

When will Clean Power Alliance launch service?

Multi-phased approach

- Service began in February 2018 for municipal customers in unincorporated Los Angeles County (~1,800 accounts)
- 2. Service began in June 2018 for commercial customers in unincorporated Los Angeles County, and for municipal and commercial customers in Rolling Hills Estates and South Pasadena (~30,000 accounts)
- 3. In February 2019, service will be expanded to all residential customers within Clean Power Alliance service territory (~949,000 accounts)
- 4. In May 2019, service will be expanded to all remaining non-residential customers (~100,000 accounts)







Customers who wish to stay with SCE for energy supply may opt out




- Clean Power Alliance does not charge customers fees for opting out or returning to service with us




Components of Your Electricity Bill

Customer Account
Your SCE-assigned number identifies your account.
Please have your account number on hand if you
would like to make changes to your Clean Power

Alliance service.

- Service Account
 Your SCE and Clean Power Alliance service account
 numbers will both be listed in this section. SCE
 assigns an additional service account number to track
 Clean Power Alliance charges.
- Energy Usage
 The amount of energy you used in the billing period, measured in kilowatt hours (kWh).
- SCE Rate
 Your SCE rate determines how you are charged for
 the delivery of electricity. Your Clean Power Alliance
 electricity supply rate may not always match this
 one because Clean Power Alliance offers simplified,
 consolidated rate options.
- SCE Delivery Charges
 SCE's charges for the delivery of electricity. They
 include the cost of moving energy from the grid to
 your home or business and maintaining the electric
 lines.
- CCA Cost Responsibility Surcharge
 SCE's charge to recover costs of power purchased
 on your behalf before joining Clean Power Alliance.
 You may have heard the PCIA, or Power Charge

Understanding Your Bill





Usage Tier

For residential customers, this section indicates the highest tier you are being charged. If your electric use is more than your Tier 1 Allowance, which is set by state law, and crosses into Tier 2, the price you pay per kWh will increase. Customers who use more than 4 times their Tier 1 Baseline Allowance will be charged a High Usage Surcharge.

Clean Power Alliance Rate

Your Clean Power Alliance rate determines how you are charged for electricity supply/generation. Your Clean Power Alliance electricity rate may not allways match your SCE one because Clean Power Alliance offers simplified, consolidated rate options.

Our charge for the generation Charges
Our charge for the generation of electricity. This
section notes the Clean Power Alliance rate option
currently selected for your account (i.e. Lean Power,
Clean Power, or 100% Green Power). These charges
replace fees that SCE would collect if they were
providing your generation service. This is NOT an
additional charge.

Energy Surcharge

This charge applies regardless of your electricity provider. It is collected from all electricity customers statewide on behalf of the California Energy Commission.

Dec > Jan > Feb > Mar > Apr > May > June


- December January, Two enrollment notices will be sent out. The first 60 days prior to service enrollment and the second 30 days prior to enrollment. Enrollment occurs on customer's February meter read date.
- February Beginning in February, residential customers will be enrolled to receive service from the CPA. (Two additional post-enrollment notices are sent).
- March April, For non-residential customers, pre-enrollment notices will be sent out in March and April, 60 and 30 days prior to enrollment.
- May All the remaining non-residential customers will be enrolled for CPA Service, on May 1st.
 (Two additional post-enrollment notices are sent).



SUBJECT: SIDEWALK VENDING REGULATION: ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE

NO. 2019-371 OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA ADDING CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 9.07 "SIDEWALK VENDING" AND REPEALING CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE SECTIONS 9.24.170 "PEDDLING ON HIGHWAYS—LOCATION RESTRICTIONS" AND 9.24.180

"VIOLATION-PENALTY".

MEETING

DATE: JANUARY 9, 2019

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 2018-371 to enact a permitting system to regulate sidewalk vending.

BACKGROUND:

On September 17, 2018, Governor Brown signed Senate Bill No. 946 on September 17, 2018 to decriminalize sidewalk vending, prohibit local bans, and provide a guideline regarding permissible regulations. The Legislature concluded this bill was necessary for two reasons concerning immigration. First, immigrant rights activists oppose local laws banning sidewalk vending, claiming such laws unfairly target the

poor and immigrants. SB 946's author, Senator Ricardo Lara, cited these concerns as a motivation for his bill. Second, Proponents of SB 946 argued the criminalization of sidewalk vending makes undocumented immigrants vulnerable to deportation, citing an undocumented immigrant and mother of four detained by ICE after she was cited for multiple violations of Rancho Cucamonga's sidewalk vending ban. In response to these concerns, and in particular to the experiences of sidewalk vendors in the City of Los Angeles, which has an estimated 50,000 persons working in this field, the Legislature adopted SB 946. The bill prohibits cities from criminalizing sidewalk vending and allows cities to adopt reasonable regulations, within defined limits, on sidewalk vending. Staff prepared the attached ordinance to enact a permitting system for the City to regulate sidewalk vending.

Definition of Sidewalk Vending

A "sidewalk vendor" is someone who sells food, beverages, or merchandise from non-motorized conveyances or from his or her person in the public right-of-way or other pedestrian path. A non-motorized conveyance includes a pushcart, stand, display, pedal-driven cart, wagon, showcase, and rack, and is defined for the ordinance as a sidewalk vending receptacle. A sidewalk vendor may be stationary, operating from a fixed location, or roaming.

State Regulatory Guidelines under SB 946

SB 946 lists a number of impermissible regulations. First, the City is prevented from requiring a sidewalk vendor to operate within specific parts of the public right-of-way. However, the City may prohibit sidewalk vendors near certified farmers' markets, swap meets, or areas subject to a temporary special permit. Second, the City may not prohibit a sidewalk vendor from selling food or merchandise in a City park, except where the City has contracted with a concessionaire for the exclusive sale of food or merchandise. Third, the City may not require a sidewalk vendor to obtain the consent or approval of any nongovernmental entity or person before selling food or merchandise. Fourth, the City may not restrict sidewalk vending to a designated neighborhood or other area, although the City may prohibit a stationary sidewalk vendor from operating in an exclusively residential zone. Lastly, the City may not restrict the number of sidewalk vendors permitted in the City.

Notwithstanding these five prohibitions, the City may impose additional regulations if they directly relate to objective health, safety, or welfare concerns. The City may also regulate the time, place, and manner of sidewalk vending, including, but not limited to, any of the following:

- Restricting the hours of operation;
- Requiring maintenance of sanitary conditions;
- Complying disability access standards;
- Obtaining a use permit and/or business license;

- Possessing a valid California seller's permit for sales tax compliance;
- Requiring additional licenses from other state or local agencies as required by law;
- Requiring compliance with other generally applicable laws; and
- Providing information on vendor operations.

Sidewalk Vending Ordinance Amendment

The proposed City Council Ordinance No. 2018-371 ("Ordinance"), attached as Exhibit A, incorporates the permissible regulations listed above, including the following:

- (1) prohibiting stationary sidewalk vending in residential areas,
- (2) limiting roaming sidewalk vendors within residential areas to the hours of 9:00 a.m. through 5:00 pm.
- (3) prohibiting sidewalk vending within 500 feet of a permitted certified farmers' market, permitted swap meet, any area subject to a temporary use permit for the duration of the permit, or within 500 feet of a school during school hours and an hour before and after school, among others; and
- (4) prohibiting sidewalk vending by any state-registered sex offender.

The Ordinance also creates a detailed permitting process requiring applicants to:

- (1) provide personal identification,
- (2) list the items they intend to sell,
- (3) undergo criminal background checks, and
- (4) submit evidence of health permits and seller's permits, as required.

In addition, the Ordinance imposes a number of regulations on health, safety, and welfare grounds, including:

- (1) requiring sidewalk vendors of food or beverages to wear a hairnet and food service gloves,
- (2) preventing sidewalk vendors from emitting loud, unnecessary or unusual noises,
- (3) prohibiting sidewalk vendors from leaving their equipment within the public right-of-way from 10:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m.,
- (4) requiring sidewalk vendors to display their vending permits,
- (5) preventing sidewalk vending on public rights-of-way with a slope greater than five percent or from blocking egress or ingress to any business or facility.
- (6) prohibiting affixing sidewalk vending receptacles to any building or structure,
- (7) prohibiting use of open flames, propane, natural gas, or other explosion hazards, and
- (8) prohibiting the sale of alcohol, tobacco, or marijuana by sidewalk vendors, as already prohibited by the Calabasas Municipal Code.

The Ordinance charges the Department of Public Works with administering and enforcing the City's sidewalk vending permitting program. Operating without a permit or in violation of a permit is punishable by an administrative fine set by a graduated schedule of fines set at the maximum levels allowed by state law. A sidewalk vendor unable to pay a fine may request an ability-to-pay determination under SB 946, which may result in a reduction of the fine amount to up to 20 percent of the total.

The Ordinance also repeals two existing sections of the Calabasas Municipal Code that are preempted by SB 946. Section 9.24.170 imposes specific prohibitions on peddling along certain streets. SB 946 preempts specific, street-by-street restrictions of vending on sidewalks. Instead, vending within the road itself remains prohibited by the Vehicle Code and vendors along all streets are subject to the permitting and regulatory requirements of the Ordinance. Section 9.24.180 provides that violations of the street-specific prohibitions in section 9.24.170 are a criminal infraction and has also been preempted by SB 946.

The City intends to adopt this Ordinance before SB 946 takes effect on January 1, 2018. The Ordinance is currently scheduled for introduction and first reading on November 14, 2018, and second reading and adoption on November 28, 2018. Under State law, the Ordinance will take effect 30 days after adoption, or December 28, 2018.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council finds that there is no possibility the adoption of this sidewalk vending ordinance and the amendments to its peddling ordinance will have a significant effect on the environment. Accordingly, under the provisions of § 15061(b)(3) and § 15378(b)(5) of Division 6 of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations, the CEQA Guidelines, the adoption of this ordinance is not subject to the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The Department of Public Works' current budget is sufficient to absorb the anticipated cost of administering and enforcing the Ordinance's proposed sidewalk vending program. Permit fees, to be set by the City Council by resolution, which can be set at a level sufficient to recover the City's costs from processing and providing permits, will help offset the cost of this program.

REQUESTED ACTION:

That the City Council adopt Ordinance No. 2019-371 to enact a permitting system to regulate sidewalk vending.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA ADDING CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 9.07 "SIDEWALK VENDING" AND REPEALING CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE SECTIONS 9.24.170 "PEDDLING ON HIGHWAYS—LOCATION RESTRICTIONS" AND 9.24.180 "VIOLATION—PENALTY".

WHEREAS, on September 17, 2018, Governor Brown signed Senate Bill No. 946 ("SB 946"), adding sections 51036–51039 to the Government Code; and

WHEREAS, SB 946 decriminalizes sidewalk vending and limits local regulations to those expressly provided for in the bill or are otherwise "directly related to objective health, safety, or welfare concerns"; and

WHEREAS, SB 946 only applies to sidewalk vending in public rights-of-way, and private rights-of-way are still subject to private and local control; and

WHEREAS, although Calabasas' Municipal Code does not regulate "sidewalk vendors", as that term is defined in SB 946, it does regulate "peddling" (CMC 9.24.170), which may include sidewalk vendors; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to adopt a sidewalk vending ordinance and amend its peddling ordinance to ensure compliance with state law, before SB 946 takes effect on January 1, 2019; and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council finds that all the facts, findings, and conclusions set forth above in this Ordinance are true and correct.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> The City Council hereby finds and determines that there is no possibility the adoption of a sidewalk vending ordinance and the amendment to its peddling ordinance will have a significant effect on the environment. Accordingly, under the provisions of § 15061(b)(3) and § 15378(b)(5) of Division 6 of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations, the CEQA Guidelines, the adoption of this ordinance is not subject to the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act.

SECTION 3. The City Council hereby adds Chapter 9.07 to the Calabasas Municipal Code to read as follows:

"9.07 - Sidewalk Vending

9.07.010 - Definitions

As used in this chapter the following meanings shall apply:

"Sidewalk vendor" means a person who sells food or merchandise from a sidewalk vending receptacle, or from one's person, upon a public sidewalk or other pedestrian path.

"Sidewalk vending receptacle" means a pushcart, stand, display, pedaldriven cart, wagon, showcase, rack, or other non-motorized conveyance.

"Roaming sidewalk vendor" means a sidewalk vendor who moves from place to place and stops only to complete a transaction.

"Stationary sidewalk vendor" means a sidewalk vendor who vends from a fixed location.

9.07.020 - Sidewalk Vending Permits

- A. Only sidewalk vendors with valid sidewalk vending permits issued by the Public Works Director may vend upon the city's public rightof-way.
- B. A sidewalk vending permit shall be valid for a period of one year from the date of issuance, unless sooner revoked as set forth in this article.
- C. To apply for a sidewalk vending permit, the applicant must provide:
 - 1. A completed application form containing:
 - a. Their name and mailing address;
 - b. Description of the merchandise offered for sale or exchange;
 - c. If the sidewalk vendor is an agent of an individual, company, partnership, or corporation, the name and business address of the principal and any owners of the company, partnership, or corporation; and
 - d. Certification that the information is true to his or her knowledge and belief.
 - 2. A copy of a California's driver's license or identification number, an individual taxpayer identification number, or a social security number. Such information is not a public record and will remain confidential as required by Government Code section 51038(c)(4).
 - 3. A copy of a valid California Department of Tax and Fee Administration seller's permit, as required.
 - 4. A copy of a valid Mobile Food Permit issued by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health, as required.
 - 5. A statement indicating whether the sidewalk vendor intends to operate as a stationary sidewalk vendor or a roaming

sidewalk vendor and, if roaming, the intended method and path of travel.

- D. To ensure the safety of residents and the merchantability of products sold by vendors without a fixed place of business, the city requires all sidewalk vending applicants to undergo a fingerprinting background check and to submit the results to the city as an attachment to their application.
- E. The sidewalk vending permit application shall require the applicant to agree, in writing, to comply with all the provisions of this chapter and all applicable provisions of the Calabasas Municipal Code.

9.07.030 - General Regulations

- A. To maintain accessibility standards for the city's disabled residents, every sidewalk vendor operating on any sidewalk or public right-of-way must ensure that no obstruction is placed in the sidewalk or public right-of-way that would reduce the width of the sidewalk to less than forty-eight (48) inches, exclusive of the top of the curb. No obstruction shall be located in a sidewalk or public right-of-way less than six (6) feet in width when the sidewalk is adjacent to the curb.
- B. To prevent food-borne illness and protect the health and safety of the city's residents, every sidewalk vendor selling any food or beverage is required to wear a hairnet and food service gloves.
- C. To prevent dangerous distractions and promote the general welfare of the city's residents, sidewalk vendors emitting any loud, unnecessary and unusual noises must comply with Section 9.25.010 of this Code.
- D. A sidewalk vending permit does not provide an exclusive right to operate within any specific portion of the public right-of-way.
- E. No equipment or objects used for sidewalk vending purposes may be left or maintained in public spaces or in any portion of the public right-of-way from 10:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. Any equipment or objects left overnight in public spaces or in any portion of the public right-of-way will be considered discarded and may be seized or disposed of by the city.
- F. To facilitate the enforcement of this chapter, every sidewalk vendor must display their city-issued sidewalk vending permit on the street-side portion of their pushcart, stand, display, pedal-driven cart, wagon, showcase, rack, or other non-motorized conveyance when operating in the public right-of-way.
- G. To prevent unintended rolling or slipping, a sidewalk vendor is prohibited from operating a pushcart, pedal-driven cart, wagon, or other non-motorized conveyance on a public-right-of-way with a slope greater than five percent.

- H. To preserve accessibility to private and public facilities, a sidewalk vendor operating on any sidewalk or public right-of-way must ensure that no obstruction is placed impeding entry to and exit from a business or residence or access to a public facility.
- I. A sidewalk vendor shall not engage in the selling of alcohol, marijuana, tobacco products, products that contain nicotine or any product used to smoke/vape nicotine or marijuana, or adult-oriented material depicting, describing or relating to sexual activities.
- J. A sidewalk vendor must carry a waste disposal bag or container to permit the disposal of trash, food, or liquids.
- K. No sidewalk vending receptacle shall contain or use propane, natural gas, batteries, or other explosive or hazardous materials. A sidewalk vendor may not use an open flame on or within any sidewalk vending receptacle.
- L. Sidewalk vending receptacles shall not touch, lean against, or be affixed at any time to any building or structure including, but not limited to lampposts, parking meters, mailboxes, traffic signals, fire hydrants, benches, bus shelters, newsstands, trashcans or traffic barriers.

9.07.040 – Location-Specific Regulations

- A. Sidewalk vending hours' limitations in areas zoned for nonresidential use will be as restrictive as any limitations on hours of operation imposed on other businesses or uses on the same street, excluding those permitted to operate 24 hours.
- B. Sidewalk vending is limited to the hours of 9:00 a.m. through 5:00 p.m. for areas that are exclusively residential.
- C. Stationary sidewalk vendors are prohibited from operating in areas that are exclusively residential.
- D. A stationary sidewalk vendor is prohibited from operating in a city park if the City has entered into exclusive agreements for the sale of food or merchandise by one or more concessionaires for that city park.
- E. A sidewalk vendor is prohibited from operating within five-hundred (500) feet of a permitted certified farmers' market, a permitted swap meet, or any area subject to a temporary use permit for the duration of the permit.
- F. To limit traffic congestion and protect the safety of children traveling to and from and in and around schools from potential adverse safety impacts due, in part, to sidewalk congestion, no sidewalk vendor is permitted to operate within five-hundred (500) feet of a public or private school during the period extending of one hour before the start of classes and one hour after the end of classes.

G. To protect the health and safety of school children, no stateregistered sex offender may operate as a sidewalk vendor within five-hundred (500) feet of a public or private school at any time.

9.07.050 - Violation - Penalty

- A. Every person vending without a sidewalk vending permit is guilty of an administrative violation punishable by an administrative fine not to exceed:
 - 1. Two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for a first violation; or
 - 2. Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for a second violation within one year of the first violation; or
 - 3. One thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) for each additional violation within one year of the first violation.
 - 4. Upon proof of a valid permit issued by the Public Works Department, the administrative fine in Section 9.07.050(A) will be reduced to the corresponding administrative fine in Section 9.07.050(B).
- B. Every person violating any other provision of this chapter is guilty of an administrative violation punishable by an administrative fine not to exceed:
 - 1. One hundred dollars (\$100.00) for a first violation; or
 - 2. Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for a second violation within one year of the first violation; or
 - 3. Five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each additional violation within one year of the first violation.
 - 4. The Public Works Director may rescind a sidewalk vendor permit for the remaining term of the permit upon a fourth or subsequent violation of this chapter.
- C. Failure to pay an administrative fine is not punishable as an infraction or misdemeanor. Additional fines, fees, assessments, or any other financial conditions beyond those authorized will not be assessed. However, the City may levy a lien on the violator's real or personal property, including the vehicle used for vending purposes.
- D. An administrative violation constitutes a separate and distinct violation for each day that it exists and each such violation may be subject to the maximum fine permitted under this chapter.

9.07.060 - Ability-to-Pay Determination

- A. Any fine issued under Section 9.08.050 will be accompanied with a notice of and instruction regarding the right to request an ability-to-pay determination.
- B. If the requestor is receiving public benefits under Government Code section 68632, subdivision (a), or has a monthly income which is 125 percent or less than the current poverty guidelines updated

periodically in the Federal Register by the United States Department of Health and Human Services, the Public Works Director will limit the total amount of the requestor's administrative fine to 20 percent of the total and may:

- 1. Allow the person to complete community service in lieu of paying the total administrative fine; or
- 2. Waive the administrative fine; or
- 3. Offer an alternative disposition.

SECTION 4. The City Council hereby repeals Section 9.24.170 of the Calabasas Municipal Code.

SECTION 5. The City Council hereby repeals Section 9.24.180 of the Calabasas Municipal Code.

SECTION 6. Severability Clause:

Should any section, clause, or provision of this Ordinance be declared by the Courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or parts thereof, other than the part so declared to be invalid.

SECTION 7. Effective Date:

This Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after its passage and adoption pursuant to California Government Code Section 36937 and shall supersede any conflicting provision of any City of Calabasas ordinance.

SECTION 8. Certification:

The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published or posted according to law.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Recommendation to award a two year professional services agreement (PSA) to Azteca Landscape for the Landscape Maintenance of the Common Areas for Oak Park Calabasas Homeowners Association within the Landscape Lighting Act District 22 in the City of Calabasas, for the amount of \$250,000 plus Consumer Price Index (CPI) increases, and to modify the budget accordingly.

Additionally, authorize the Public Works Director to approve extra landscape maintenance work as needed under the terms of the PSA with Azteca Landscape, in an amount not to exceed the monies budgeted in the funds designated for the landscape work.

BACKGROUND:

The City's current landscape contractor for this work is Azteca Landscape; the contract was one year and expires on February 7, 2019. The new contract will be for two years.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

In general, the scope of this contract consists of, but is not limited to landscape maintenance of landscape spaces, including mowing and edging, weeding, sweeping, pruning of shrubs and groundcovers, fertilizing, litter clean-up, and tree trimming for clearances within the locations shown on the Work Area Map, attached.

The yearly amount includes anticipated and routine scheduled maintenance operations but does not make provisions for unforeseen or emergency work which is not uncommon when maintaining large landscape areas; however, an estimated dollar amount was calculated and included in the landscaping budget in case of such occurrences. The additional work generated from such events is not guaranteed but if additional work is released by the City in no event shall the total contract value exceed \$250,000 over the two (2) year term of the contract.

Azteca Landscape is the current contractor that provides landscape services for Oak Park Calabasas HOA under the direct supervision of the Public Works Department's Landscape Division. Azteca Landscape would like to continue to provide landscape services for Oak Park Calabasas HOA with the HOA's Board of Directors submitting a letter to the City requesting the City to approve and retain Azteca Landscape for continued service.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

Funding for this contract are utilized from Fund 22, the Landscape Maintenance District 22, 22-322-5712-xx assessment accounts:



1. **IDENTIFICATION**

THIS PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is entered into by and between the City of Calabasas, a California municipal corporation ("City"), and Azteca Landscape a California Corporation ("Consultant").

2. <u>RECITALS</u>

- 2.1 City has determined that it requires the following professional services from a consultant: Landscape Maintenance of the Common Areas for Oak Park Calabasas Homeowners Association within Landscape Lighting Act District 22 in the City of Calabasas.
- 2.2 Consultant represents that it is fully qualified to perform such professional services by virtue of its experience and the training, education and expertise of its principals and employees. Consultant further represents that it is willing to accept responsibility for performing such services in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions herein contained, City and Consultant agree as follows:

3. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

- 3.1 "Scope of Services": Such professional services as are set forth in Consultant's proposal to City attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 3.2 "Approved Fee Schedule": Such compensation rates as are set forth in Consultant's fee schedule to City attached hereto and included within Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 3.3 "Commencement Date": February 8, 2019.
- 3.4 "Expiration Date": February 7, 2021.

4. TERM

The term of this Agreement shall commence at 12:00 a.m. on the Commencement Date and shall expire at 11:59 p.m. on the Expiration Date unless extended by written agreement of the parties or terminated earlier in accordance with Section 17 ("Termination") below.

5. <u>CONSULTANT'S SERVICES</u>

- 5.1 Consultant shall perform the services identified in the Scope of Services. City shall have the right to request, in writing, changes in the Scope of Services. Any such changes mutually agreed upon by the parties, and any corresponding increase or decrease in compensation, shall be incorporated by written amendment to this Agreement. In no event shall the total compensation and costs payable to Consultant under this Agreement exceed the sum of **Two Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000)** unless specifically approved in advance and in writing by City.
- 5.2 Consultant shall perform all work to the highest professional standards of Consultant's profession and in a manner reasonably satisfactory to City. Consultant shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations, including the conflict of interest provisions of Government Code Section 1090 and the Political Reform Act (Government Code Section 81000 et seq.).
- 5.3 During the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall not perform any work for another person or entity for whom Consultant was not working at the Commencement Date if both (i) such work would require Consultant to abstain from a decision under this Agreement pursuant to a conflict of interest statute and (ii) City has not consented in writing to Consultant's performance of such work.
- Consultant represents that it has, or will secure at its own expense, all personnel required to perform the services identified in the Scope of Services. All such services shall be performed by Consultant or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in the work shall be qualified to perform such services. **Rita Arellanes** shall be Consultant's project administrator and shall have direct responsibility for management of Consultant's performance under this Agreement. No change shall be made in Consultant's project administrator without City's prior written consent.
- 5.5 To the extent that the Scope of Services involves trenches deeper than 4', Contractor shall promptly, and before the following conditions are disturbed, notify the City, in writing, of any:
 - (1) Material that the contractor believes may be material that is hazardous waste, as defined in § 25117 of the Health and Safety Code, which is required to be removed to a Class I, Class II, or Class III disposal site in accordance with provisions of existing law.
 - (2) Subsurface or latent physical conditions at the site differing from those indicated by information about the site made available to bidders prior to

the deadline for submitting bids.

(3) Unknown physical conditions at the site of any unusual nature, different materially from those ordinarily encountered and generally recognized as inherent in work of the character provided for in the contract.

City shall promptly investigate the conditions, and if it finds that the conditions do materially so differ, or involve hazardous waste, and cause a decrease or increase in the contractor's cost of, or the time required for, performance of any part of the work, the City shall issue a change order under the procedures described in the contract.

6. <u>COMPENSATION</u>

- 6.1 City agrees to compensate Consultant for the services provided under this Agreement, and Consultant agrees to accept in full satisfaction for such services, payment in accordance with the Approved Fee Schedule.
- 6.2 Consultant shall submit to City an invoice, on a monthly basis or less frequently, for the services performed pursuant to this Agreement. Each invoice shall itemize the services rendered during the billing period and the amount due. Within thirty calendar days of receipt of each invoice, City shall pay all undisputed amounts included on the invoice. City shall not withhold applicable taxes or other authorized deductions from payments made to Consultant.
- 6.3 Payments for any services requested by City and not included in the Scope of Services shall be made to Consultant by City on a time-and-materials basis using Consultant's standard fee schedule. Consultant shall be entitled to increase the fees in this fee schedule at such time as it increases its fees for its clients generally; provided, however, in no event shall Consultant be entitled to increase fees for services rendered before the thirtieth day after Consultant notifies City in writing of an increase in that fee schedule. Fees for such additional services shall be paid within sixty days of the date Consultant issues an invoice to City for such services.
- 6.4 This Agreement is further subject to the provisions of Article 1.7 (commencing at Section 20104.50) of Division 2, Part 3 of the Public Contract Code regarding prompt payment of contractors by local governments. Article 1.7 mandates certain procedures for the payment of undisputed and properly submitted payment requests within 30 days after receipt, for the review of payment requests, for notice to the contractor of improper payment requests, and provides for the payment of interest on progress payment requests which are not timely made in accordance with this Article. This Agreement hereby incorporates the provisions of Article 1.7 as though fully set forth herein.

6.5 To the extent applicable, at any time during the term of the Agreement, the Consultant may at its own expense, substitute securities equivalent to the amount withheld as retention (or the retained percentage) in accordance with Public Contract Code section 22300. At the request and expense of the consultant, securities equivalent to the amount withheld shall be deposited with the public agency, or with a state or federally chartered bank in this state as the escrow agent, who shall then pay those moneys to the Consultant. Upon satisfactory completion of the contract, the securities shall be returned to the Consultant.

7. OWNERSHIP OF WRITTEN PRODUCTS

All reports, documents or other written material ("written products" herein) developed by Consultant in the performance of this Agreement shall be and remain the property of City without restriction or limitation upon its use or dissemination by City. Consultant may take and retain copies of such written products as desired, but no such written products shall be the subject of a copyright application by Consultant.

8. <u>RELATIONSHIP OF PARTIES</u>

Consultant is, and shall at all times remain as to City, a wholly independent contractor. Consultant shall have no power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability on behalf of City or otherwise to act on behalf of City as an agent. Neither City nor any of its agents shall have control over the conduct of Consultant or any of Consultant's employees, except as set forth in this Agreement. Consultant shall not represent that it is, or that any of its agents or employees are, in any manner employees of City.

9. **CONFIDENTIALITY**

All data, documents, discussion, or other information developed or received by Consultant or provided for performance of this Agreement are deemed confidential and shall not be disclosed by Consultant without prior written consent by City. City shall grant such consent if disclosure is legally required. Upon request, all City data shall be returned to City upon the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

10. <u>INDEMNIFICATION</u>

- 10.1 The parties agree that City, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers should, to the fullest extent permitted by law, be protected from any and all loss, injury, damage, claim, lawsuit, cost, expense, attorneys' fees, litigation costs, or any other cost arising out of or in any way related to the performance of this Agreement. Accordingly, the provisions of this indemnity provision are intended by the parties to be interpreted and construed to provide the City with the fullest protection possible under the law. Consultant acknowledges that City would not enter into this Agreement in the absence of Consultant's commitment to indemnify and protect City as set forth herein.
- 10.2 To the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend City, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers from and against any and all claims and losses, costs or expenses for any damage due to death or injury to any person and injury to any property resulting from any alleged intentional, reckless, negligent, or otherwise wrongful acts, errors or omissions of Consultant or any of its officers, employees, servants, agents, or subcontractors in the performance of this Agreement. Such costs and expenses shall include reasonable attorneys' fees due to counsel of City's choice.
- 10.3 City shall have the right to offset against the amount of any compensation due Consultant under this Agreement any amount due City from Consultant as a result of Consultant's failure to pay City promptly any indemnification arising under this Section 10 and related to Consultant's failure to either (i) pay taxes on amounts received pursuant to this Agreement or (ii) comply with applicable workers' compensation laws.
- 10.4 The obligations of Consultant under this Section 10 will not be limited by the provisions of any workers' compensation act or similar act. Consultant expressly waives its statutory immunity under such statutes or laws as to City, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers.
- 10.5 Consultant agrees to obtain executed indemnity agreements with provisions identical to those set forth here in this Section 10 from each and every subcontractor or any other person or entity involved by, for, with or on behalf of Consultant in the performance of this Agreement. In the event Consultant fails to obtain such indemnity obligations from others as required herein, Consultant agrees to be fully responsible and indemnify, hold harmless and defend City, its officers, agents, employees and volunteers from and against any and all claims and losses, costs or expenses for any damage due to death or injury to any person and injury to any property resulting from any alleged intentional, reckless, negligent, or otherwise wrongful acts, errors or omissions of Consultant's

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subcontractors or any other person or entity involved by, for, with or on behalf of Consultant in the performance of this Agreement. Such costs and expenses shall include reasonable attorneys' fees incurred by counsel of City's choice.

10.6 City does not, and shall not, waive any rights that it may possess against Consultant because of the acceptance by City, or the deposit with City, of any insurance policy or certificate required pursuant to this Agreement. This hold harmless and indemnification provision shall apply regardless of whether or not any insurance policies are determined to be applicable to the claim, demand, damage, liability, loss, cost or expense.

11. <u>INSURANCE</u>

- 11.1 During the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall carry, maintain, and keep in full force and effect insurance against claims for death or injuries to persons or damages to property that may arise from or in connection with Consultant's performance of this Agreement. Such insurance shall be of the types and in the amounts as set forth below:
 - 11.1.1 Comprehensive General Liability Insurance with coverage limits of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) including products and operations hazard, contractual insurance, broad form property damage, independent consultants, personal injury, underground hazard, and explosion and collapse hazard where applicable.
 - 11.1.2 Automobile Liability Insurance for vehicles used in connection with the performance of this Agreement with minimum limits of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per claimant and One Million dollars (\$1,000,000) per incident.
 - 11.1.3 Worker's Compensation insurance as required by the laws of the State of California, including but not limited to California Labor Code § 1860 and 1861 as follows:

Contractor shall take out and maintain, during the life of this contract, Worker's Compensation Insurance for all of Contractor's employees employed at the site of improvement; and, if any work is sublet, Contractor shall require the subcontractor similarly to provide Worker's Compensation Insurance for all of the latter's employees, unless such employees are covered by the protection afforded by Contractor. Contractor and any of Contractor's subcontractors shall be required to provide City with a written statement acknowledging its obligation to secure payment of Worker's Compensation Insurance as required by Labor Code § 1861; to wit: 'I am aware of the provisions of Section 3700

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of the Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and I will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this contract.' If any class of employees engaged in work under this contract at the site of the Project is not protected under any Worker's Compensation law, Contractor shall provide and shall cause each subcontractor to provide adequate insurance for the protection of employees not otherwise protected. Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless City for any damage resulting from failure of either Contractor or any subcontractor to take out or maintain such insurance.

- 11.2 Consultant shall require each of its subcontractors to maintain insurance coverage that meets all of the requirements of this Agreement.
- 11.3 The policy or policies required by this Agreement shall be issued by an insurer admitted in the State of California and with a rating of at least A:VII in the latest edition of Best's Insurance Guide.
- 11.4 Consultant agrees that if it does not keep the aforesaid insurance in full force and effect, City may either (i) immediately terminate this Agreement; or (ii) take out the necessary insurance and pay, at Consultant's expense, the premium thereon.
- 11.5 At all times during the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall maintain on file with City's Risk Manager a certificate or certificates of insurance showing that the aforesaid policies are in effect in the required amounts and naming the City and its officers, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insureds. Consultant shall, prior to commencement of work under this Agreement, file with City's Risk Manager such certificate(s).
- 11.6 Consultant shall provide proof that policies of insurance required herein expiring during the term of this Agreement have been renewed or replaced with other policies providing at least the same coverage. Such proof will be furnished at least two weeks prior to the expiration of the coverages.
- 11.7 The General Liability Policy of insurance required by this Agreement shall contain an endorsement naming City and its officers, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insureds. The General Liability Policy required under this Agreement shall contain an endorsement providing that the policies cannot be canceled or reduced except on thirty days' prior written notice to City. Consultant agrees to require its insurer to modify the certificates of insurance to delete any exculpatory wording stating that failure of the insurer to mail written notice of cancellation imposes no obligation, and to delete the word "endeavor" with regard to any notice provisions. If this contract provides service to a Homeowners

Association, that Homeowners Association must be listed as an additional insured in addition to the City.

- 11.8 The insurance provided by Consultant shall be primary to any coverage available to City. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by City and/or its officers, employees, agents or volunteers, shall be in excess of Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- 11.9 All insurance coverage provided pursuant to this Agreement shall not prohibit Consultant, and Consultant's employees, agents or subcontractors, from waiving the right of subrogation prior to a loss. Consultant hereby waives all rights of subrogation against the City.
- 11.10 Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. At the option of City, Consultant shall either reduce or eliminate the deductibles or self-insured retentions with respect to City, or Consultant shall procure a bond or other security acceptable to the City guaranteeing payment of losses and expenses.
- 11.11 Procurement of insurance by Consultant shall not be construed as a limitation of Consultant's liability or as full performance of Consultant's duties to indemnify, hold harmless and defend under Section 10 of this Agreement.

12. MUTUAL COOPERATION

- 12.1 City shall provide Consultant with all pertinent data, documents and other requested information as is reasonably available for the proper performance of Consultant's services under this Agreement.
- 12.2 In the event any claim or action is brought against City relating to Consultant's performance in connection with this Agreement, Consultant shall render any reasonable assistance that City may require.

13. RECORDS AND INSPECTIONS

Consultant shall maintain full and accurate records with respect to all matters covered under this Agreement for a period of three years after the expiration or termination of this Agreement. City shall have the right to access and examine such records, without charge, during normal business hours. City shall further have the right to audit such records, to make transcripts therefrom and to inspect all program data, documents, proceedings, and activities with respect to this Agreement.

Any notices, bills, invoices, or reports required by this Agreement shall be deemed received on: (i) the day of delivery if delivered by hand, facsimile or overnight courier service during the addressee's regular business hours; or (ii) on the third business day following deposit in the United States mail if delivered by mail, postage prepaid, to the addresses listed below (or to such other addresses as the parties may, from time to time, designate in writing).

17. **TERMINATION**

- 17.1. City shall have the right to terminate this Agreement for any reason on five calendar days' written notice to Consultant. Consultant shall have the right to terminate this Agreement for any reason on sixty calendar days' written notice to City. Consultant agrees to cease all work under this Agreement on or before the effective date of any notice of termination. All City data, documents, objects, materials or other tangible things shall be returned to City upon the termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- 17.2 If City terminates this Agreement due to no fault or failure of performance by Consultant, then Consultant shall be paid based on the work satisfactorily performed at the time of termination. In no event shall Consultant be entitled to receive more than the amount that would be paid to Consultant for the full performance of the services required by this Agreement.

18. **GENERAL PROVISIONS**

- 18.1 Consultant shall not delegate, transfer, subcontract or assign its duties or rights hereunder, either in whole or in part, without City's prior written consent, and any attempt to do so shall be void and of no effect. City shall not be obligated or liable under this Agreement to any party other than Consultant.
- 18.2 In the performance of this Agreement, Consultant shall not discriminate against any employee, subcontractor, or applicant for employment because of race, color, creed, religion, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, national origin, ancestry, age, physical or mental disability, medical condition or any other unlawful basis.
- 18.3 The captions appearing at the commencement of the sections hereof, and in any paragraph thereof, are descriptive only and for convenience in reference to this Agreement. Should there be any conflict between such heading, and the section or paragraph thereof at the head of which it appears, the section or paragraph thereof, as the case may be, and not such heading, shall control and govern in the construction of this Agreement. Masculine or feminine pronouns shall be substituted for the neuter form and vice versa, and the plural shall be substituted for the singular form and vice versa, in any place or places herein in which the context requires such substitution(s).
- 18.4 The waiver by City or Consultant of any breach of any term, covenant or condition herein contained shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such term, covenant or condition or of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant or condition herein contained. No term, covenant or condition of this Agreement shall be deemed to have been waived by City or Consultant unless in writing.

- Consultant shall not be liable for any failure to perform if Consultant presents 18.5 acceptable evidence, in City's sole judgment that such failure was due to causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of Consultant.
- 18.6 Each right, power and remedy provided for herein or now or hereafter existing at law, in equity, by statute, or otherwise shall be cumulative and shall be in addition to every other right, power, or remedy provided for herein or now or hereafter existing at law, in equity, by statute, or otherwise. The exercise, the commencement of the exercise, or the forbearance of the exercise by any party of any one or more of such rights, powers or remedies shall not preclude the simultaneous or later exercise by such party of any of all of such other rights, powers or remedies. In the event legal action shall be necessary to enforce any term, covenant or condition herein contained, the party prevailing in such action, whether reduced to judgment or not, shall be entitled to its reasonable and actual court costs, including accountants' fees, if any, and attorneys' fees expended in such action. The venue for any litigation shall be Los Angeles County, California.
- 18.7 If any term or provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall, to any extent, be invalid or unenforceable, then such term or provision shall be amended to, and solely to, the extent necessary to cure such invalidity or unenforceability, and shall be enforceable in its amended form. In such event, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such term or provision to persons or circumstances other than those as to which it is held invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, and each term and provision of this Agreement shall be valid and be enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- 18.8 This Agreement shall be governed and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- 18.9 All documents referenced as exhibits in this Agreement are hereby incorporated into this Agreement. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of any document incorporated herein by reference, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail. This instrument contains the entire Agreement between City and Consultant with respect to the transactions contemplated herein. No other prior oral or written agreements are binding upon the parties. Amendments hereto or deviations herefrom shall be effective and binding only if made in writing and executed by City and Consultant.

- 18.10 This Agreement is further subject to the provisions of Article 1.5 (commencing at Section 20104) of Division 2, Part 3 of the Public Contract Code regarding the resolution of public works claims of less than \$375,000. Article 1.5 mandates certain procedures for the filing of claims and supporting documentation by the contractor, for the response to such claims by the contracting public agency, for a mandatory meet and confer conference upon the request of the contractor, for mandatory nonbinding mediation in the event litigation is commenced, and for mandatory judicial arbitration upon the failure to resolve the dispute through mediation. This Agreement hereby incorporates the provisions of Article 1.5 as though fully set forth herein.
- 18.11 This Agreement is further subject to the provisions of California Public Contracts Code § 6109 which prohibits the Consultant from performing work on this project with a subcontractor who is ineligible to perform work on the project pursuant to §§ 1777.1 or 1777.7 of the Labor Code.

19. PREVAILING WAGES

- 19.1 To the extent that the estimated amount of this Agreement exceeds \$1,000, this Agreement is subject to prevailing wage law, including, but not limited to, the following:
 - 19.1.1 The Consultant shall pay the prevailing wage rates for all work performed under the Agreement. When any craft or classification is omitted from the general prevailing wage determinations, the Consultant shall pay the wage rate of the craft or classification most closely related to the omitted classification. The Consultant shall forfeit as a penalty to City \$50.00 or any greater penalty provided in the Labor Code for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for each worker paid less than the prevailing wage rates for any work done under the Agreement employed in the execution of the work by Consultant or by any subcontractor of Consultant in violation of the provisions of the Labor Code. In addition, the difference between such prevailing wage rates and the amount paid to each worker for each calendar day, or portion thereof, for which each worker was paid less than the prevailing wage rate shall be paid to each worker by the Consultant.
 - 19.1.2 Consultant shall comply with the provisions of Labor Code Section 1777.5 concerning the employment of apprentices on public works projects, and further agrees that Consultant is responsible for compliance with Section 1777.5 by all of its subcontractors.

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- 19.1.3 Pursuant to Labor Code § 1776, Consultant and any subcontractor shall keep accurate payroll records, showing the name, address, social security number, work classification, straight time and overtime hours worked each day and week, and the actual per diem wages paid to each journeyman, apprentice, worker, or other employee employed by Consultant in connection with this Agreement. Each payroll record shall contain or be verified by a written declaration that it is made under penalty of perjury, stating both of the following: (1) The information contained in the payroll record is true and correct; and (2) The employer has complied with the requirements of Labor Code §§ 1811, and 1815 for any work performed by his or her employees on the public works project. The payroll records enumerated under subdivision (a) shall be certified and shall be available for inspection at all reasonable hours as required by Labor Code § 1776.
- 19.2 To the extent that the estimated amount of this Agreement exceeds \$1,000, this Agreement is further subject to 8-hour work day and wage and hour penalty law, including, but not limited to, Labor Code Sections 1810 and 1813, as well as California nondiscrimination laws, as follows:
 - 19.2.1 Consultant shall strictly adhere to the provisions of the Labor Code regarding the 8-hour day and the 40-hour week, overtime, Saturday, Sunday and holiday work and nondiscrimination on the basis of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, sex or sexual orientation, except as provided in Section 12940 of the Government Code. LOST HILLS JUVENILE INTERVENTION UNIT ACTIVITY REPORT FOR OCTOBER 2018 CALABASAS

A. SCHOOL ISSUES

Investigated 1 cell phone issues at Calabasas High: 1 threats, 0 sexting.

B. INTERVENTIONS

Conducted an intervention with Calabasas High student and his father re: unlicensed driving to school.

C. COMMUNITY / CRIMINAL ISSUES

- 1. We conducted a monthly parental resource class at Lost Hills Sheriff's Station. This program was developed by our unit and is designed to educate parents about: 1) The current trends in juvenile behavior and delinquency, 2) Alcohol/narcotic awareness and recognition, 3) School policy and campus issues, 4) Gang awareness and negative peer relations, 5) Parental rights and responsibilities and, 6) Parental responses to incorrigible and/or delinquent behavior. We also address the specific concerns relating to the minor's behavior. We educate the minor and their parents of possible criminal behavior and the legal consequences. We offer suggestions and make recommendations to improve the minor's quality of life.
- 2. Spoke with numerous citizens and parents who called to question various juvenile concerns and issues in the community. We also provide the parents with various juvenile resource programs within our community.
- 3. We met with the Sylmar Juvenile Court District Attorney regarding the investigation and filing of criminal charges against juvenile offenders.
- 4. Met with Captain Josh Thai throughout the month in order to keep him up to date regarding our unit's investigations and current juvenile issues within our city.
- 5. Entered juveniles into the Juvenile Automated Index system for various violations.
- 6. Made court appearances to testify as witnesses on the part of the People of the State of California and attended court proceedings in cases generated from the City of Calabasas. We also investigated, prepared, and filed cases with the District Attorney's office. We additionally assisted other investigators in the preparation of cases for court.

- 7. Met with station narcotic detectives on a regular basis to exchange information regarding juvenile and drug related issues. We have worked with the narcotic detectives on several narcotic cases directly and indirectly involving juveniles.
- 8. Handled the processing and follow-up of various juvenile referrals brought to the attention of this unit (i.e., Juvenile Information Forms, Field Interview Cards, Juvenile Automated Index, and citations for various juvenile contacts with uniform personnel).
- 9. Conducted our normal checks of juvenile problem areas in the city during weekend evenings and responded to juvenile related calls for service.
- 10. Updated the Gang Book and briefed the captain on criminal activity trends.
- 11. Registered 7 sexual predators.
- 12. Participated in the SARB program.
- 13. Parent talk at Round Meadow.
- 14. Meeting at the District to LVUSD.
- 15. Pick up Fugitive from Las Vegas Metro for Kidnapping.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the City Council approve Resolution No. 2019-1612 amending Resolution No. 2018-1596, approving the position of a Full-Time Public Works Maintenance Technician, and the reduction of an Executive Assistant I in the Public Works Department.

BACKGROUND:

The vacancy created with the recent retirement of a Public Works Department Executive Assistant, has presented an opportunity to re-organize the Public Works Department with regard to the part-time/full-time staff.

The Public Works department currently consists of one full time Public Works Maintenance Technician position that was created to perform the various tasks and duties for the City's R-O-W (trash can pick up, temporary road repairs. parkway maintenance, recycled battery pick-up, traffic sign installation, etc.) that were

previously performed by the two Maintenance Technicians. A contractor provided these Maintenance Technicians in the past.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

With an additional Public Works Maintenance Technician, the new position can assist the current Technician when needed, in addition to during their absences, and will also perform a variety of tasks and duties (encroachment permits, shuttles pass information, news rack permits, street inspections, fleet maintenance, etc.) within the department and when not assisting or working in the field.

Having an additional technician would eliminate an already existing strain on the Public Works Department.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

The addition of a Public Works Maintenance Technician and the elimination of Executive Assistant I position would create an overall savings of approximately \$10,000.00.

REQUESTED ACTION:

It is requested that the City Council approve and adopt Resolution No. 2019-1612, amending Resolution No. 2018-1596, approving the position of a Maintenance Technician and reducing an Executive Assistant I in the Public Works Department.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

Conduct a public hearing on the proposed projects and budget for the 2019-2020 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program Year. Upon consideration of the public testimony and discussion of relevant issues, adopt Resolution No. 2019-1611 (Attachment A) approving the allocation of 2019-2020 CDBG funds, and the proposed projects for implementation during the CDBG 2019-2020 Program Year.

BACKGROUND:

Each year, CDBG funds are allocated to cities by the Federal Housing and Urban Development Department (HUD), and administered through the Los Angeles County Community Development Commission (CDC). Participating cities, whose total population is less than 50,000, participate in the Los Angeles Urban County CDBG Program, and receive funding based upon the total number of cities participating in the County's program. It is also based on a city's need to provide housing, economic and social services; and community development opportunities that principally benefit persons of low and moderate income levels, aid in the prevention of neighborhood

deterioration, and meet other urgent community development needs due to natural disasters or other emergencies. To be eligible for the CDBG program, a household of two persons cannot exceed the annual moderate income limit of \$62,000, per HUD Income Guidelines. A household of four persons cannot exceed the annual moderate income limit of \$77,500.

This is the 45th year the City of Calabasas (or, prior to 1991, unincorporated Calabasas) has participated in the Los Angeles Urban County's CDBG Program. In order to continue its participation in the upcoming 2019-2020 program year, which begins on July 1, 2019 and ends on June 30, 2020, the City of Calabasas must prepare and submit its proposed CDBG project descriptions to the CDC no later than February 1, 2019, for review and approval.

Pursuant to Federal requirements, notice of this public hearing was properly published and posted in public buildings within the City. Federal requirements also mandate that as part of the hearing, the Council and public be informed of the range of eligible housing and community development activities that may be funded under the CDBG program. Interested persons may obtain a copy of the Federal eligibility guidelines, available at the City of Calabasas Administrative Services Department, during regular business hours.

DISCUSSION/ANALYSIS:

The City of Calabasas estimated CDBG allocation for Program Year 2019-2020 is approximately \$89,489. This is a **planning estimate only**; the CDC will not release final appropriations from HUD until Spring 2019. The City's final CDBG allocation may be **more** or **less** than the planning estimate. Generally, the final allocation is within 10 % of the estimate provided. In FY 2018-2019, Calabasas' CDBG appropriation was \$82,806.

For consideration, the following project is proposed for the 2019-2020 CDBG Program Year:

Residential Rehabilitation - \$89,489

This project offers grants and loans to owner-occupied residential property owners (including mobile homes on permanent foundations) for emergency repairs, improvements to substandard properties, corrections to code violations, seismic retrofits, and lead-based paint and asbestos hazard evaluations and remediation. A wide range of exterior and interior repairs are eligible for funding including plumbing, electrical, roofing, heating, ventilation, air conditioning upgrades, handicap accessibility

ramps, and energy efficiency upgrades such as water heaters and windows. To be eligible, owners must qualify as low or moderate income under HUD guidelines. Grants up to a maximum of \$10,000 and deferred 0% loans of up to \$15,000 will be available to eligible homeowners. It is anticipated that approximately one to two loans and six to eight grants will be completed under this program.

There continues to be high demand for the Residential Rehabilitation Program and approximately 20 prospective applicants are on the program waiting list. During FY 2018-2019, ten household projects were completed. For FY 2019-2020, it is anticipated that eight households will be served. To continue to meet the demand, it is recommended that the Residential Rehabilitation Program be offered for the upcoming CDBG Program Year 2019-2020.

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

For planning purposes, the City's CDBG estimated annual allocation for the upcoming 2019-2020 Program Year will be approximately \$89,489.

REQUESTED ACTION:

Conduct a public hearing on the proposed projects and budget for the 2019-2020 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program Year. Upon consideration of the public testimony and discussion of relevant issues, adopt Resolution No. 2019-1611 approving the allocation of 2019-2020 CDBG funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Calabasas hereby resolves as follows:

SECTION 1: That the City of Calabasas desires to fund eligible CDBG projects with 45th Program Year Funds.

SECTION 2: That City staff is hereby directed to submit to Los Angeles County Community Development Commission, through this document, the City's intent to approve and fund CDBG projects.

SECTION 3: That City staff is hereby directed to prepare and submit documentation required for the approval and implementation of 45th Program Year CDBG projects.

SECTION 4: That City staff is hereby authorized to perform modifications to

approved projects as required to conform to CDBG requirements, and to provide for the expedient expenditure of funds.

SECTION 5: That for planning purposes, the City's CDBG estimated annual allocation for the upcoming 2019-2020 Program Year will be approximately \$89,489 and that those funds will be utilized to rehabilitate qualified homes in Calabasas.

SECTION 6: That notice of the public hearing was posted and advertised pursuant to applicable federal, state, and local laws.

SECTION 7: The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this resolution and shall cause the same to be processed in the manner required by law, and said copy to be submitted to the County of Los Angeles.

SUMMARY RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council waive further reading and introduce Ordinance No. 2019-369 amending Title 17 of the Calabasas Municipal Code by updating sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170, which provide zoning regulations and standards pertaining to accessory dwelling units, to improve consistency with applicable State law, and to improve clarity and understanding of the regulations and standards.

BACKGROUND:

Throughout the City's history every reasonable effort has been made to maintain land use policies and zoning regulations which are consistent with the governing statutes in California law. Accordingly, the City's zoning ordinances have allowed

for certain forms of accessory housing units in residential zones, including (in chronological order) "Granny Flats", "Secondary Housing Units", and most recently "Accessory Dwelling Units". The current term, Accessory Dwelling Unit (or ADU), came into use starting in January 2017, after a significant number of new housing bills were passed by the State Legislature and signed by the Governor. In response, all California cities and counties had to immediately update their zoning ordinances to bring them into compliance with the new State ADU laws; and Calabasas did exactly that on February 22, 2017 when the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2017-347.

However, with passage of AB 494 and SB 229 in late 2017, both of which took effect at the beginning of this year, the California Legislature has again modified the ADU statutes. Consequently, the City is obligated to again update the Development Code to bring our ADU provisions into conformance with current law. In the meantime, while staff has been using and applying the current ADU provisions within CMC Sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170, questions and confusion have occurred regarding the applicability and/or the lack of clear meanings of certain ADU standards.

The Planning Commission conducted public hearings on Resolution 2018-674 on October 4th, 2018 and Resolution 2018-679 on December 6th, 2018 and recommended adoption of the proposed ordinance after staff addressed concerns raised by the commission in regard to properties with private septic systems. Of the 100 remaining properties served by septic systems, 30 are sewer adjacent, leaving 70 residences who would first need to assure that the new ADU does not impact either future septic replacement areas or their current systems capability prior to permit issuance.

DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS:

The proposed amendments to the Development Code are necessary because the City is obligated to adopt and apply a zoning ordinance which accommodates ADUs in a manner consistent with State law, and because the City endeavors to maintain a Development Code which is easily understood and applied by staff and the general public.

The proposed draft ordinance (attached as Exhibit A) would re-write the City's ADU regulations within Development Code Sections 17.11.010 (specifically Table 2-2, Land Use Table) and 17.12.170) to accomplish this goal, while also improving overall clarity and understanding of the ADU regulations and standards. The proposed revisions do the following:

- The RC (Rural Community) zone has been added to the list of zones in which an ADU is permitted because State law now specifies that ADUs must be permitted in all residential zones which allow for singlefamily housing.
- 2. The restriction within Table 2-4 which allowed ADUs only on lots sized 10,000 s.f. or greater has been deleted because State law effectively preempts via the requirement that local governmental agencies must approve any ADU which is proposed within the existing building envelope. (The statutory preemption effectively occurs because a homeowner can easily construct a single-family home addition, and then propose to convert the additional area, or some portion of it, to an ADU at a later date.)
- 3. To be consistent with State law, the term "Secondary Housing Unit" has been replaced with the term "Accessory Dwelling Unit" throughout the two Code sections.
- 4. A clarification has been added to state that an ADU may be permitted on any lot which has a primary single-family dwelling served by a private septic system provided that the ADU placement meets the zoning restrictions for the Old Topanga and Highlands Overlay Zones.
- 5. To improve clarity and understanding, the wording has been revised for the specific ADU standards listed within Table 2-4.
- 6. The off-street parking standards within Table 2-4 have been re-written to clarify the need to maintain minimum conformance with off-street parking requirements for the <u>primary</u> dwelling unit, to include requiring replacement off-street parking spaces for any such required spaces that would otherwise be removed to accommodate a new ADU.
- 7. Clarifications have been added regarding existing primary dwellings and existing accessory structures, so that the construction of any new ADU, whether as an addition to, or as a conversion of, existing space may occur only when the existing primary or accessory structure legally exists, or the structure(s) will be legalized as a part of the project. This means the City is not obligated under the State law to ministerially approve either an ADU conversion or an ADU addition when the applicable primary or accessory structure(s) has not been permitted for construction in the first place.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW:

This proposal is exempt from environmental review in accordance with Section

21084 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and Sections 15061(b)(3) and 15378(b)(5) of the CEQA Guidelines (General Rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment).

FISCAL IMPACT/SOURCE OF FUNDING:

There is minor impact to the City as a result of fees lost for Planning Staff reviews.

REQUESTED ACTION:

That the City Council waive further reading and introduce Ordinance No. 2019-369 amending Title 17 of the Calabasas Municipal Code by updating sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170, which provide zoning regulations and standards pertaining to accessory dwelling units, to improve consistency with applicable State law, and to improve clarity and understanding of the regulations and standards.

ORDINANCE NO. 2019-369

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA AMENDING TITLE 17 OF THE CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE BY UPDATING SECTIONS 17.12.170, WHICH PROVIDE 17.11.010 and ZONING REGULATIONS AND **STANDARDS PERTAINING** ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS, TO IMPROVE CONSISTENCY WITH APPLICABLE STATE LAW AND TO IMPROVE CLARITY AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE **REGULATIONS** STANDARDS.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Calabasas, California ("the City Council") has considered all of the evidence including, but not limited to, the Planning Commission Resolution 2018-679, Planning Division staff reports and attachments, and public testimony before making a final decision on January 9, 2019; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the Land Use and Development Code Amendment is consistent with the goals, policies, and actions of the General Plan and will not conflict with the General Plan; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the Land Use and Development Code Amendment will not be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience, or welfare of the City; and,

WHEREAS, the proposed actions are in compliance with the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) because this project is categorically exempt from environmental review in accordance with Section 21084 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Section 15061(B)(3) and 15378(b)(5) of the CEQA Guidelines; and,

WHEREAS, the proposed Development Code Amendment is consistent with newly effective amendments to Government Code section 65852.2 and is consistent with the Housing Element of the Calabasas 2030 General Plan, which encourages the development of secondary housing units as a means of providing affordable housing while maintaining the character of residential neighborhoods, is adopted in the public interest, and is otherwise consistent with federal and state law; and,

WHEREAS, the Land Use and Development Code Amendment reflects the input of residents, stakeholders, and public officials; and implements the policies of the 2030 General Plan, is adopted in the public's interest, and is

otherwise consistent with federal and state law; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the entirety of the record, which includes without limitation, The Calabasas 2030 General Plan; all reports, testimony, and transcripts from the meeting of the Planning Commission on October 4, 2018, and December 6, 2018; and reports, and testimony at the City Council's January 9, 2019 meeting.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Based upon the foregoing the City Council finds:

- 1. Notice of the February 12, 2014 City Council public hearing was posted at Juan Bautista de Anza Park, the Calabasas Tennis and Swim Center, Agoura/Calabasas Recreation Center, Gelson's Market and at Calabasas City Hall.
- 2. Notice of the February 12, 2014 City Council public hearings were posted in the *Acorn* ten (10) days prior to the hearings.
- 3. Notice of the February 12, 2014 City Council public hearings included the information set forth in Government Code Section 65009 (b)(2).
- 4. Following a public hearing held on December 6, 2018, the Planning Commission adopted Resolution No. 2018-679 recommending to the City Council adoption of this Ordinance.

SECTION 2. In view of all the evidence and based on the foregoing findings, the City Council concludes as follows:

Section 17.76.050(B) Calabasas Municipal Code allows the City Council to approve a Development Code Amendment, which follows in Section 3 of this ordinance, provided that the following findings are made:

1. The proposed amendments are consistent with the goals, policies, and actions of the General Plan;

The proposed amendments to CMC Sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170 are consistent with the goals, policies, and actions of the General Plan because the amendments will update the City's accessory dwelling unit requirements so that the approval process, as well as the required off-street parking, maximum size, minimum setback requirements align with State law; and because the amendments will strengthen the accessory dwelling unit standards and requirements, thereby promoting

accessory dwelling unit production and use in the manner envisioned by the Calabasas 2030 General Plan Housing Element. As updated on September 11, 2013 via adoption of the 2014-2021 Housing Element Update, the 2030 General Plan includes the following objective statements: "1) Assist in the provision of a variety of housing types to address the needs of all economic segments of the Calabasas community; and, 2) Address and remove governmental constraints that may hinder or discourage housing development in Calabasas." amendments assist with provision of a variety of housing types to address the needs of all economic segments of the Calabasas community by increasing the number of potential new housing units on residentially zoned properties the City. The proposed amendments will also remove governmental constraints by allowing qualified accessory dwelling units standards to receive ministerial approval discretionary review. Consistent with these General Plan objectives, the proposed amendments specifically implement the following General Plan policies, as articulated in the 2014-2021 Housing Element:

Policy V-1: Preserve the character, scale and quality of established residential neighborhoods.

Policy V-8: Provide site opportunities for development of housing that responds to the diverse housing needs of Calabasas residents and workforce in terms of density, location and cost.

Policy V-10: Provide for the development of second units in existing single-family neighborhoods to provide additional opportunities for rental housing which conforms to the development standards within the underlying zone.

Policy V-21: Support the development and maintenance of affordable senior rental and ownership housing and supportive services to facilitate maximum independence and the ability of seniors to remain in their homes and/or in the community.

2. The proposed amendments would not be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience or welfare of the city;

The proposed amendments would not be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience, or welfare of the City because they update the City's accessory dwelling unit requirements to comply with State law, and any future applicant seeking authorization to construct or otherwise create an accessory dwelling unit still must comply fully with all applicable state laws and all other applicable standards for site development, including but not limited to: Hillside Grading Ordinance, Scenic Corridor Overlay Ordinance and Design Guidelines, Dark Skies Ordinance, Landscaping Ordinance, Oak Tree Protection Ordinance, Green

Buildings Ordinance, and other health and safety requirements of applicable laws. Any such future project must also comply fully with State and local building codes. Additionally, the City retains its authority to consider adequacy of water and sewer services and the impact of accessory dwelling units on public safety.

3. The proposed amendments comply with the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

The proposed amendments are exempt from the requirement for environmental review under CEQA for the reasons listed below.

- 1) The accessory dwelling unit regulations promulgated through the proposed updated Municipal Code Sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170 already took effect on January 1, 2018 by virtue of the State's adoption of new statutes preempting any inconsistent local ordinance; thus, the City's action to amend its accessory dwelling unit ordinance to match the new requirements of State law does not create a new land use regulation and it can be seen with certainty that no environmental impacts will result from the City's action. Consequently, in accordance with CEQA Section 21084 and consistent with CEQA Guidelines Sections 15002(i)(1) - Lack of Local Jurisdictional Discretion - and 15061(b)(3) - General Rule of Exemption, the adoption of this ordinance is exempt from review under CEQA.
- 2) Adoption of this ordinance fails to meet the definition of a project under CEQA Guidelines section 15061, subdivision (b)(3) and section 15378, subdivisions (a) and (b)(5).
- 3) The proposed amendments to the accessory dwelling unit ordinance will update the standards for accessory dwelling units to comply with State law, and the amendments have no potential to result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment because the modified standards pertain to a process for issuance of ministerial permits for accessory dwelling units and the amendments do not directly or indirectly approve any specific new housing unit application or proposal. Adoption of this ordinance is therefore further exempt from CEQA review pursuant to California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Sections 15301 and 15308 of the CEOA Guidelines.
- 4. The proposed amendments are internally consistent with other applicable provisions of this development code.

The proposed amendments are internally consistent with other applicable provisions of the Development Code because they update only Sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170 as pertaining to accessory dwelling units, and other chapters and sections of the Municipal Code remain unaffected.

SECTION 3. Code Amendments.

Section 17.11.010 of the Calabasas Municipal Code is hereby amended as follows:

Section 17.11.010 (Table 2-2, Land Use Table) of the Land Use and Development Code is hereby amended by replacing the term "Secondary housing units" with the term "Accessory Dwelling Unit" and by adding the notation "P" (indicating a permitted land use) within the box located beneath the "RC" column heading and aligned with the 'Accessory Dwelling Unit" land use row; and,

Section 17.12.170 of the Land Use and Development Code is hereby repealed, and is replaced in its entirety with the following:

17.12.170 - Accessory Dwelling Units.

This section establishes standards for accessory dwelling units, also known as secondary housing units, where such housing units are allowed by <u>Section</u> 17.11.010.

A. Legislative Findings. In compliance with Government Code Section 65852.2, the city finds that accessory dwelling units are consistent with the allowable density and with the General Plan and zoning designations for residential single-family areas of the city.

- B. Development Standards. A single accessory dwelling unit may be allowed on a legal lot located in the RS, RR, HM, RC, or OS zoning districts in addition to a primary single-family residential dwelling, subject to a zoning clearance, as follows:
 - 1. Primary Dwelling and Sanitary Sewer Service Required. The lot shall be developed with one legally established detached single-family dwelling and shall be served by sanitary sewer or septic system.
 - 2. Primary and Accessory Dwellings Not Separable. The accessory dwelling unit shall not be sold separately from the primary dwelling and may be rented.
 - 3. Accessory Dwelling Unit Appearance. The design of the unit shall conform in general to the design of the primary dwelling.
 - 4. Short-term Rentals Prohibited. Consistent with Section 17.12.175, the accessory dwelling unit shall not be used for any short-term rental or transient rental or occupancy for any purpose, including but not limited to

- a vacation, for less than thirty (30) days if that rental or occupancy occurs in exchange for any form of compensation or consideration.
- 5. Site Layout and Design Standards. The location and design of an accessory dwelling unit shall comply with the development standards applicable to the property zoning and any applicable overlay zone, as well as the following requirements (Table 2-4, below). Where any listed standard in Table 2-4 conflicts with a standard for the residential zone or an applicable overlay zone, the standard in Table 2-4 prevails).

<u>SECTION 4</u>. SEVERABILITY. Should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this Ordinance be rendered or declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect and, to that end, the provisions hereof are declared to be severable.

<u>SECTION 5</u>. CONSTRUCTION. The City Council intends this Ordinance to supplement, not to duplicate or contradict, applicable state and federal law and this Ordinance shall be construed in light of that intent. To the extent the provisions of the Calabasas Municipal Code as amended by this Ordinance are substantially the same as the provisions of that Code as it read prior to the adoption of this Ordinance, those amended provisions shall be construed as continuations of the earlier provisions and not as new enactments.

SECTION 6. ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION. The City Council determines that the following findings reflect the independent judgment of the City Council. The City Council finds that this amendment to the Municipal Code is exempt from California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The City Council has considered all of the evidence in the record, including the staff reports, the testimony received during the public hearing on the matter held by the City Council, and hereby determines that the text amendments will not have a significant effect on the environment, as this ordinance accomplishes amendments to the accessory dwelling unit ordinance as necessary to comply with State law, and the amendments have no potential to result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment because the modified standards pertain to a process for issuance of ministerial permits for accessory dwelling units and the amendments do not directly or indirectly approve any specific new housing unit application or development project. This Ordinance is therefore exempt from California Environmental Quality Act review pursuant to Title 14, Section 15061(b)(3) of the California Code of Regulations.

SECTION 7. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its adoption pursuant to California Government Code section 36937.

<u>SECTION 8</u>. CERTIFICATION. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published or posted according to law.

PLANNING COMMISSION RESOLUTION NO. 2018-679

A RESOLUTION OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS RECOMMENDING TO THE CITY NO. COUNCIL ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE 2018-369. AMENDING TITLE 17 OF THE CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE BY UPDATING SECTIONS 17.11.010 AND 17.12.170, WHICH PROVIDE ZONING REGULATIONS AND **STANDARDS** PERTAINING TO ACCESSORY **DWELLING** UNITS. TO IMPROVE CONSISTENCY WITH APPLICABLE STATE LAW AND TO IMPROVE CLARITY AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE **REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS.**

<u>Section 1</u>. The Planning Commission has considered all of the evidence submitted into the administrative record, which includes, but is not limited to:

- 1. Agenda reports prepared by the Community Development Department, including draft Ordinance No. 2018-369.
- 2. Staff presentations at the public hearings held on October 4, 2018, and December 6, 2018, before the Planning Commission.
- 3. The City of Calabasas Land Use and Development Code, General Plan, and all other applicable regulations and codes.
- 4. Public comments, and/or comments from interested parties or organizations, both written and oral, received and/or submitted at, or prior to, the public hearing, supporting and/or opposing the item.
- 5. All related documents received or submitted at, or prior to, the public hearing,

<u>Section 2</u>. Based of the foregoing evidence, the Planning Commission finds that:

- On February 10, 2010 the Calabasas City Council adopted by Ordinance a comprehensive revision of the City's Land Use and Development Code (Title 17 of the Calabasas Municipal Code), which included provisions within Section 17.12.170 for the development of secondary housing units on certain residentially zoned properties; and,
- 2. On February 22, 2017 the Calabasas City Council adopted Ordinance No. 2017-347, which updated and amended the provisions within Section 17.12.170 for secondary housing units to conform with newly enacted

State laws, to include re-naming secondary housing units as accessory dwelling units and requiring ministerial approval for a greater range of accessory dwelling unit types and sizes. (Exhibit C)

- 3. As written in Draft Ordinance No. 2018-369, the proposed amendments to Calabasas Municipal Code Sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170 will add further clarity to the accessory dwelling unit standards and requirements, and will further improve conformance with applicable State law by meeting the requirements stipulated in SB-229 and AB-494, both of which were approved and enacted, and took effect on January 1, 2018; and
- 4. Notice of the October 4th, 2018 and December 6, 2018 Planning Commission public hearings were posted at Juan Bautista de Anza Park, the Calabasas Tennis and Swim Center, the Agoura-Calabasas Community Center, Gelson's Market and at Calabasas City Hall; and
- Notice of the October 4th, 2018 and December 6, 2018 Planning Commission public hearings were published at least ten days prior to the hearing date in the *Las Virgenes and Calabasas Enterprise* newspaper; and
- 6. Notice of the October 4th, 2018 and December 6th, 2018 Planning Commission public hearings were mailed or delivered at least ten (10) days prior to the hearing to persons who had requested notice; and
- 7. Notices for the Planning Commission public hearings included the notice requirements set forth in Government Code Sections 65094 and 65009 (b)(2).

<u>Section 3</u>. In view of all of the evidence and based on the following findings, the Planning Commission concludes as follows:

FINDINGS

Section 17.76.050(B) Calabasas Municipal Code authorizes the Planning Commission to recommend, and the City Council to approve, a Development Code Amendment, provided that the following findings are made:

1. The proposed amendments are consistent with the goals, policies, and actions of the General Plan;

The proposed amendments to CMC Sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170 are consistent with the goals, policies, and actions of the General Plan because the amendments will update the City's accessory dwelling unit requirements so that the approval process, as well as the required offstreet parking, maximum size, minimum setback requirements align with

State law; and because the amendments will strengthen the accessory dwelling unit standards and requirements and will add clarity to the accessory dwelling unit standards and requirements, thereby promoting accessory dwelling unit production and use in the manner envisioned by the Calabasas 2030 General Plan Housing Element. As updated on September 11, 2013 via adoption of the 2014-2021 Housing Element Update, the 2030 General Plan includes the following objective statements: "1) Assist in the provision of a variety of housing types to address the needs of all economic segments of the Calabasas community; and, 2) Address and remove governmental constraints that may hinder or discourage housing development in Calabasas." The proposed amendments assist with provision of a variety of housing types to address the needs of all economic segments of the Calabasas community by increasing the number of potential new housing units on residentially zoned properties the City. The proposed amendments will also remove governmental constraints by allowing qualified accessory dwelling units meeting the standards to receive ministerial approval without discretionary review. Consistent with these General Plan objectives, the proposed amendments specifically implement the following General Plan policies, as articulated in the 2014-2021 Housing Element:

Policy V-1: Preserve the character, scale and quality of established residential neighborhoods.

Policy V-8: Provide site opportunities for development of housing that responds to the diverse housing needs of Calabasas residents and workforce in terms of density, location and cost.

Policy V-10: Provide for the development of second units in existing single-family neighborhoods to provide additional opportunities for rental housing which conforms to the development standards within the underlying zone.

Policy V-21: Support the development and maintenance of affordable senior rental and ownership housing and supportive services to facilitate maximum independence and the ability of seniors to remain in their homes and/or in the community.

2. The proposed amendments would not be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience or welfare of the city;

The proposed amendments would not be detrimental to the public interest, health, safety, convenience, or welfare of the City because they update the City's accessory dwelling unit requirements to comply with State law, and any future applicant seeking authorization to construct or otherwise create an accessory dwelling unit still must comply fully with all applicable state laws and all other applicable standards for site development, including but not limited to: Hillside Grading Ordinance, Scenic Corridor Overlay Ordinance and Design Guidelines, Dark Skies Ordinance,

Landscaping Ordinance, Oak Tree Protection Ordinance, Green Buildings Ordinance, and other health and safety requirements of applicable laws. Any such future project must also comply fully with State and local building codes. Additionally, the City retains its authority to consider adequacy of water and sewer services and the impact of accessory dwelling units on public safety.

3. The proposed amendments comply with the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA).

The proposed amendments are exempt from the requirement for environmental review under CEQA for the reasons listed below.

- 1) The accessory dwelling unit regulations promulgated through the proposed updated Municipal Code Sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170 already took effect on January 1, 2018 by virtue of the State's adoption of new statutes preempting any inconsistent local ordinance; thus, the City's action to amend its accessory dwelling unit ordinance to match the new requirements of State law does not create a new land use regulation and it can be seen with certainty that no environmental impacts will result from the City's action. Consequently, in accordance with CEQA Section 21084 and consistent with CEQA Guidelines Sections 15002(i)(1) Lack of Local Jurisdictional Discretion and 15061(b)(3) General Rule of Exemption, the adoption of this ordinance is exempt from review under CEQA.
- 2) Adoption of this ordinance fails to meet the definition of a project under CEQA Guidelines section 15061, subdivision (b)(3) and section 15378, subdivisions (a) and (b)(5).
- 3) The proposed amendments to the accessory dwelling unit ordinance will update the standards for accessory dwelling units to comply with State law, and the amendments have no potential to result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment because the modified standards pertain to a process for issuance of ministerial permits for accessory dwelling units and the amendments do not directly or indirectly approve any specific new housing unit application or proposal. Adoption of this ordinance is therefore further exempt from CEQA review pursuant to California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Sections 15301 and 15308 of the CEQA Guidelines.
- 4. The proposed amendments are internally consistent with other applicable provisions of this development code.

The proposed amendments are internally consistent with other applicable provisions of the Development Code because they update only Sections 17.11.010 and 17.12.170 as pertaining to accessory dwelling units, and other chapters and sections of the Municipal Code remain unaffected.

Section 4. In view of all of the evidence, including the staff report and testimony provided at the public hearing, and based on the foregoing findings and conclusions, the Planning Commission hereby recommends to the City Council adoption of Ordinance No. 2018-369 (a draft version of which is attached hereto as "Attachment 1", and is fully incorporated), amending Section 17.12.170 of the Land Use and Development Code (Title 17 of the Calabasas Municipal Code), which provides zoning regulations and standards pertaining to accessory dwelling units, to improve consistency with applicable State law and to improve clarity and understanding of the regulations and standards.

<u>Section 5</u>. All documents described in Section 1 of Planning Commission Resolution No. 2018-674 are deemed incorporated by reference as set forth at length.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS, CALIFORNIA AMENDING TITLE 17 OF THE CALABASAS MUNICIPAL CODE BY UPDATING SECTIONS 17.11.010 and 17.12.170, WHICH PROVIDE ZONING REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS PERTAINING TO ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS, TO IMPROVE CONSISTENCY WITH APPLICABLE STATE LAW AND TO IMPROVE CLARITY AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CALABASAS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. DEVELOPMENT CODE AMENDMENTS.

Section 17.11.010 (Table 2-2, Land Use Table) of the Land Use and Development Code is hereby amended by replacing the term "Secondary housing units" with the term "Accessory Dwelling Unit" and by adding the notation "P" (indicating a permitted land use) within the box located beneath the "RC" column heading and aligned with the 'Accessory Dwelling Unit" land use row; and,

Section 17.12.170 of the Land Use and Development Code is hereby repealed, and is replaced in its entirety with the following:

17.12.170 - Accessory Dwelling Units.

This section establishes standards for accessory dwelling units, also known as secondary housing units, where such housing units are allowed by Section 17.11.010.

- A. Legislative Findings. In compliance with Government Code Section 65852.2, the city finds that accessory dwelling units are consistent with the allowable density and with the General Plan and zoning designations for residential single-family areas of the city.
- B. Development Standards. A single accessory dwelling unit may be allowed on a legal lot located in the RS, RR, HM, RC, or OS zoning districts in addition to a primary single-family residential dwelling, subject to a zoning clearance, as follows:
 - 1. Primary Dwelling and Sanitary Sewer Service or On-Site Sewage Disposal System Required. The lot shall be developed with one legally established detached single-family dwelling and shall be served by sanitary sewer or a permitted on-site sewage disposal system.
 - 2. Primary and Accessory Dwellings Not Separable. The accessory dwelling unit shall not be sold separately from the primary dwelling and may be rented.
 - 3. Accessory Dwelling Unit Appearance. The design of the unit shall conform in general to the design of the primary dwelling.
 - 4. Short-term Rentals Prohibited. Consistent with Section 17.12.175, the accessory dwelling unit shall not be used for any short-term rental or transient rental or occupancy for any purpose, including but not limited to a vacation, for less than thirty (30) days if that rental or occupancy occurs in exchange for any form of compensation or consideration.
 - 5. Site Layout and Design Standards. The location and design of an accessory dwelling unit shall comply with the development standards applicable to the property zoning and any applicable overlay zone, as well as the following requirements (Table 2-4, below). Where any listed standard in Table 2-4 conflicts with a standard for the residential zone or an applicable overlay zone, the standard in Table 2-4 prevails).

6. Notwithstanding the requirements in Table 2-4, one accessory dwelling unit may be located on any lot that is zoned to allow for single-family residential use, provided that the accessory dwelling unit is contained entirely within the building envelope of an existing legally established primary residential dwelling, or is contained entirely within the building envelope of a legally established accessory structure to the primary dwelling, and where the accessory dwelling unit has exterior access that is independent from the existing legal primary residence and the side and rear setbacks are sufficient for fire safety as determined by the Community Development Director.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. **SEVERABILITY.** Should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this Ordinance be rendered or declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions, sections, paragraphs, sentences or words of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect and, to that end, the provisions hereof are declared to be severable.

<u>SECTION 3</u>. **CONSTRUCTION.** The City Council intends this Ordinance to supplement, not to duplicate or contradict, applicable state and federal law and this Ordinance shall be construed in light of that intent. To the extent the provisions of the Calabasas Municipal Code as amended by this Ordinance are substantially the same as the provisions of that Code as it read prior to the adoption of this Ordinance, those amended provisions shall be construed as continuations of the earlier provisions and not as new enactments.

SECTION 4. ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION. The City Council determines that the following findings reflect the independent judgment of the City Council. The City Council finds that this amendment to the Municipal Code is exempt from California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The City Council has considered all of the evidence in the record, including the staff reports, the testimony received during the public hearing on the matter held by the City Council, and hereby determines that the text amendments will not have a significant effect on the environment, as this ordinance accomplishes amendments to the accessory dwelling unit ordinance as necessary to comply with State law, and the amendments have no potential to result in direct or indirect physical changes in the environment because the modified standards pertain to a process for issuance of ministerial permits for accessory dwelling units and the amendments do not directly or indirectly approve any specific new housing unit application or development project. This Ordinance is therefore exempt from California Environmental Quality Act review pursuant to Title 14. Section 15061(b)(3) of the California Code of Regulations.

<u>SECTION 5.</u> **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This Ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its adoption pursuant to California Government Code section 36937.

<u>SECTION 6</u>. **CERTIFICATION.** The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same to be published or posted according to law.
