Mayor Maurer called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m. in the City Council Chambers, 100 Civic Center Way, Calabasas, California.

SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH G2

CONSTRUCTION INC. FOR FABRICATION AND INSTALLATION OF FULL CAPTURE STORM DRAIN CATCH BASIN SCREENS ON PUBLIC STREETS WITHIN THE LAS VIDCENES CREEK SUR WATERSHED.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommend that the City Council approve the Professional Services Agreement with G2 Construction Inc. for fabrication and installation of full-capture storm drain catch basin screens on public streets within the Las Virgenes Creek sub-watershed.

BACKGROUND:

In March 2011, City staff applied for a grant funding administered by the Santa Monica Bay Restoration Commission (SMBRC) funded through proposition 84 to install catch basin screens. The screens would help prevent trash and debris from entering the storm drains which eventually discharge into Las Virgenes Creek and Santa Monica Bay beaches and would bring the City into compliance with the Clean Water Act requirements for the Malibu Creek Watershed known as trash Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL).

In August 2011 the SMBRC Governing Board approved a Proposition 84 grant award to the City of Calabasas for \$168,000.

On January 25, 2012 the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2012-1316 authorizing entering into an agreement with the State of California and designating a representative to sign the agreement and any amendments thereto, for the Las Virgenes Creek Catch Basin Debris Screen project.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

Preventing trash from reaching local creeks and streams, beaches, and the Santa Monica Bay removes a potential hazard to human health and aquatic life, and helps protect aesthetics of these natural areas. Implementation of the project will help meet the Malibu Creek Trash TMDL. Trash screens will capture trash and debris greater than 5mm in size. The city estimates that average capture will be approximately 12 pounds of debris per applicable drain per quarter.

A Request for Proposal (RFP) was issued on August 17, 2012. Three proposals were received and the lowest proposal was 43% above the project budget, therefore all proposals were rejected by City staff.

The scope of work was modified to reduce the cost and a new RFP was issued on October 1, 2012. Three proposals were received from the same proposers on October 12, 2012 as follows:

 1. United Storm Water Inc.
 \$528,774

 2. Time Structure
 \$293,100

 3. G2 Construction Inc.
 \$224,700

Staff entered into negotiations with the low proposer and agreed to modify the scope of work performed by the contractor and took on the responsibility of some work such as the traffic plan, traffic control devices, catch basin maintenance and cleaning, public education, curb painting, etc. Therefore, the contract amount was reduced to \$175,000.

United Storm Water Inc. sent the staff a protest letter on October 18, 2012 followed by a letter from a law firm representing the holder of patents concerning certain storm drain gate systems. The letter asserts that a component of G2 Construction's system MAY infringe on a patent involving similar device. In a letter dated October 31, 2012, G2 Construction Inc. denied the claim, asserting among other things that G2's systems have been accepted and installed without claims in Los Angeles County. The City Attorney reviewed the claim and the response by both parties and in a letter dated November 5, 2012 concluded the following:

- a) There is no formal administrative procedure to "protest" an award of a professional services agreement pursuant to an RFP.
- b) The city cannot determine the validity of any such collateral and allegation of possible patent infringement and therefor after finding that the response by G2 meets the requirements of the RFP was prepared to move forward with a recommendation to the City Council to award a contract to G2 Construction, Inc.
- c) City urged both parties to work together to resolve whatever issues and differences they may have related to storm water debris capture systems.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The \$7,000 gap between the contract amount and the Prop 84 grant funding is part of City's match and shall be funded thru City's AB939 Trash Collection Fees (Account No. 14-313-525200). Since part of the scope of work will be performed by City, \$10,000 funding from AB939 Trash Collection Fees shall be appropriated for catch basin preparation, maintenance and cleaning prior to installation of the catch basin devices. An additional \$25,000 from Management Reserve Account shall be appropriated for traffic control plan and devices, purchasing traffic control equipment, repairing storm drain damages and other works as needed by the contract agreement. The current contract with California Civil Engineering Services for public works on-call maintenance and services shall be amended to perform the above tasks.

REQUESTED ACTION:

That the City Council approve the Professional Services Agreement with G2 Construction Inc. for fabrication and installation of full-capture storm drain catch basin screens on public streets within the Las Virgenes Creek sub-watershed.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

(City of Calabasas / G2 Construction, Inc.)

1. <u>IDENTIFICATION</u>

THIS PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is entered into by and between the City of Calabasas, a California municipal corporation ("City"), and G2 Construction, Inc. a California corporation ("Contractor").

2. RECITALS

- 2.1 City has determined that it requires the following professional services from a contractor: Fabrication and installation of certified full capture storm drain catch basin screen on all public streets within the Las Virgenes Creek subwatershed.
- 2.2 Contractor represents that it is fully qualified to perform such professional services by virtue of its experience and the training, education and expertise of its principals and employees. Contractor further represents that it is willing to accept responsibility for performing such services in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions herein contained, City and Contractor agree as follows:

3. **DEFINITIONS**

- 3.1 "Scope of Services": Such professional services as are set forth in Contractor's response to RFP dated October 12, 2012 attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 3.2 "Approved Fee Schedule": Such compensation rates as are set forth in Contractor's October 25, 2012 fee schedule (Acceptance Letter) to City attached hereto as Exhibit B and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 3.3 "Commencement Date": November 28, 2012
- 3.4 "Expiration Date": November 27, 2013.

4. TERM

The term of this Agreement shall commence at 12:00 a.m. on the Commencement Date and shall expire at 11:59 p.m. on the Expiration Date unless extended by written agreement of the parties or terminated earlier in accordance with Section 17 ("Termination") below.

5. CONTRACTOR'S SERVICES

5.1 Contractor shall perform the services identified in the Scope of Services. City shall have the right to request, in writing, changes in the Scope of Services. Any

such changes mutually agreed upon by the parties, and any corresponding increase or decrease in compensation, shall be incorporated by written amendment to this Agreement. In no event shall the total compensation and costs payable to Contractor under this Agreement exceed the sum of **One Hundred Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000)** unless specifically approved in advance and in writing by City.

- 5.2 Contractor shall perform all work to the highest professional standards of Contractor's profession and in a manner reasonably satisfactory to City. Contractor shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations, including the conflict of interest provisions of Government Code Section 1090 and the Political Reform Act (Government Code Section 81000 et seq.).
- 5.3 During the term of this Agreement, Contractor shall not perform any work for another person or entity for whom Contractor was not working at the Commencement Date if both (i) such work would require Contractor to abstain from a decision under this Agreement pursuant to a conflict of interest statute and (ii) City has not consented in writing to Contractor's performance of such work.
- 5.4 Contractor represents that it has, or will secure at its own expense, all personnel required to perform the services identified in the Scope of Services. All such services shall be performed by Contractor or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in the work shall be qualified to perform such services. Mr. **John Alvarado** shall be Contractor's project administrator and shall have direct responsibility for management of Contractor's performance under this Agreement. No change shall be made in Contractor's project administrator without City's prior written consent.

6. <u>COMPENSATION</u>

- 6.1 City agrees to compensate Contractor for the services provided under this Agreement, and Contractor agrees to accept in full satisfaction for such services, payment in accordance with the Approved Fee Schedule.
- 6.2 Contractor shall submit to City an invoice, on a monthly basis or less frequently, for the services performed pursuant to this Agreement. Each invoice shall itemize the services rendered during the billing period and the amount due. Within ten business days of receipt of each invoice, City shall notify Contractor in writing of any disputed amounts included on the invoice. Within thirty calendar days of receipt of each invoice, City shall pay all undisputed amounts included on the invoice. City shall not withhold applicable taxes or other authorized deductions from payments made to Contractor.

6.3 Payments for any services requested by City and not included in the Scope of Services shall be made to Contractor by City on a time-and-materials basis using Contractor's standard fee schedule. Contractor shall be entitled to increase the fees in this fee schedule at such time as it increases its fees for its clients generally; provided, however, in no event shall Contractor be entitled to increase fees for services rendered before the thirtieth day after Contractor notifies City in writing of an increase in that fee schedule. Fees for such additional services shall be paid within sixty days of the date Contractor issues an invoice to City for such services.

7. OWNERSHIP OF WRITTEN PRODUCTS

All reports, documents or other written material ("written products" herein) developed by Contractor in the performance of this Agreement shall be and remain the property of City without restriction or limitation upon its use or dissemination by City. Contractor may take and retain copies of such written products as desired, but no such written products shall be the subject of a copyright application by Contractor.

8. <u>RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES</u>

Contractor is, and shall at all times remain as to City, a wholly independent contractor. Contractor shall have no power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability on behalf of City or otherwise to act on behalf of City as an agent. Neither City nor any of its agents shall have control over the conduct of Contractor or any of Contractor's employees, except as set forth in this Agreement. Contractor shall not represent that it is, or that any of its agents or employees are, in any manner employees of City.

9. **CONFIDENTIALITY**

All data, documents, discussion, or other information developed or received by Contractor or provided for performance of this Agreement are deemed confidential and shall not be disclosed by Contractor without prior written consent by City. City shall grant such consent if disclosure is legally required. Upon request, all City data shall be returned to City upon the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

10. <u>INDEMNIFICATION</u>

- 10.1 Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City of Calabasas, District, County of Los Angeles, its Special Districts, Elected Officials, Officers, Agents, Employees and Volunteers from and against any and all liability, including, but not limited to, demands, claims, actions, fees, costs, and expenses of any nature whatsoever (including attorney and expert witness fees), arising from or connected with Contractor's acts and/or omissions arising from and/or relating to this Contract. This indemnification also shall include any and all intellectual property liability, including copyright infringement and similar claims.
- 10.2 The parties agree that City, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers should, to the fullest extent permitted by law, be protected from any and all loss,

injury, damage, claim, lawsuit, cost, expense, attorneys' fees, litigation costs, or any other cost arising out of or in any way related to the performance of this Agreement including but not limited to claims of patent, trademark or copyright infringement. Accordingly, the provisions of this indemnity provision are intended by the parties to be interpreted and construed to provide the City with the fullest protection possible under the law. Contractor acknowledges that City would not enter into this Agreement in the absence of Contractor's commitment to indemnify and protect City as set forth herein.

10.3 To the fullest extent permitted by law, Contractor shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend City, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers from and against any and all claims and losses, costs or expenses for any damage due to death or injury to any person and injury to any property resulting from any alleged intentional, reckless, negligent, or otherwise wrongful acts, errors or omissions of Contractor or any of its officers, employees, servants, agents, or subcontractors in the performance of this Agreement. Such costs and expenses shall include reasonable attorneys' fees incurred by counsel of City's choice.

10.4 City shall have the right to offset against the amount of any compensation due Contractor under this Agreement any amount due City from Contractor as a result of Contractor's failure to pay City promptly any indemnification arising under this Section 10 and related to Contractor's failure to either (i) pay taxes on amounts received pursuant to this Agreement or (ii) comply with applicable workers' compensation laws.

The obligations of Contractor under this Section 10 will not be limited by the provisions of any workers' compensation act or similar act. Contractor expressly waives its statutory immunity under such statutes or laws as to City, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers.

10.6 Contractor agrees to obtain executed indemnity agreements with provisions identical to those set forth here in this Section 10 from each and every subcontractor or any other person or entity involved by, for, with or on behalf of Contractor in the performance of this Agreement. SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 2012-302, which will eliminate all multifamily residential uses from the list of conditionally permitted uses in the Commercial Retail (CR) zoning district.

BACKGROUND:

On November 14, 2012 the City Council conducted a public hearing and introduced Ordinance No. 2012-302. The ordinance introduction was accomplished as part of a joint motion which also adopted Resolution No. 2012-1356 to amend the 2030 General Plan so that multi-family residential uses are no longer included in the description of Business-Retail land uses. The motion passed by a 5-0 vote.

Formal adoption of Ordinance No. 2012-302 is necessary to complete the effort to strengthen and improve the Development Code, and to bring the Code into

conformance with General Plan policies. The ordinance would take effect on the 31st day following adoption by the Council.

The project is categorically exempt from CEQA review, as discussed in the previous staff report.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

None.

REQUESTED ACTION:

That the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 2012-302, which will eliminate all multifamily residential uses from the list of conditionally permitted uses in the Commercial Retail (CR) zoning district.

ORDINANCE NO. 2012-302

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 17.11 OF THE CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE BY ELIMINATING MULTIFAMILY RESIDENTIAL AS A CONDITIONALLY ALLOWED USE IN THE COMMERCIAL RETAIL ZONING DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the City of Calabasas has adopted regulations governing commercial land uses pursuant to its police power to protect public health, safety, and welfare; specifically in Chapter 17.11 of the Calabasas Municipal Code; and,

WHEREAS, Chapter 17.11 of the Calabasas Municipal Code identifies permitted and conditionally permitted uses in all zoning districts, including the Commercial Retail zoning district; and,

WHEREAS, the supply of undeveloped land zoned for commercial retail use in the City is critically short and opportunities to add to the supply of Commercial Retail zoned land are severely limited; and,

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City Council to preserve Commercial Retail zoned properties located in the City of Calabasas exclusively for commercial use; and,

WHEREAS, the City has set aside more than adequate land resources for future housing development on residentially zoned sites and mixed-use zoned sites, as documented in the Calabasas 2030 General Plan Housing Element, which was certified to be consistent with California housing laws by the California Department of Housing and Community Development; and,

WHEREAS, the elimination of residential land uses as conditionally permitted uses in Commercial Retail zoned areas of the city will not detrimentally affect the City's ability to provide for the future housing needs of the city; and,

WHEREAS, on October 18, 2012, the Planning Commission of the City of Calabasas held a duly noticed public hearing to consider the amendments to Chapter 17.11 of the Calabasas Municipal Code, received testimony from City staff, and all interested parties regarding the proposed Code amendments, and after such testimony and deliberation adopted Planning Commission Resolution No. 2012-529 recommending to the City Council adoption of Ordinance 2012-302; and,

WHEREAS, on November 14, 2012, the City Council of the City of Calabasas held a duly noticed public hearing to consider amendments to Chapter 17.11 of the Calabasas Municipal Code, received testimony from City staff and all interested parties regarding the proposed Code amendments, and considered reports and transcripts from the October 18, 2012 meeting of the Planning Commission;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> Code Amendment. Title 17, Chapter 17.11 of the Calabasas Municipal Code (Table 2-2, Land Use Table) is hereby amended as set forth in Exhibit A, attached.

<u>Section 2.</u> Severability. Should any section, clause, or provision of this Ordinance be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or parts thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid, and to that end the provisions of this ordinance are severable.

<u>Section 3.</u> Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its adoption pursuant to California Government Code Section 36937.

<u>Section 4.</u> Certification. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published or posted according to law.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council re-establish and fund the Mulholland Highway Permanent Restoration project account. The prime focus for this project is to permanently restore the roadway and associated embankments damaged by winter storms along Mulholland Highway from Post Mile (PM) 27.42 to (PM) 27.53. These improvements will restore and ensure public safety and access along the stated route as well as adjacent residential developments.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

On June 13, 2012 The City Council approved the funding for the Mulholland Highway Permanent Restoration Project. This project area is located on a rural portion of Mulholland Highway between Dry Canyon Cold Creek Road and Turtle Creek Road. The project repaired winter storm damage to approximately 600 feet

of existing roadway and associated embankments, within the limits of existing City right of way.

Unfortunately when the 2012-2013 Annual Fiscal Budget for the City was approved on August 18, 2012, this project had been erroneously omitted from the budget which left the project not funded and with repair and restoration work needing to be completed. Therefore, staff recommends City Council to authorize the expenditure for the project and to re-establish the Mulholland Highway Landslide Repair fund/account 40-339-6503-07.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Staff requests up to \$200,000 to be spent from the Mulholland Highway Landslide Repair Account 40-339-650-307. The funds for this project <u>are allocated from the Federal Emergency Repair Fund with an 11.5 percent match of funds from the Oak Tree Mitigation Fund.</u>

REQUESTED ACTION:

Staff recommends that the City Council re-establish and fund the Mulholland Highway Permanent Restoration project account and to authorize the expenditure of up to \$200,000 for the project from Mulholland Highway Landslide Repair Account 40-339-6503-07, with local match funds from Fed-STPL Account 36-000-4690-00, to match the funds from the Oak Tree Mitigation Fund, and to modify and adjust the Fiscal Year 2012-2013 budget accordingly.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff is recommending that the City Council award a construction contract to Toro Enterprises in the amount of \$107,654.00 for slope repair and stabilization, to Restoration Landscape in the amount of \$75,000 for environmental restoration and to Benner and Carpenter in the amount of \$10,000 for survey, in conjunction with the Mulholland Highway Permanent Restoration project. The proposed work will stabilize current erosion and permanently restore scrub oak habitat and adjacent watercourses, in compliance with the project environmental conditions and in coordination with regulatory agencies.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The Mulholland Highway Landslide Repair Project is a federally-funded repair of a landslide and related damage to portions of Mulholland Highway between Dry

Canyon Cold Creek and Turtle Creek Roads. The project is funded by FHWA's Emergency Repair (ER) program and is administered through Caltrans. The previous phase of the project successfully completed the excavation and repair of the landslides underlying the roadway and associated embankments damaged by winter storms along Mulholland Highway from Post Mile (PM) 27.42 to PM 27.53.

The project area is traversed by two watercourses, one on the northwest and one on the south end of the project. Due to rain events following completion of the first phase of work, the watercourse at the bottom of the westerly slope embankment has undermined portions of the slope repair. Similarly, erosion at the storm drain inlet area at the south end of the project is mobilizing sediment and resulting head-cutting at the drainage outlet. Staff has consulted with the design engineer and obtained repair recommendations to both arrest the progression of erosion and repair the damaged portions of slope. Additionally, activities associated with the first phase of the construction project required the removal of several scrub oaks from the slope area, and the current erosion threatens a greater area of scrub oak habitat if left unchecked.

The approved scope of the project per Caltrans requires environmental protections of both oak habitat as well as limitations on related erosion. The approved funding provides for such work, where associated with the project and its repair activities. In order to complete the repair work, the construction contractor will need to first stabilize embankment slope which supports a portion of Mulholland Highway, then re-grade the repaired portions of slope in preparation for landscape. The environmental restoration contractor will then develop a preliminary re-vegetation and repair plan in consultation with the appropriate regulatory agencies, construct check dams of native material to stabilize the stream inverts, implement gathering of native seeds and planting of appropriate root stock, re-vegetate slopes and watercourses, and provide for irrigation and establishment of the plant materials.

Staff recommends hiring contractors to complete the required slope stabilization and repair, and environmental restoration efforts as described. For the slope stabilization and repair portion of the work, staff obtained 3 bids from contractors qualified to complete the repair. Received bids ranged from \$107,654.00 to \$125,264.80. Toro Enterprises submitted the low bid, and is well qualified to perform the work.

The City has previously contracted with Restoration Landscape on this project, and staff recommends a renewal of this contract. Restoration Landscape has prepared preliminary plans for the environmental restoration, and commenced procurement of the landscape planting material. Upon completion of the slope stabilization and repair efforts, the environmental restoration would commence in the Fall of 2012.

Staff also recommends award of a contract for construction survey services for the construction portion of the project. The survey would provide for topographic and right of way delineation prior to the start of construction activities.

Therefore, Staff recommends City Council to authorize the expenditure of up to \$192,654.00 for the project from the Mulholland Highway Landslide Repair account 40-339-6503-07.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Staff requests up to \$192,654.00 to be spent from the Mulholland Highway Landslide Repair Account 40-339-6503-07. The funds for this project are allocated from federal Emergency Repair monies, with contribution and match funds and contributions from the Oak Tree Mitigation Fund.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Staff recommends that the City Council award a construction contract to Toro Enterprises in the amount of \$107,654 for slope repair and stabilization work, and to Restoration Landscape in the amount of \$75,000.00 for environmental work to be performed for this project. Staff also recommends that City Council award a contract for construction survey services to Benner and Carpenter for \$10,000.

Staff recommends City Council authorize the expenditure of up to \$192,654.00 for the project from Mulholland Highway Landslide Repair Account 40-339-6503-07.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Recommend staff proceed with design and construction of traffic mitigation projects in accordance with the memorandum of agreement, dated December 15, 2004 with the Calabasas Park Homeowners Association.

BACKGROUND:

In a Memorandum of Agreement, dated December 28, 2004, (Attachment 1) the City of Calabasas, the Las Virgenes Unified School District, and the Calabasas Park Homeowners Association (CPHA) agreed that, if no new elementary school can be constructed within Calabasas Park, that the \$8 million received from New Millennium Homes and held in trust by the City would be liquidated and the fund balance be apportioned equally between the general funds of the City and the LVUSD.

On March 17, 2009, the LVUSD informed the City that because of the State budget situation that a new school could not be built and requested an incremental approach to the dissolution of the fund (Attachment 2). This letter triggered

discussions between the City and CPHA as to each entity's responsibilities under the agreement.

The agreement called for the City to expend a "substantial portion" of its share of the New Millennium Homes Fund (\$4.0 million) to finance "traffic mitigation programs or projects for the benefit of and within the Calabasas Park community based on input under the direction of the CPHA Board, in consultation with other Calabasas Park HOAs."

In a letter, dated October 22, 2012, the CPHA Board identified four traffic mitigation projects they believe will improve traffic safety within the Calabasas Park community. They also provided suggestions for two other beautification projects (Attachment 3).

In a letter, dated October 25, 2012, the City responded to the CPHA. Pending Council approval, the City accepted CPHA's recommendations for traffic mitigation projects. The City also accepted, in principle, their recommendations for an undefined gateway project and several other median beautification projects (Attachment 4).

Completion of the traffic mitigation projects will fulfill the City's requirements under the MOU and leave approval and completion of the beautification projects as the only outstanding matter.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The following four projects were identified by the CPHA Board to improve traffic safety within the Calabasas Park community; they are briefly discussed below:

Installation of a Traffic Signal at the Intersection of Park Capri and Park Granada

The installation of a traffic signal at this intersection will improve the safety at this location by providing signal-controlled operation for traffic on all legs of the intersection. Currently, drivers travelling southbound on Park Capri have a stop sign at the intersection and have limited sight distance.

Benefits

- Reduce traffic delay at the intersection
- Improve intersection safety by eliminating hazards associated with limited sight distance.

Cost: \$215,000

<u>Installation of a traffic island (to replace posts) at the intersection of Paseo Primario</u> and Calle Largo

The traffic delineators currently installed at this intersection to help define the right turn lane offer limited safety benefits when channelizing traffic. They do not provide a protected right turn for vehicles exiting Calabasas Park Estates into Parkway Calabasas.

Benefits

- Improved traffic control at the intersection
- Enhanced Safety

Cost: \$5,000

Improving the Bay Laurel Elementary School Drop-Off Area on Parkway Calabasas between Paseo Primario and Park Entrada

The drop-off area along Parkway Calabasas near Bay Laurel Elementary School is currently weakly defined. The installation of bulb-outs, landscaped medians and additional striping north of Paseo Primario will help drivers identify the area as restricted zone and improve the overall safety of the drop-off operations and traffic flow in the immediate vicinity.

Benefits

- Improved traffic flow along this corridor
- Improved traffic safety for drop-off/pick-up operations along the corridor
- Enhanced Aesthetics

Cost: \$110,000

Installation of Traffic Safety Mirrors at Calabasas Swim and Tennis Club

The installation of traffic safety mirrors improves visibility at locations identified to have "blind spots" and, consequently, provide insufficient sight distance. The intersection of Park Sorrento with the Calabasas Tennis and Swim Club is an intersection that would benefit from the elimination of an existing blind spot.

Benefits

- Reduce traffic delay at the intersection
- Improve intersection safety by eliminating hazards associated with limited sight distance.

Cost: \$2,000

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The source of funding for the proposed work is from the Management Reserve Fund, Fund 60; the total being allocated will be \$350,000.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Recommend Staff proceed with design and construction of traffic mitigation projects in accordance with the memorandum of agreement, dated December 15, 2004 with the Calabasas Park Homeowners Association.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT (City / LVUSD / CPHA)

THIS MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into as of December 15, 2004 (the "Effective Date"), by and between the CITY OF CALABASAS, a public body, corporate and politic (hereinafter referred to as the "City") the LAS VIRGENES UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, a public body, corporate and politic (hereinafter referred to as "LVUSD") and the CALABASAS PARK HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION, a California not-for-profit corporation (hereinafter referred to as "CPHA"). City, LVUSD and CPHA are individually referred to herein as a "party" and are collectively referred to as the "parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, LVUSD and NM Homes One, Inc. ("NMH") have previously entered into that certain Termination and Option Surrender Agreement, dated as of December15, 2004 (the "LVUSD-NMH Agreement"), pursuant to which no elementary school will be constructed by the LVUSD within the Oaks of Calabasas subdivision.

WHEREAS, LVUSD, City, CPHA, and other interested parties, including NM Homes One, Inc. ("NMH") and The Oaks of Calabasas Homeowners Association ("Oaks HOA"), desire that an elementary school be constructed elsewhere in Calabasas.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties incorporate the foregoing recitals into this Agreement and further agree as follows:

A. <u>CPHA RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS</u>

- 1. CPHA agrees to provide written support as an association for a school facilities bond election to be held by LVUSD pursuant to paragraph B.1 below provided the new school is not constructed on a site within the Calabasas Park community that would adversely affect that community without sufficient mitigation funded by the school facilities bond, the NMH Funds, or otherwise.
- 2. CPA agrees to provide written support as an association for the "New Entitlements" (as defined in that certain Agreement, dated as of December 15, 2004, by and between the City and NMH ("the City-NMH Agreement")) and the acquisition of an alternative site for an elementary school in Calabasas outside the Oaks of Calabasas, provided the new school is not constructed on a site within the Calabasas Park community that would adversely affect that community without sufficient mitigation funded by the school facilities bond, the NMH Funds, or otherwise. CPHA agrees, solely in its capacity as an association, not to directly or indirectly protest or contest the exercise of the LVUSD's statutory authority to determine school attendance boundaries pursuant to this Agreement.

B. <u>LVUSD RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS</u>

- 1. LVUSD agrees to: (a) propose a school facilities bond no later than the November 2005 general election, or at such later date as is mutually agreeable to City and LVUSD, in an amount at least sufficient to fund completion of the Yerba Buena school as well as construction of a new elementary school in Calabasas as provided in this Agreement; (b) fund traffic mitigation measures at the new school site as mutually approved by City and LVUSD in consultation with CPHA and the Oaks HOA; and (c) make best efforts to commence construction of the school as soon as practicable after (i) acquisition of the site, (ii) passage of the school facilities bond or obtaining other funds for construction of a new elementary school and (iii) issuance of all necessary, final and non-appealable governmental approvals.
- 2. LVUSD consents to traffic mitigation measures at the Bay Laurel and the new elementary school sites, consisting of: (i) retention of a traffic coordinator funded by and reasonably acceptable to City; (ii) adopting a policy requiring all but kindergarten, first graders and recipients of good-cause permits to get to school by means other than private vehicles carrying fewer than two children; and (iii) conditioning the issuance of all discretionary permits for attendance at LVUSD schools in Calabasas on use of means other than private vehicles carrying fewer than two children; provided however, that City and LVUSD shall meet and confer in good faith to evaluate whether it is appropriate to modify these traffic mitigation measures, if and when there is a material decline in the Bay Laurel student population or a decline in any of the other schools that support a modification in other parts of the City or a determination by the LVUSD, after consultation with the City, that conditions at schools other that Bay Laurel or the new elementary school do not warrant these traffic mitigation measures. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, LVUSD employees whose children attend LVUSD schools via permits may drive their children to school in private vehicles carrying fewer than two children.
- (b) In the event the Bay Laurel student population exceeds the school's design capacity of 700 students, the LVUSD will meet and confer with representatives of the CPHA in a good faith effort to identify feasible means to reduce that over-population. The LVUSD will retain, however, discretion in the management of the school except as the LVUSD has expressly agreed to the contrary in this Agreement or in the related Agreements of even date herewith to which LVUSD is a party.
- 3. LVUSD agrees to issue no further discretionary permits at Bay Laurel except as otherwise provided in this Agreement. "Discretionary" means permits not mandated by state or federal law, such as, without limitation, permits mandated for special education needs.
- 4. Unless otherwise agreed by the City and LVUSD in writing and until the new school is in operation, LVUSD agrees to maintain attendance boundaries that exclude children from The Oaks from Bay Laurel until the earliest of (a) July 1, 2009 or such later date prior to July 1, 2010 as is necessary to account for delay arising from any

unforeseeable event beyond the reasonable control of any party to this Agreement, other than a lack of money, during the acquisition of an identified, mutually agreeable site for a school, preparation of such a site for construction, or design of a school building for such a site), (b) a decision of the City and LVUSD pursuant to paragraph C.1(b)(iv) below to abandon efforts to construct a new elementary school in the City or (c) the date a new elementary school commences operation in the City of Calabasas, with exceptions for children currently attending Bay Laurel and their siblings (so long as siblings attend the school at the same time). Households whose children are excluded from Bay Laurel under this Agreement can send their children to either Bay Laurel or to the new elementary school when it is open, provided they comply with the traffic mitigation requirements per paragraph B.2 above. LVUSD may make exceptions to these school attendance boundaries by discretionary permit conditioned upon a requirement that the child subject to the permit get to school other than by private vehicle carrying fewer than two children. Notwithstanding the foregoing, however, the City and LVUSD shall meet and confer in good faith to evaluate whether it is appropriate to modify these agreed attendance boundaries if and when there is a material decline in the Bay Laurel student population or a decline in any of the other schools that supports a modification in other parts of the city.

5. Upon operation of the new elementary school, LVUSD will meet and confer with CPHA regarding the feasibility of removing up to one fourth of the temporary modular structures from the Bay Laurel school site. LVUSD shall retain sole and absolute discretion whether to remove any such structures from that site.

C. <u>CITY RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS</u>

- 1. (a) City will make Eight Million Dollars (\$8,000,000.00) to be received from NMH pursuant to the "LVUSD-NMH Agreement" and the City-NMH Agreement (the "NMH Funds"), if and as those funds are actually received by the City, available to LVUSD either for acquisition and development of a school site in the City, approved by both City and LVUSD, or for development of new facilities at an existing school site in the City, if approved by City and LVUSD, as provided herein.
- (b) The NMH Funds shall be used to fund a school site acquisition and development as follows: (i) subject to approval of such site by LVUSD, City will make best efforts to acquire a site in incorporated or unincorporated East Calabasas; (ii) should those efforts fail, City shall make best efforts to acquire another suitable site in Calabasas acceptable to the LVUSD; (iii) if both such efforts fail, LVUSD shall make best efforts to acquire a site or, upon agreement by the City that it is appropriate to do so, improve an existing site owned by LVUSD in West Calabasas suitably for a magnet school or for an additional, non-magnet school; and, (iv) if, despite such efforts, by July 1, 2009 (or such later date prior to July 1, 2010 as is necessary to account for delay arising from any unforeseeable event beyond the reasonable control of LVUSD or the City, other than a lack of money, during the acquisition of an identified, mutually agreeable site for a school, preparation of such a site for construction, or design of a school building for such a site), no new Calabasas elementary school is under construction or in operation, or at

such earlier time as the LVUSD and City agree that no new Calabasas elementary school can or should be constructed, the NMH Funds shall be liquidated by apportioning its balance between the general funds of LVUSD and City in the manner required by that certain agreement between the City and LVUSD of even date herewith.

- (c) (i) Before resorting to options (iii) or (iv) of paragraph C.1(b) above, City and LVUSD shall meet and confer in good faith with CPHA regarding their efforts to acquire a suitable site for a new elementary school in incorporated or unincorporated East Calabasas. If CHPA wishes to do so, it may identify (x) potential sites which City and LVUSD had not sought to acquire or (y) feasible means to acquire sites City and LVUSD have considered which feasible means City and LVUSD have not pursued. Following those good-faith discussions, City shall make best efforts to acquire the site, or pursue the means, identified by CPHA unless City or LVUSD reasonably determines that such efforts would be unproductive, as where a site is not suitable for a school, cannot be acquired at reasonable cost, or otherwise.
- City agrees to meet and confer with CPHA in consultation (ii) with other Calabasas Park homeowners associations (HOAs) regarding any expenditure of its share of proceeds of the NMH Funds pursuant to paragraph C.1.(b)(iv) above or any balance of its share of the NMH Funds remaining after implementation of one of the options (i) through (iii) in paragraph C.1.(b) and that the City shall expend these funds on traffic mitigation programs or projects for the benefit of and within the Calabasas Park community based on input under the direction of the CPHA Board, in consultation with other Calabasas Park HOAs. If these traffic mitigation programs do not expend all of the funds, CPHA, in consultation with other Calabasas Park HOAs, may suggest other amenities to improve the environment in Calabasas Park which can be completed with the remaining funds. The intent of this section is to recognize that \$4M of the NMH Funds were in consideration of additional development within the Calabasas Park community and, thus, if a new elementary school is not built, a substantial portion of the \$4M should be utilized for traffic mitigation or other amenities for the benefit of the Calabasas Park community. In addition, the City agrees that, in its consultations with the LVUSD regarding a new school site, it will not consent to the construction of a school within the Calabasas Park community on a site that would adversely affect traffic circulation in that community without sufficient traffic mitigation funded by the school facilities bond, the NMH Funds, or otherwise.
- (d) Before selecting a site for a new school pursuant to this paragraph C., LVUSD shall allow for appropriate participation by CPHA and other members of the public in the decision-making process so that a site-selection process will be informed by the views of the CPHA and the broader public of which it is a part.

D. GENERAL RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS

1. <u>Mutual Releases</u>. Concurrently with the execution of this Agreement, the parties hereby agree to release each other fully from any and all claims arising from the subject matter of this Agreement, other than with respect to the performance by the



Dear Tony and Gary:

As the predetermined date for dissolution of the Joint Fund approaches, the School Board is facing some critical decisions and long-range planning challenges as a result of the State budget situation. These decisions will impact the future of our schools for years to come. The School Board is grateful that its portion of the Joint Fund will be available to help bridge part of the funding gap created by the State's fiscal crisis. However, the dismal fiscal situation is projected to continue for several years to come. As a result, the District can expect a reduction in funding estimated at \$24.8 million over the next four years. Our goal is to develop a plan that will provide the stability and continuity for our educational program during this period.

Based on this, I would like to propose an incremental approach to the dissolution of the Joint Fund. For reasons of programmatic stability and sound fiscal planning, I have recommended to our Board that our projected budgets utilize the sum of \$1 million from the Joint Fund in each of the four coming years. The District would propose that on July I of 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012, the District and the City each withdraw \$1 million from the funds on deposit in the Joint Fund. The remaining funds will continue earning interest, which as you know, has provided the School District with a much-needed ongoing revenue stream.

This incremental approach will result in all principal funds being withdrawn by July 2012, while during the interim period, interest will continue to be earned on the remaining funds and used for the benefit of our students.

The Board of Education believes that the Joint Fund is evidence of the tremendous support of the Calabasas community and the City of Calabasas for its public schools and public school students. I am hopeful you and your respective boards can assist us in continuing that effort to help the District to provide stable ongoing resources for the next four years.

I and/or representatives from our School Board would welcome the opportunity to discuss this approach with representatives from your respective agencies at your earliest convenience.

This letter is sent at the request of the Board of Directors for Calabasas Park Homeowners Association with regard to the school site funds being held by the City of Calabasas, as per the.

Memorandum of Agreement, dated December 15, 2004. Calabasas Park Homeowners Association welcomes the continued opportunity to work with the City of Calabasas and takes very seriously our right and responsibility to work with the City in determining how a substantial portion of the school site funds should be used for traffic mitigation and beautification within our Calabasas Park community.

After extensive consideration and discussion by our Board of Directors, along with solicited input from the sub-associations in Calabasas Park, we are formally presenting our views to the City of Calabasas for the use of the school site funds for the benefit of the Calabasas Park community.

Traffic Mitigation

- Traffic light to be installed at intersection of Park Granada and Park Capri. The installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Park Granada and Park Capri will improve the safety at this location by providing controlled operation for traffic. Currently, drivers travelling southbound on Park Capri have a STOP sign at the intersection and have limited sight distance. The signal will eliminate the risks associated with this restricted sight distance.
- <u>Installation of a median (to replace posts) on Parkway Calabasas at Paseo Primario</u> (entry to Calabasas Park Estates)

The current traffic delineators offer limited benefits when channeling traffic on Parkway Calabasas into Calabasas Park Estates since they provide fewer deterrents to vehicles than curbs and medians. In addition to safety, a median will be more aesthetically consistent with the community.

• Traffic mitigation at Bay Laurel School

Improvement for the drop off area on Parkway Calabasas near Bay Laurel School is needed to include the installation of bulb-outs and additional striping north of Paseo Primario. The intent is to help drivers identify the area as a restricted zone and improve the overall safety of the drop-off operations and traffic flow in the immediate area.

Installation of reflective mirrors at Calabasas Swim and Tennis Club
 Reflective mirrors are needed at the exit of the Calabasas Swim and Tennis Club for improved visibility and for a safer exit onto Park Sorrento.

Beautification

• Entryway project

The construction of an entryway project, "in concept," (i.e. portal, gateway, etc.) on Parkway Calabasas by Park Granada is recommended to delineate and announce the entrance to Calabasas Park. This project may include other locations, as well, to define clear entry points to Calabasas Park.

• Refurbishing the medians project

Improvements for the planters/medians are recommended for -1) Park Sienna and Park Sevilla street planter; 2) Park Sienna street planters; and 3) Park Sienna and Park Cordero street planter to maintain the continued attractive appeal of Calabasas Park.

Additional Ideas

The following ideas were also reviewed and discussed by the CPHA Board of Directors but with no formal vote taken by the Board. These are a compilation of ideas from the various homeowners associations in Calabasas Park.

• Traffic mitigation on Park Sorrento

There has been concern expressed of the excessive speeding on Park Sorrento, therefore, necessitating some form(s) of traffic mitigation.

Installation of a speed bump/hump on Park Sienna

It is believed that the installation of a speed hump/bump on Park Sienna, within close proximity to the rear gate of Bellagio will slow down the speeding traffic.

Additional traffic mitigation measures for Bay Laurel School

To allow for additional safety in and around Bay Laurel, it was suggest to install a walkway/path from the southwest end of the Bay Laurel field down to Parkway Calabasas, which would allow students to safely walk to Parkway Calabasas for pick-up; two partially endowed shuttle routes; and a remodel of the portion of Paseo Primario from the lower exit of the Bay Laurel parking lot to Parkway Calabasas.

Finally, it is further proposed that if all the monies allocated are not fully expended by the costs of the initial projects, then some monies will remain in reserve so that CPHA and the City can confer on additional projects.

Please note that CPHA expressly reserves all rights and remedies under the Memorandum of Agreement and applicable law and nothing contained in this letter is to be construed as a waiver of any rights of CPHA.



Dear Mr. Sherman:

Thank you for your letter of October 22, 2012, identifying traffic mitigation project recommendations and suggestions for other beautification projects and ideas. I know that you and your board members have worked very hard to pull these ideas together. The City is eager to work with CPHA to consider and undertake these projects.

Per the Memorandum of Agreement, we will undertake these projects in two phases. First, I will recommend to Council that we design and award contracts for the following recommended traffic mitigation projects:

- 1. Installation of a traffic signal at Park Granada and Park Capri.
- 2. Installation of a triangle median on Parkway Calabasas and Paseo Primario to replace the stripping and posts at the entrance to Calabasas Park Estates.
- 3. Establishment of a student drop off area on Parkway Calabasas below Bay Laurel Elementary school.
- 4. Establishment of reflective mirrors at the entrance/exit of the Calabasas Tennis and Swim Center.

The construction of these projects will fulfill the first part our mutual obligation under the agreement, which states that the "City shall expend these funds on traffic mitigation programs or projects for the benefit of and within the Calabasas Park community based on input under the direction of the CPHA Board, in consultation with other Calabasas park HOAs."

After we have constructed the agreed upon traffic mitigation projects and have an accurate final accounting of the cost of these projects, we move to fulfill the next phase of agreement. Our agreement states: "If these traffic mitigation programs do not expend all of the funds, CPHA, in consultation with other Calabasas Park HOAs, may suggest other amenities to improve the environment in Calabasas Park which can be completed with the remaining funds." In your letter, you provide two recommended beautification projects:

- 1. Entryway Project
- 2. Refurbishment of medians.

In principle, the City has no objection to these beautification projects. However, our agreement is very ambiguous as to how much of the \$4.0 million must be spent; first, on traffic migration projects that you recommend, and then on the beautification projects. The agreement states: "The intent of this section is to recognize that \$4.0 million of the NMH Funds were in consideration of additional development within the Calabasas Park community, and thus, if a new elementary school is not built, a substantial portion of the \$4.0 M should be utilized for traffic mitigation or other amenities for the benefit of the Calabasas Park Community."

As we have spoken, there is little clarity in the agreement's language. The word "significant" that qualifies how much of the \$4.0 M should be spent is not defined, and the agreement does not require the City to accept the "input" or "suggestions" that are made. The agreement also does not require the City to make City-owned property available for beautification projects. This is so because the funds to be used are public funds and the City cannot expend public funds on traffic mitigation projects that don't make sense or are not warranted by traffic safety engineering studies. Similarly, the City cannot accept suggestions for beautification projects that may be perceived by our residents to be extravagant, unnecessary, or a misuse of public funds. Since, the decision for accepting recommendations and suggestions rests with the City, the test for expending these funds is the same as for any other public funds that the City Council approves.

So clearly, the nature of the agreement requires both of us to work in good faith to meet the intent of our agreement. The additional development within Calabasas Park mentioned in the agreement resulted from the construction of an additional seven homes. The City received \$4.0 M from the developer in exchange for a modified entitlement to build seven more units in Oaks. It is the increased traffic impact of these seven homes that the funds were envisioned to mitigate. Your traffic mitigation recommendations serve to adequately mitigate this impact.

The median refurbishment that you propose is fairly straightforward and will pose no issue. What will be left for us to agree upon are the specific nature, scope, and cost, of the gateway project. We look forward to having you further define this proposal as we move forward with the other projects.




Traffic Island at the intersection of Paseo Primario and Calle Largo

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council approve moving forward with preliminary design and construction of a senior center on the Civic Center property.

BACKGROUND:

In the summer of 2011, a group of seniors approached the PRE Commission requesting additional programming for the active seniors of Calabasas. They had initial discussions with staff and although they appreciated that there were several senior classes and activities offered by the City, they wanted to formalize their position in the City and therefore formed Savvy Seniors, hoping to build their small group into a major force that would one day include a Senior Center to call their own.

Our Savvy Seniors and the Senior Task Force (Established by City Council at the October 24, 2012 meeting) feel it is important for the program to expand and a Center to be built for several reasons. It promotes dignity and self-esteem; fosters independence and self-determination, facilitates social interaction and involvement

in community life and dispels stereotypical and negative myths about aging. Senior centers, because of their mission to promote healthy, independent lifestyles among the elderly, serve as ideal outlets for baby boomers. Not only do they help maintain or improve health and well-being, but they also offer a place for boomers to serve other seniors who might benefit from shared experiences. Centers are offering a variety of services and programs that are of interest to younger, more active seniors, and they also help fulfill baby boomers need to continue their contributions to society through volunteerism, teaching and facilitating important, health-promoting social services.

Senior center programs are designed to help the elderly live better by easing the physical, emotional, social, and financial challenges attributable to age and disability. As the nation's elderly population continues to increase over the next 20-30 years, states will need to become increasingly aware of the demands of the aging population and supportive of programs like those offered at senior centers, which are designed to promote healthy, active senior lifestyles. Seniors who attend activities on a regular basis are shown to have better emotional health. Senior Center's offer an escape from lonely homes, lonely lives and isolation. Seniors who participate in center activities enjoy being around other seniors, sharing stories and participating in community activities. Senior Centers also allow seniors to develop a social network.

According to the California Commission on Aging, it was found that senior centers are designated as community focal points that not only provide helpful resources to older adults, but serve the entire community with information on aging; support for family, caregivers, training professionals and students; and development of innovative approaches to aging issues. The California studies conclude that successful aging is more likely when individuals are actively engaged in life. Senior centers are one of the most accessible, friendly and inexpensive places that offer programs and services that promote active engagement and enjoyment of life by older adults.

At the November 14, 2012 City Council Meeting, staff brought forward a discussion on potential sites for a senior center in our community. After a lengthy public comment period, the City Council agreed that moving forward with a senior center was in fact warranted. The Senior Task Force was then asked to determine whether the Civic Center is the appropriate site for a center to be built.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The Senior Task Force consisting of Mayor Mary Sue Maurer, Councilmember David Shapiro, and community members Carol Davis, Sue Somberg, Lois Julien, Brenda Cohen, Charlotte Meyer and Edward Albrecht (not present) met with staff

on November 20, 2012 to discuss potential sites for a Senior Center. Several city owned properties were discussed and they included; Calabasas Civic Center, Creekside Park, De Anza Park, Gates Canyon Park, Grape Arbor Park and the Calabasas Tennis & Swim Center. After discussions, all locations with the exception of the Civic Center were eliminated for the following reasons:

- Location
- Insufficient Parking
- Impacts with Existing Programs
- Loss of Valuable Open/Park Space

The Civic Center property was the unanimous location chosen by the Task Force for the following reasons:

- Location/Walkability
- Synergy with Civic Center
- Accessibility to Library, Dining, Entertainment and Shopping
- Ample Parking/Flat
- Safety and Lighting
- Continued Utilization of Founders Hall
- Current Familiarity with Facility
- Absorption of Infrastructure Costs by the Civic Center

The next steps in the process will be for the Senior Task Force to visit several senior centers and meet with both staff and participants, determine both amenities and programming desires, contract with an Architectural firm to conduct community workshops and develop a preliminary design and budget estimate.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Fund 60 will be utilized for expenditures associated with this project.

REQUESTED ACTION:

It is requested that the City Council approve moving forward with preliminary design and construction of a senior center on the Civic Center property.
