FY 2019-20 Year in Review

May you live in interesting times

Fiscal year 2019-20 started out in a positive manner. The Library hosted a successful Summer Reading Program, a Calabasas Reads event and a series of new story times.

When the Covid-19 pandemic forced us to close the library building on March 13, the library staff wasted no time in continuing services to the public. We quickly put our programs online, either taped and shown on social media, or live through Zoom. By April 1, we had established appointment based material checkout. Working with the school district, we increased our purchases of digital materials so students could continue school through online learning. We added all LVUSD staff and teachers to the Polaris database so they could connect resources to students. We published the newsletter twice a month to keep our patrons up-to-date on changes and events.



In June, the killing of George Floyd raised the ever present specter of social injustice, and citizens responded by holding a series of Black Lives Matter protests in front of the Library and City Hall. The Library responded by purchasing and highlighting materials on these issues.

Since March there are always at least two circulation staff members a day working at the Library wearing masks and socially distancing. Hourly librarians answer the reference desk phones. When not in the Library full time staff works remotely. Zoom Library staff meetings are held weekly.



Registered Borrowers

In Fiscal Year 2019-20 the library had 62,068 registered users. The 13,500 digital cards are issued to every Las Virgenes Unified School District (LVUSD) student, staff and teachers. The students can use these e-cards to access the digital materials and book study rooms. To check out physical materials from the library they must have a regular library card and many of them do.

From July 2019 to March 2020, the library recorded 126,000 visitors. From April to the end of the fiscal year in June, 595 people came for appointment pickups.

Collection

Physical books still account for the largest number of items in the collection. However, because of the Memorandum of Understanding

with Hidden Hills and LVUSD, we continued to expand our digital collections and databases. The pandemic school closures required an increased need for online learning materials which we provided. We also added many new free online resources to our website. The California State Library offered additional new databases to us.



Circulation

When the Library building closed the circulation of electronic content dramatically increased. Cloud Library use increased from 1,568 checkouts in January to 3,155 in April. Physical items still accounted for most of the circulation before that. The most checked out items were DVDs, adult fiction and children's books. The total yearly circulation including physical items, e-books, downloadable audio and database searches out is 155,251. In addition, in-house use of books totaled almost 79,000.

Digital content use increased by 100% when the Library building closed.

Programs

The Library continued to provide many free educational, artistic and entertainment programs for people of all ages. Children's programs include Summer Reading (SRP) entertainment events, story times, game days, craft projects, MakerBox programs, Pet Partners Reading Program, and Writers' Club. Free tutoring was available through the Study Buddies and Love to Learn programs.

Young Adults earned community service by volunteering for Summer Reading events, Study Buddies, National Honor Society tutoring, the Teen Library Council and the Fun Fair. The Library also hosted movies and parties for teens.

Adults participated in book clubs, yoga, and cooking classes. They attended movie screenings, author events and lectures sponsored by the Calabasas-Las Virgenes Historical Society. This year we had two very successful author programs. The Calabasas Reads program featured Susan Orlean, author of *The Library Book*. The Library also hosted Lee Goldberg, author of *Lost Hills*. Hundreds of people attended both presentations and book signings. A special art exhibit was held for photos from the Woolsey fire with the artists and first responders attending.

At the end of March, all our programs went online. Story times were filmed and posted on social media. Our hourly librarian, Sky You, created a special blog called *Quarantimes*, *A Survival Guide for Parents with Toddlers*. Summer Reading events were either interactive on Zoom or filmed by the performers and shown on social media. The Library staff had a special drive-by event to distribute SRP bags and goodies to children in the community. Staff also created Science project bags to distribute to cars of families who sign up. Book clubs continued on Zoom with participation of 8-15 adults per session. The Historical Society Zoom presentation on the History of Documentary Film was well attended with an audience of 65.
