Compensation in connection with the election, nomination, support, publicity, endorsement or appointment of any officer or employee of the City or of any other governmental agency, with the sole exception of hosting a Candidate Forum open to all candidates for any elective office or to all views on any ballot measure.
- 5. The Chamber shall provide the City a quarterly and an annual written report of activities conducted pursuant to this Agreement with sufficient detail and statistics to justify the City's expenditure of public funds. The City shall provide the Chamber an outline of the contents to be covered in the report.

- 6. The Chairman of the Chamber's Board of Directors, the Chamber President, the City Manager, and the Mayor shall meet regularly to discuss: (i) the coordination of City and Chamber efforts with respect to the economic development of the City of Calabasas; and (ii) items of joint interest and concern for purposes of maintaining positive City-Chamber relations and to set goals and objectives for future projects and programs.
- 7. The City shall provide, from time to time, and as available, informational material to the Chamber (e.g., brochures, flyers, video) to assist the Chamber in promoting the City of Calabasas.
- 8. The City may terminate the Agreement for any reason on sixty days written notice to the Chamber. From the date of the termination notice, the City will have no obligation to pay the Chamber, even if the Chamber has not been compensated for services it performed in furtherance of this Agreement. Upon termination of this Agreement, all other rights and obligations of the Parties hereunder shall cease and be of no further force and effect.
- 9. The Chamber shall not have any right, title or interest in, or right to use, any of the following without the written consent of the City: (i) any designs, logos, symbols, trademarks, service marks, representations or other identification of the City; (ii) photographs of City Hall; nor to use photographs of City officials and employees without the written consent of the person photographed.
- 10. The Chamber shall not express views critical, or complimentary of, a public agency in any newspaper, radio, or television advertisements.
- 11. The Chamber shall not misrepresent itself as any other chamber of commerce.
- 12. Any notices, bills, invoices, or reports required by this Agreement shall be deemed received on: (i) the day of delivery if delivered by hand, facsimile or overnight courier service during the addressee's regular business hours; or (ii) on the third business day following deposit in the United States mail if delivered by mail, postage prepaid, to the addresses listed below (or to such other addresses as the parties may, from time to time, designate in writing).

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council receive and file this report.

BACKGROUND:

Adoption of Ordinance No. 2009-259 (Chapter 5.18 of the Calabasas Municipal Code) requires all tobacco retailers to be registered with the City in order to sell tobacco products. The Ordinance took effect on July 10, 2009. Registration is required annually, and there is no fee involved. It is unlawful for any retailer to sell tobacco products without current registration. In addition to requiring a valid registration, the ordinance prohibits retailers from selling tobacco products (inclusive of vaping products) to anyone under 21 years of age (consistent with state law). The ordinance establishes policies and procedures for the regular monitoring of tobacco retailers by the City and Sheriff's Department, including the use of underage decoys for sting operations. Any retailer who is found to be in violation of the ordinance and state law prohibiting the sale of tobacco to persons under 21 years of age is subject to a minimum fine of \$1,000 and will have their registration (and, thus, their right to sell tobacco) revoked for a specified period of time.

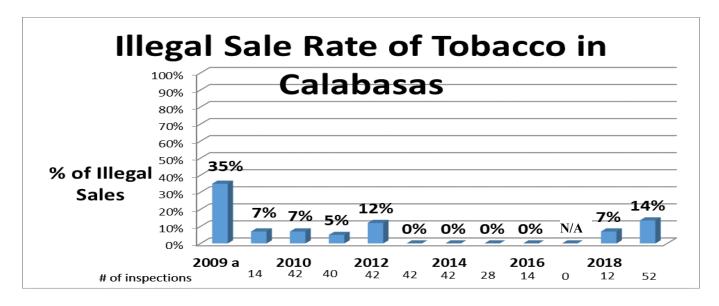
Section 5.18.130(H) of the CMC requires the City Manager to provide an annual report to the City Council regarding enforcement of the ordinance. The CMC further specifies the content of the annual report as follows:

"The report shall include: (i) the number of tobacco retailers found to have violated this chapter; (ii) the number of enforcement actions taken with respect to each tobacco retailer under Section 5.18.100, (iii) the cost to the city of enforcement of this chapter, and (iv) whether additional enforcement funds are needed and, if so, whether he or she recommends those funds be derived from the City's General Fund, fees imposed for the issuance of registrations under this chapter, or the proceeds of fines and penalties paid to the city under this chapter."

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

Section 5.18.100 of the CMC, stipulates that the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department shall conduct three tobacco sting operations per year; however, "the department may check the compliance of tobacco retailers previously found to be in compliance a fewer number of times". In 2019, the Sherriff Department conducted sting operations on 10 different dates (not all locations were tested in each sting) based on feedback they had received from the Las Virgenes Unified School District regarding problematic retailers. In total, the Sherriff Department conducted 52 stings, 7 of which resulted in the sale of tobacco products to the underage decoy (see Tobacco Retailer status sheet, Attachment B). The Code Enforcement Department has received the incident report from the Sheriff Department for each violation, and has started the administrative process to revoke the retailers' registration in accordance with Section 5.18 of the CMC. As of the date of this report, the Tobacco Retailer Registration for Las Virgenes Mobil and 7-11 have been revoked for 3 month each. Staff will report the results of Code Enforcement's actions for the other retailers, to the City Council once the cases are complete.

Below is a chart summarizing the annual illegal sale rates from 2009 through 2019.



Note: the illegal sale rate of tobacco is based on sales transactions made during official sting operations only. There have been a total of 278 inspections to date, with an average compliance rate of 93%.

The City's administration costs associated with registration under this ordinance are minimal. Staff sends a notice and registration form once a year to each retailer for registration renewal. Staff also provides outreach efforts during the renewal period to ensure that retailers are aware of the registration and that they will be subject to random sting operations. This requires minimal staff time because there are only fourteen retailers. The City does incur additional costs associated with staff time to process the revocation of a retailer's registration, as well as processing appeals when a retailer engages an attorney to challenge the revocation. However, these expenses are incurred only when a retailer violates the ordinance and are recovered from the \$1,000 fine and \$250 appeal fee.

Staff recommends that the City Council receive and file this report.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the City Council provide direction on preparing an ordinance banning sale of flavored tobacco products and e-cigarette devices.

BACKGROUND:

Electronic cigarettes entered the marketplace around 2007, and since 2014, they have been the most commonly used tobacco product among youth in the United States. Electronic cigarettes are battery-operated devices, often designed to resemble a cigarette, that deliver and emit a nicotine-containing aerosol. Electronic cigarettes are considered electronic nicotine delivery devices and have many names. They are frequently referred to as e-cigs, hookah pens, vapes and vape pens.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC"), the number of middle and high school students who reported being current users of tobacco products increased 36%-from 3.6 million to 4.9 million students-between 2017 and

2018. This dramatic increase, which has erased past progress in reducing youth tobacco use, stems from to a nationwide surge in electronic cigarette use by adolescents. The CDC estimates there were 1.5 million more youth electronic cigarette users in 2018 than 2017, and those who were using electronic cigarettes were using them more often. Frequent use of electronic cigarettes increased from 20 percent in 2017 to 28 percent in 2018 among current high school electronic cigarette users.

Regulation of E-Cigarettes. Electronic cigarettes or "e-cigarettes" are battery powered devices that heat liquid into a vapor that can be inhaled. The inhaled vapor may contain nicotine (the addictive drug in tobacco), flavorings, and toxins. E-cigarettes are regulated as tobacco products at the federal level.² Electronic cigarettes either come with "closed pod" or cartridge-based systems which are prefilled with e-liquid and snap directly into a battery or open pod systems which have refillable pods that are manually refilled by the user.

Federal Level. On May 10, 2016, the FDA issued a Final Rule deeming e-cigarettes and other nicotine products that were not a part of the original 2009 Federal Tobacco Control Act, including e-cigarettes, to be "tobacco products." The new Rule allowed the FDA to regulate e-cigarettes (including flavored products) and other covered tobacco products in the same way that it could regulate traditional tobacco products under the original 2009 Tobacco Control Act. A year later in May 2017, the FDA issued a Guidance related to the 2016 Rule, which extended the compliance period some tobacco product manufacturers, including flavored manufacturers. This meant that flavored e-cigarette devices that were currently on the market could remain on the market (without any review by the FDA) until August 2022 (now accelerated to May of 2020). At present, there are multiple bills to address vaping that have been introduced in the House of Representatives, and nearly all of these bills have an equivalent counterpart in the U.S. Senate. Some of these bills include: H.R. 293: Youth Vaping Prevention Act of 2019; H.R. 1498: SAFE Kids Act; H.R. 2111: PROTECT Act; H.R. 2339: Reversing the Youth Tobacco Epidemic Act of 2019; H.R. 2411: Tobacco to 21 Act; and H.R. 3942: Preventing Online Sales of E-Cigarettes to Children Act. None have yet passed.

More recently, on January 2, 2020, the FDA issued a guidance document putting forward a policy that would ban certain unauthorized flavored e-cigarette products that appeal to children, including fruit and mint flavors. Under the policy, "companies that do not cease manufacture, distribution and sale of unauthorized flavored cartridge-based e-cigarettes (other than tobacco or menthol flavors) within 30 days"

run the risk of facing FDA enforcement actions.⁴ Effectively this policy will ban flavored closed pod cartridges that are inserted into e-cigarette devices but will not affect open pod systems.

State Level. In 2003, California enacted the Cigarette and Tobacco Products Licensing Act to regulate the sale of tobacco and tobacco products. Similar to a business license, the Act requires every person selling cigarettes or tobacco products to the public in California to obtain a license from the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration. On September 16, 2019, Governor Newsom signed an executive order directing the California Department of Public Health to allocate \$20 million to a vaping awareness campaign and develop recommendations to require warning signs about the health risks of vaping at vaping retailers and in vaping advertisements; increase enforcement regarding illegal sales; and to establish standards for nicotine content and uniform packaging for purposes of including nicotine content in the calculation of applicable taxes. The order also directs the California Tax and Fee Administration to develop recommendations to remove illegal or counterfeit vaping products from stores and to review taxes on e-cigarettes to determine if taxes could be assessed according to nicotine content.

Local Laws. Cities and counties throughout California have been active in adopting prohibitions on the sale of flavored tobacco. The first local restriction on the sale of flavored tobacco was enacted by Santa Clara County in 2010. Following Santa Clara, 34 cities in California passed some type of restriction on the sale of flavored tobacco.

These local bans vary in scope with different cities taking different approaches to ecigarettes and flavored tobacco. For example, in June 2019, Beverly Hills approved an ordinance to prohibit the sale of all tobacco products (flavored and unflavored) in the city.⁵ In contrast, the Palo Alto City Council passed an Ordinance in October of 2017 which restricts the sale of flavored tobacco products to retailers that generate more than 60 percent of their gross annual revenue from the sale of tobacco products, are adult-only, do not sell food or alcohol for consumption in the premises, and post signage outside the premises that clearly and conspicuously informs patrons that the premises is off-limits to persons who are under 21 years old.⁶

Legal Authority to Regulate E-Cigarettes. Article XI, Section 7 of the California Constitution gives cities the police power to regulate certain activities within city limits and confers on cities the power to "make and enforce within [their] limits all local police, sanitary and other ordinances and regulations not in conflict with general laws." This right is subject to only two exceptions: (1) it may be applied only within

its own territory, and (2) it may not conflict with general laws of the State.⁷ The City's police power gives it the right to adopt regulations which promote the general welfare of its residents, including the good order, wellbeing, and general prosperity of the community at large.⁸ The police power includes the power to regulate business practices within the City. The Supreme Court has recognized "the legitimate need of local government to address problems generated by business involvement in activities that may be inimical to the health, safety and welfare of the community" as well as the necessity of local communities to "add to state regulations provisions adapted to their special requirements."

Thus, absent a clear indication of preemptive intent from the California Legislature, cities are granted clear powers to regulate land use and other matters linked to this police power. The Furthermore, federal law grants the U.S. Food & Drug Administration authority to regulate all tobacco products and expressly preserves the power of local governments to enact additional or "more stringent" regulations related to or prohibiting tobacco sales. Since the California legislature has not fully occupied the field of tobacco sales, California cities are free to implement any tobacco sales regulation or restriction provided they do not involve the collection of taxes or the penal aspects of tobacco sales to minors. As a result, the City may use its police powers to regulate e-cigarettes and flavored cigarettes as there is no preemption by federal or state laws.

Options for Regulation. The City has several options with respect to regulating and banning e-cigarettes. The City's municipal code defines electronic cigarettes as any "electronic or battery-operated device that delivers vapors for inhalation. This term shall include every variation and type of such devices whether they are manufactured, distributed, marketed or sold as an electronic cigarette, an "e" cigarette, an electronic cigar, an electronic cigarillo, an electronic pipe, an electronic hookah or any other product name or descriptor." Electronic cigarettes are regulated in the same way as other tobacco products. As a result, the City has the option of retaining its current regulatory framework, which ban smoking in public places, places of employment, multi-unit residence common areas, and enclosed and unenclosed places of public accommodation. The only change would be widening the definition of "electronic cigarette" to include any "device or delivery system which can be used to consume nicotine in aerosolized or vaporized form" to take account for the different types of e-cigarette varieties. With respect to sale, the City permits the sale of tobacco products at licensed retailers as long as sales take place

no closer than five hundred (500) feet from any primary or secondary school.¹⁴ This restriction applies to electronic cigarettes as well.

1. Full E-Cigarette Sales Ban

One option the City may choose to consider is an outright ban of all electronic cigarettes by banning the sale of all electronic cigarettes in the City as well as include any device or delivery system which can be used to consume nicotine in aerosolized or vaporized form. Such a ban would be permissible under the City's police power and given that such a ban has been adopted by numerous California cities, it will likely withstand legal scrutiny and not draw a challenge. The only risk to the City may be a possible referendum sponsored by electronic cigarette manufacturers, as has happened in San Francisco, to overturn a ban. ¹⁵ Even then, such a risk is minimal as no referendum has succeeded in overturning a city ban. ¹⁶

2. Flavor Sales Ban

Another option the City may choose to adopt is a more limited ban targeting sale of flavored tobacco products such as cigars, little cigars, cigarillos, chewing tobacco smokeless tobacco, hookah, alongside electronic cigarettes that use flavors. The ban would not only encompass electronic cigarette flavors but also menthol cigarettes and flavored components, parts, and accessories, such as flavored rolling papers, filters, and blunt wraps. Such a ban would carry no legal risk as the scope of the City's regulation would be minimal and there is already a ban on flavored cigarettes (not electronic) at the state and federal level.¹⁷

3. Full Tobacco Sales Ban

Another option available to the City is a complete ban on the sale of tobacco products within the City. Such a ban has been enacted by the City of Beverly Hills, which banned gas stations and convenience stores selling cigarettes, chewing tobacco and e-cigarettes, while hotels will retain the right to sell them but only through room service. If the City were to adopt a far-reaching ban like Beverly Hills, it would mean that the City's code would have to be amended to forbid the sale of all tobacco products within City limits. The City could carve out an exception for hotels but does not have to and no such exception is required for the City to comply with state and federal laws.
